## Activities

Under the National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, the State of California was authorised to organise and maintain one Battalion of Engineers. To meet this requirement, a Company known and designated as Company A. Corps of Engineers, was organized in Secremento, placed under command of Captain J. A. Ulvem, and mustered into State service, July 21, 1916.

On July 27, 1916, six days after the Company was organized a telegran was received from Major General A. L. Mills, Chief of the Militia Bureau, accepting the Company for Federal service on the Mexican Border and including it in the call of the President, dated June 18, 1916.

Company A, assembled at the State Mobilitaation Camp, State Fair Grounds, Sacramanto, and went into rigid training. Each man in the Company was instructed and exercised in the rudinents of hasty bridge construction and topographic sketching, as well as field geometry, range finding and the elements of railroad track construction.

On September 3, 1916, at about 9: P. M., a fire broke out in the Administration Building of the California State Fair. Company A, was immediately assembled under arms and petrolled to fire district and the gates to the fair Grounds until 7: A. M., September 4th.

On September 7th, Company A, constructed an exhibition single deck bridge, and participated in maneuvers on the Fair Grounds with the Fifth Infantry and a detachment from the Haval Training Station at Yerba Buena Island.

On September 20th, the Company margined for practice to the American River, making road sketch maps and inspecting a highway bridge.

On September 30th, they began to break camp preparatory to moving to the Mex-

On October 1, 1916, Company A, concluded breaking camp and entreined for Nogales, Arisons, where they arrived at 8:15 A. M., October 3rd.

Company A, did not participate in any actual engagements, doing only guard and patrol duty until the unit returned to Sacramento, where the Company was mustered out of Federal service, March 6, 1917.

On June 20, 1917, Company A, was again called in United States service for duty during the World War. The Company was officially mustered into the Federal service at Sacramento, July 9, 1917.
