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Activities

The Headquarters Company, 80th Brigade, was a new company in name only. On May 6, 1929, Headquarters Company, 79th Brigade, was redesignated Headquarters Company, 80th Brigade. William B. Zellar, Ist Lieut., was in command of the unit when it was redesignated and was transferred with the company to the 80th Brigade.

On December 1, 1929, Lieut. Zellar was transferred to the 160th Infantry Regiment and Malcolm C. Story, 1st Lieut. of the same regiment, became the commanding officer of Headquarters Company. Six months later Lieut. Story was commissioned Captain and continued in command of the unit until October 3, 1932, when he was transferred to the Mational Guard Reserve at his own request.

1st Lieut. Clyde R. Smith succeeded Captain Story as commanding officer of Headquarters Company, he having been transferred from the 160th Infantry Regiment October 3, 1932. Lieut. Smith served in lieu of Captain until July 6, 1933, when he was promoted to Captain, which rank he still holds.

Although Headquarters Company was allotted a 2nd Lieutenant, that position was vacant most of the time. On June 19, 1929, Orville L. Walters was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant, but resigned August 30, 1929, before he was Federally recognized.

Four years later Sheldon J. Barlow was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant and assigned to Headquarters Company. He was still holding that office at the close of 1938.

Activities

When Headquarters Company, 79th Brigade, was redesignated 80th Brigade, the alloted number of enlisted men (23) were enrolled. Three years alter, on May 14, 1932, the number of enlisted men in the company was increased to 28.

The annual encampments are usually very busy times for headquarter units. In 1954 Headquarters Company, 80th Brigade, was assigned the task of constructing a permanent communications system from Camp Headquarters to and including the Infantry area. The poles were all set, the cross arms were in place and wire was strung for the entire area during the first three days of camp, at which time that part of the system was ready to connect with the lower part which was not completed up to the time Headquarters Company left camp, so practically the only part of the system that was completed was done by Headquarters Company.

During the last week at camp eighteen men of Headquarters Company dismantled and stored the communication system of the entire reservation, and also assisted Colonel Dickson and Major Quigley in gathering and storing the miscellaneous equipment and material about the camp, in addition to following our their camp schedule. *

At the close of 1936, Headquarters Company, 80th Brigade, had established a fine record for attendance. For six years consecutively the unit had won an excellency streamer. This was believed to be the best record in the state, but if not the best, it was one of the best.

Another item that was also believed to constitute a record was the small number of first enlistments. Of the twenty-eight enlisted men, there were only nine who were in their first enlistment. **
The fact that Headquarters Company's enlisted men usually reinlisted at the expiration of their term, naturally increased the efficiency of the unit. The spirit and interest that impels the men to reenlist still lives in the personnel of Headquarters Company, 80th Brigade.
