### COMPANY H (Continued)

### Activities:

Company H was formerly Company D, Seventh Infantry Regiment, organized in Ventura, Ventura County, December 30, 1889. On December 7, 1895, the Seventh and Ninth Infantry Regiments consolidated into three battalions of four companies each. Company D, Seventh Infantry was redesignated Company H of the Second Battalion. On December ninth the three battalions were designated as the Seventh Infantry.\*

Company H in an attempt to improve their knowledge of military tactics, and become an efficient unit of the National Guard, attended many encampments. Their first was the Brigade encampment held at Santa Monica from August 4 to 14, 1897. Company H, with the units of the First Brigade attended the Camp of Instruction held in Santa Cruz from June 14, to 23, 1901, when the entire National Guard assembled. In 1907, a new standard of military efficiency was introduced with the beginning of the joint army and militia coast defense exercises. Company H with the Seventh Infantry attended the first encampment held at the Presidio in San Francisco from July 4, to July 21, 1907. The unit also attended the army and militia Camp of Instruction held at Atascadero, from October 4 to 15, 1908.\*\*

The activities of Company H were many and varied including the accial as well as the military. On April 22, 1896, Company H and the other military units in the First Brigade marched in celebration of La Fiesta De Los Angeles, a street carnival held each year by the merchants of Los Angeles.

On April 23, 1893, the United States declared war with Spain.
Company H and the other companies of the Seventh Infantry entrained for San Francisco where they were mustered into Federal Service May 9, 1898, under the command of Colonel John R. Berry.
Company H did not engage in active service, doing only guard duty at the various military camps throughout the State.
Company H was mustered out of Federal Service December 2, 1898.
The State Legislature in 1899, enacted a law giving the companies and members of the National Guard, who volunteered in the United States Service during the Spanish-American Mar the privelege of

reporting back to duty in the Guard and receiving credit for continuous service. The Legislature stipulated, however, that they must report back to duty in the Guard within 150 days after being mustered out of United States Service. Company H was to return to duty in the Guard april 30, 1899, this they failed to do and the company was disbanded and mustered out of the service of the State July 5, 1899.

A new company was organized in Talbert, Orange County, December 8, 1900, and was designated Company H. Seventh Infantry.\*\*
The newly organized unit did not remain long in service. On August 4, 1904, General Order No. 9 was issued, which stated that Company H having failen below the standard of efficiency was disbanded and mustered out of the service of the State.\*\*
A new company was organized in Long Beach, December 31, 1904, and designated Company H. Seventh Infantry.\*

On the morning of April 18, 1906, there occurred a severe earthquake in San Francisco. Company H and the entire First Brigade entrained for Cakland, April 21, 1906. The troops arrived in Cakland, April twenty-second and the unit was stationed at Lincoln Fark, doing emergency duty until May twelfth when they entrained for Los Angeles.

There is no record of Company H participating in any unusual activities until the call by the President of the United States for California troops for Mexican Border Service was received by Governor Hiram Johnson, June 18, 1916. Company H as part of the Seventh Infantry was mustered into Federal Service June twenty-ninth and transferred to Mogales, Arizona where they remained on duty patrolling the border until October nineteenth when they returned to los angeles. Company H was mustered out of Federal Service November 11, 1910.

Four-months later, April 4, 1917, Company H was again mustered into Federal Service for duty during the World War. On October 14, 1917, Company H was redesignated Company D, 160th Infantry.
