## Activities:

On September 30, 1869, several citizens residing in the city and county of San Francisco, who had served in the Army or Navy of the United States during the Mexican War were desirous of forming a military company in conformity with the Military Law of California. They, therefore, asked that James M. Allen the Adjutant General appoint some suitable person to superintend the meeting to organize and enroll the company into the service of the National Guard of California. The petition of the associed Veterans of the Mexican War, was approved by Adjutant General James M. Allen, and the organization was to be mustered immediately into the State service.\*

On February 17, 1870, in the city and county of San Francisco, the Veterans of the Mexican War, Company A (Foot Artillery) was sworn into the service of the State, under the command of Captain Daniel Hungerford, formerly Captain of the Sierra Guard and later Major of the Sierra Battalion. This company was composed of seventy-five men all of whom had served in the Mexican War, also many of them including Captain Hungerford were veterans of the Civil War. The company on April fifth of the same year posted a \$1,000 penal Bond for their equipment, and although they were an unattached foot Artillery company of the Second Brigade, the Adjutant General issued them Infantry equipment.

Unfortunately this company had only a brief existence in the National Guard of California. The Military Law passed by the State Legilature of 1872, reduced the military companies in the State to forty in all. The Board of Location and Organization

had the power to reorganize or disband companies throughout
the State with a reference to the military needs.\* In accordance with the decision of the Board, and in order to carry
into effect the requirements of the Law as embodied in paragraph three, title one of the Political Code, General Order
No. 7 was issued and the Veterans of the Mexican War, Company A,
was honorably mustered out of the service of the State June 1,
1872.\*\*
