## Activities:

Company C was formerly the <u>Hewston Guard</u> an unattached unit, organized June 29, 1869. The Company was reorganized and attached to the Fifth Infantry Regiment, March 22, 1882.\*

Seven months later the unit was inspected by John F. Sheehan, Adjutant General. The percentage of attendance was very low, 43.18 per cent for the month of October. However, their efforts were not futile, as an inspection report by Adjutant General George B. Cosby quotes the merits for the next year of Company C as follows:

Average attendance	63.77%	poor	
Inspection	4.00%	good	
Inspection of Quarters	4.00%	good	

The target practice reports for the years 1883 and 1884 made respectively by Adjutant General Cosby and Fred Kulmle, Inspector of Rifle Practice, are as follows:

Due to the units being in existence for a short period of only five years, the activities in which the members engaged pertained mostly to drills, inspections and parades.\*\*

In accordance with Regimental Order No. 7, Company C, Fifth Infantry Battalion was redesignated Company C, Fifth Infantry Regiment, Second Brigade, August 1, 1885.\*\*\*
