#### Activities:

The <u>San Andreas Light Infantry</u>, San Andreas, Calaveras County, was organized November 2, 1862. The elected officers were James Gorman, Captain and P. A. Bardwell, First Lieutenant. A Bond was filed and the company received their arms soon after organization. The arms received were reported by Captain Barclay to General Kibbe as being "clumsy, unwielding weapons." In August 1863 an exchange of equipment was made, and the company received the more modern type of arms and the Minnie Muskets in the unit's possession were returned to the State.

Calaveras like its neighboring counties, had frequent Indian uprisings. Being a mining community it also had a transient population who were of a lawless nature, murdering and plundering as they roamed about.
