OUTLINE HISTORY

The Second Separate Company, Coast Artillery, was organized and mustered in as a unit of the California National Guard, August 1, 1924. On August 28, 1924, the unit was inspected and accepted by the Federal Government. The Second Company was one of three units required to complete the 250th Regiment, Coast Artillery, as requested by the War Department. Herbert L. Winterrowd was appointed Captain and Ferris E. Pendergast was First Lieutenant of the new company. On August 30, 1924, the Second Separate Company was assigned to the 250th Coast Artillery for the purpose of administration. The Company was designated Headquarters Battery and Combat Train, Second Battalion, on November 1, 1924.
