## Activities:

The Third Separate Company, Coast Artillery, was organized in San Francisco and mustered in as a unit of the California National Guard, August 1, 1924. Reid W. Clarke was assigned to the unit as commanding officer and Arthur E. Lang as First Lieutenant. The Third Company was assigned to the 250th Coast Artillery, on August 30, 1924, for administrative purposes. The unit was in the service as a Separate Company about three months. The unit was redesignated Headquarters Battery and Combat Train, Third Battalion, 250th Coast Artillery, on November 1, 1924.
