Activities:

Battery B, Second Artillery Regiment had the distinction of being the first company of Militia formed in California, having been organized as the First California Guard July 27, 1849. The unit remained unattached for thirty-two years, being designated as Light Battery A unattached. One June 1, 1881, the Board of Location and Organization decided to organize an Artillery Regiment. The Second Infantry Regiment was selected and redesignated as the Second Artillery Regiment, Second Brigade. There being a vacancy in Company B in the regiment, Battery A Light Battery, unattached, was attached to the regiment as Battery B, Second Artillery Regiment, Second Brigade.*

The first inspection report of Major Welter H. Holmes, Inspector Second Brigade on September 12, 1882, showed a very poor attendance at the inspection for Battery B, their percentage being only 48.43%.** However, in 1884, there attendance percentage had increased to 83.85%, which probably was a good indices of the interest and efficiency maintained by the members of the unit.***

Unfortunately for this narrative, the Second Artillery Regiment did not go into an encampment while Battery B was attached to it. When on April 7, 1885, Battery A, Second Artillery Regiment was mustered out of the service, Battery B requested they be redesignated as Battery A, as the unit has been known as First California Guard Company A, soon after its organization in 1849, until its attachment to the Second Artillery, when it was designated Company B. Accordingly on May 5, 1885, a Special Order was issued by the Adjutant General, redesignating the unit Battery A.***

For a period of eight years there existed a vacancy in Battery B. On May 27, 1893, a company was organized in Napa and on June fourteenth was ordered attached to the Second Artillery Regiment as Battery B. The mustering and acceptance of the unit into the National Guard, was the occasion for the gathering in Napa of many militia dignitaries. Accompanying Brigadier-General John H. Dickinson was Adjutant General C. C. Allen, National Guard of California; Adjutant H. M. Carrington and Lieutenant W. E. Dougherty, United States Army; and the following staff officers, R. D. Laidlow, W. D. Dodd, John A. Ropke, C. C. Coleman and Charles T. Stanley; and Judge W. H. Levy. At the organization C. H. Starkweather was elected Captain and Frank G. Easterby.

First Lieutenant. The Court House was selected as the place of mustering and eight o'clock as the time. The meeting was called to order by Captain Starkweather, who read the Special Order calling the meeting, and then introduced General Dickinson. The General briefly explained the duties of the National Guard and read and explained the Oath of Allegiance. Only fiftyseven members were present to sign the muster roll, while sixty was the minimum. Three more were to be mustered at a later date. When the signing of the muster roll was over and the men mustered into the National Guard, the members of the new company and their guests adjourned to the Napa Hotel, where a banquet was awaiting them. Senator H. C. Gesford acted as toastmaster and the following gentlemen responded: Adjutant General C. C. Allen on, "The National Guard"; Adjutant H. M. Carrington, United States Army on "The Regular Army": "The Second Brigade" was the subject of General Dickinson; "The New Company" by Captain C. H. Starkweather; "The Judiciary and the National Guard" by Judge Walter Levy of San Francisco; "The Rank and File" by T. B. Hutchinson, Esq.; "Our Officers" by Lieutenant Frank Easterby; "Comrades in Arms" by H. D. Lazelle; and "Amusements in Camp" by Lieutenant J. A. Ropke. The banquet closed with three cheers for the new company.

The muster and inspection report of Major Victor D. Duboce, Inspector Second Brigade on April 10, 1894, indicated that the new Battery B mustered forty-nine officers and men out of a roll of fifty-five members. At inspection, discipline was very good; instruction very good; appearance excellent; and condition of property was also excellent.

During the Railroad Strike in July 1894, Battery B as their first assignment was stationed at the Armory on guard duty. On July twelfth, Lieutenant-Colonel Dennis Geary, Second Artillery, was ordered to take six companies of the Second Artillery, a detachment from the Naval Battalion, and proceed to Cakland and take possession of the railroad yards. Colonel Geary succeeded in this by embarking on the steamer "El Capitan" and landing at the wharf at the foot of Peralta Street, Oakland at 3:00 A.M., and occupied the yards without any opposition. The strikers were holding the front entrance to the yards expecting an attack there, and were taken by surprise by the troops landing and

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

advancing from the rear. On the thirteenth, Battery B was ordered to join the six companies already in the Oakland yards. The unit camped in the freight yards until July twenty-fifth at which time they were ordered home to San Francisco and dismissed.*

During the reorganization of the National Guard on December 7, 1895, Battery B, Second artillery Regiment was redesignated as Company H, Eighth Battalion, and two days later the Seventh and Eighth Battalions were organized into the Fifth Infantry Regiment, Second Brigade. Company H, thereby, became Company H Fifth Infantry Regiment, Second Brigade.**
