Activities:

Company A was formerly the <u>Emmet Guard</u> organized November 18, 1862. However, on April 18, 1883, the unit was reorganized and mustered in as Company A of the Third Infantry Regiment with a membership of seventy men.* This unit under its new commander reached a degree of discipline and excellence that placed it among the most reliable and efficient of the companies in the National Guard.** The inspection of D. E. Miles, Major and Signal Officer of the Second Brigade indicates this fact as the percentage of attendance in 1883, was 75 per cent and the unit increased until 1892, the percentage was 98 per cent.

On August 28, 1884, the unit encamped for three days at Monterey under the command of Colonel Robert Tobin. The corps paid all their own expenses at this encampment, except for the tents which were loaned to them by the State. The company also attended the encampment of the entire National Guard at Santa Cruz from August 15 to 23, 1885. While in camp the unit took part in the regular drills, parades and other camp duties. The Third Infantry to which Company A was attached was commanded by Colonel Robert Tobin. The Infantry consisted of seven companies and had twentyseven officers and 284 men, which made a total of 311 present.

On numerous occasions Company A acted as escort at the funeral rites for outstanding personages. On August 5, 1889, the unit attended the funeral ceremony for their regimental commander the late Colonel Robert Tobin, also King Kalakaua's funeral on January 22, 1891, and for Senator Hearst, March eighteenth of the same year.

In 1894, Company A was called for active duty. The unit was sent to Sacramento to aid in the controlling of a nationwide railroad strike which had developed among the employees of the Southern Pacific Company. The men were on patrol and guard duty from July fourth to twenty-seven when they were dismissed from active service.***
