## Activities:

The Sarsfield Grenadier Guard was organized in Sacramento as a company of Infantry and mustered in as an unattached unit of the National Guard of California on the twenty-ninth of July, 1870 in compliance with Special Order No. 26, dated July 20, 1870.\*

This company, named after the famous Irish General, Patrick Sars-field, who was a commanding officer in the English Army during the reign of Charles II in the seventeenth Century, was composed of young men of Irish extraction and immediately became .000.

an active unit in drill and target practice and developed into one of the most efficient companies in the Fourth Brigade. On the nineteenth of February 1872, pursuant to Special Order No. 7 of that year the company was attached to the Fourth Regiment of Infantry, Fourth Brigade and designated as Company G.\* The corps was among those chosen to act as military escort at the inauguration of the Governor-elect in January 1872. In July 1873, the members of the company obtained new new uniforms at a cost of \$25.00 each and caps for \$5.00 each. Both uniforms and caps were of regulation design.

From 1873 to 1877 this enterprising company participated in many public parades, attended all military Encampments held during that period, and maintained an active interest in drill and target practice. On March 31, 1877, Special Order No. 5 disbanding the Fourth Infantry Regiment was issued and the Sarsfield Grenadier Guard, was attached to the First Infantry Battalion, Fourth Brigade, National Guard of California.\*\* Nothing of especial importance took place from 1877 to 1880. The company continued to be active and took a prominent part in parades and Encampments.

On March 19, 1880, upon the recommendation of Brigadier-General Sheehan commanding the Fourth Brigade, the <u>Sarsfield Grenadier</u> Guard together with certain other companies of the Fourth Brigade were formed into a regiment to be known as the First Artillery Regiment, Fourth Brigade, National Guard of California.\*\*\*
