Activities:

On February 9, 1864, a notice was posted that citizens of New Almaden, Santa Clara County, were intending to organize a volunteer military company to be known as the New Almaden Cavalry, Company K. This unit was organized and mustered into the service of the State of California, February 20, 1864, with Dr. George B. Tolman as Captain.

The town of New Almaden, was the location of the largest quick-silver mines in the world, a product indispensable to gold and silver mining.* It is assumed that it was to protect these mines from the Secessionists, during the Civil War, that the New Almaden Cavalry Company was organized. Incompleteness of the files prevents giving a complete and accurate history of this organization, but on September 29, 1866, the company was reorganized and the name changed to New Almaden Cavalry, Company G, the unit was then mustered back into service as part of the National Guard of California.
