Activities:

On October 25, 1921, General Order No. 19, was issued. The order provided that on and after November 1, 1921, Battery E, Field Artillery, California Mational Guard, organized in the City of Oakland, March 17, 1921, should be known and designated as Battery A, First Separate Battalion, Field Artillery, California National Guard.

On May 11, 1922, Battery A, participated in the ceremonies attending the dedication of the new National Guard Armory at 23rd and Grove Streets, Oakland. The celebration started with a parade through the streets of Oakland. At the head of the columns of amarching men, arrayed in the uniform he wore in France, and bearing the insignia of notable service, marched David P. Barrows, President of the University of California, and Colonel of the 159th Infantry Regiment, California National Guard. In the reviewing stand in front of the City Hall stood Adjutant General J. J. Boree, Colonel Robert Noble, Colonel L. Holbrook, Colonel R. E. Mittelstaedt, Lt. Colonel R. S. Fitch: Majors J. Alexander, P. A. Rogers and W. E. McCaughey, and Mayor John L. Davis, and Commissioner Albert E. Carter of Oakland.

Activities: (Continued)

Commissioner Frank Colburn rode in the Police automobile with Chief of Police James T. Drew, at the head of the platoon of police, in charge of Captain Frank Lynch.

In the parade were the Service Company, Howitzer Company, Headquarters Company, and the First and Third Battalions of the 159th Infantry; the San Francisco Port Command, Coast Artillery Corps, 40th Division Signal Company, and Batteries A, B, C and D Field Artillery, California National Guard.

At the Armory, speeches were made by Colonel Barrows, Mayor Davis and General Boree, who acted as chairman during the evening.

Under authority of paragraph 4, Special Order No. 154, Headquarters, 9th Corps Area, United States Army, dated July 3, 1922, Battery A, engaged in a fifteen day field training encampment in conjunction with United States Army troops at Camp Lewis, Washington, from July 13th to July 31, 1922.

Battery A, engaged in routine weekly drill exercises until July 8, 1923, when it journeyed to Camp Richardson, Salinas, California, for field training, July 8th to 22nd.

On September 20, 1923, General Order No. 13, was issued redesignating Battery A, First Separate Battalion, Field Artillery, California National Guard, as Battery A, 143rd Field Artillery, California National Suard.
