Due to the fact that the membership of the Third Division of the Naval Militia, stationed at San Diego, exceeded the prescribed limit and that new applications were pouring in, it was decided to organize a new division there.* As a result the Tenth Division, composed of fifty-four men transferred from the Third Division and six newly enlisted men, was organized on the twenty-sixth of January 1916. The new Division was mustered into the service of the State by Ensign J. C. Hizar, Assistant Paymaster for the Naval Militia.

Routine duties occupied the attention of the new Division until August 5, 1916, when four officers and thirty-six men embarked at San Pedro on the U.S.S. "Oregon" for a cruise to Puget Sound and back. An inspection of the Division was held on board the U. S. S. "Oregon" November twentysixth, and on December seventeenth target practice on board the same ship was held off Catalina Island.** No further activities affecting the Tenth Division took place until April 6, 1917, when war was declared to exist between the United States and Germany. Upon request of the Secretary of the Navy, the commander-in-chief of the State forces ordered them to assemble at their armories and prepare for muster. Three officers and fifty-nine men of the Division were, on the fourteenth of April, enrolled as National Naval Volunteers, and the entire organization was subsequently mobilized on board the U. S. S. "Oregon" at Mare Island. ***

Officers and men were assigned to duty on board various war vessels and stations throughout the United States. It is quite probable that many officers and men of the Naval Militia entered the United States Naval Reserve Force after the World War, but no records confirming this surmise are available.
