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Sept. 15, 11084). 9181 This company of cavalry was organized by Albert Brown, later elected Captain, on the call of Governor Downey for volunteers for United States service. Shortly before completing the work of recruiting, Mr. Brown wrote the Governor several letters and reported his progress. He was enthusiastic over the results and wrote under date of September 9, 1861, "that he would soon have a full number of men who were as good as any that could be Activition found in California." On September 20, 1861, the members met and proceeded to elect their officers by ballot. The command was elected as follows: Albert Brown, Captain; Alfred H. Haus, First Lieutenant and John Quinn, Second Lieutenant. The company ballotted for the officers next in line, and then it was resolved that the election of a Saddler, a Farrier and a Trumpeter be dispensed with until the company arrived in San Francisco.

Immediately after the organization was completed the unit offered its services to the Governor. The corps was accepted and mustered into the service of the United States and designated as Company L, Second Regiment of Cavalry, California Volunteers.
