#### Activities:

Company A, Seventh Infantry Battalion was formerly the <u>Eagle Corps</u> an unattached company of the First Brigade, organized on June 9, 1881. On July 22, 1885, the <u>Eagle Corps</u> and the <u>San Diego City</u> <u>Guard</u> another unattached company formed a new battalion known as the Seventh Infantry Battalion, the <u>Eagle Corps</u> to be designated thereafter as Company A.

## Activities: (Continued)

In 1885 the Legislature made an appropriation for a division or general encampment of the National Guard. The encampment was to be held in Santa Gruz, California from August fifteenth to twenty-third of that year. The number of men authorized to be taken to camp owing to limited appropriations was thirtyfive men per company. All in excess of that number were to go at their own expense or that of their company. Unfortunately Company A was unable to attend owing to the distance from Los Angeles to the camp, and the lack of funds to provide transportation for more than one-fourth of the company. Captain Russell wrote Adjutant General George Cosby requesting to be excused, and asked permission for Company A to hold their own encampment at Santa Monica from August twentieth to twentyninth, which request was granted. Lack of records prevents giving a detailed account of the activities of Company A while in camp.

In 1837, the State Legislature made an appropriation of \$3,500 for the promotion of target practice for the thirty-minth and fortieth fiscal years, just half the amount allowed by law. It was deemed advisable to devote a part of this amount to the purchase of State decorations to be awarded to those making a certain percentage at the annual target practice, which the law requested to be held in September of each year. A circular bronze medal was adopted having for design, a bear's head in the center, with suitable inscriptions around the margin. On the back was to be attached gold, silver, or bronze bars with the year and the words, "Sharpshooter," "Rifleman" or "Marksman" enscribed thereon, to denote the standing the soldier had attained during that particular year.\* Company A in their target practice held in Los Angeles in September of that year had twenty-eight men shooting who scored 770 points for a percentage of 23.35 per cent. Out of that number, three men qualified as "Riflemen," and fifteen as "Marksmen."\*\*

Seven new companies were organized in the First Brigade in 1887, thus completing the number of companies required for a regimental organization. The Seventh Infantry Battalion was reorganized and became the Seventh Infantry Regiment, May 5, 1888.\*\*\* For further information concerning Company A refer to History of Company A, Seventh Infantry Regiment, First Brigade.
