Activities:

Fifty-five citizens signed the call for the formation of a military company and on July 19, 1864, the Mechanics Rifles of San Francisco was organized and H. S. Loveland elected Captain and George H. Wilder, First Lieutenant. On August 22, 1866, the unit decided to change the name of Mechanics Rifles to that of McKenzie Guard in honor of Brigadier-General McKenzie, commanding the Second Brigade.* This was merely a redesignation and the Mechanics Rifles was not mustered out of the service of the State. The Bond was approved and the company received their arms and supplies. They also received fifteen rifles, muskets, and accoutrements, complete, from the commanding officer of Company D, Liberty Guard by order of the Commander-in-Chief.

Aside from drills and parades of annual and special occasions there was no further activities recorded in which the Mechanics Rifles took part.

In a letter dated June 29, 1868, from J. W. McKenzie, Brigadier-General of the Second Brigade, to Adjutant General James W. Allen at Sacramento, the General stated that the company known as the McKenzie Guard, Company F, Second Infantry, was to be immediately disbanded, and that the arms and clothing in their possession be possessed and forwarded to Sacramento, for the following reasons: First, they had failed to comply with any of the requirements of the Military Law for the past three months. Secondly, they failed to have target practice as the law directed, but endeavored to have it on Sunday, and finally they paraded through San Francisco with but eighteen rank and file. The Brigadier-General further stated that the company was demoralized and a fraud upon the State. In compliance with the above recommendation the organization was discontinued and the McKenzie Guard, mustered out of the service of the State by First Lieutenant E. Irving Smith, Second Infantry, Second Brigade, July thirteenth of that year.
