REPORT.

ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S OFFICE,
SACRAMENTO, CAL., September 1, 1900.

HON. HENRY T. GAGE, *Governor and Commander-in-Chief*:

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith the report of this department, as required by law, for the two years ending June 30, 1900, with accompanying statistics and data showing the condition of the National Guard of California.

In consequence of the "Spanish-American War of 1898," the National Guard was practically disorganized, the State furnishing for the U. S. Volunteer service four regiments of infantry—the First, Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth; one battalion of heavy artillery, consisting of Batteries A, B, C, and D; detachments from the Naval Militia, the Signal Corps, and the Sanitary Corps—numbering in the aggregate 5,771 officers and men.

During the absence of these troops no new companies were organized to take their places, consequently, at the beginning of your administration the Guard consisted of but a nucleus of its authorized strength, numbering, with the general officers, staff officers, and the Naval Militia, about 1,200 officers and men, scattered throughout the State.

On June 30, 1900, the organized strength of the Guard, as shown by the reports on file in the Adjutant-General's office, consisted of four troops of cavalry, fifty companies of infantry, three signal corps, and seven divisions of the Naval Militia, aggregating, with the general officers and staff officers, 4,002 officers and men.

This force is organized into one division (commanded by Major-General John H. Dickinson), and three brigades—the First commanded by Brigadier-General C. F. A. Last, the Second by Brigadier-General R. H. Warfield, and the Third by Brigadier-General M. W. Muller.

The Naval Militia, numbering 425 officers and men, is organized into one battalion, commanded by Captain N. T. James.

There are also 268 officers on the "Retired List."

THE WAR WITH SPAIN.

In the Spanish-American war the California Volunteers were mustered into the U. S. Volunteer service prior to the beginning of your administration, but as most of them were mustered out after the first of Janu-

ary, 1899, I have compiled a brief record of their service for this report, as a part of the military history of the State. All of the troops mustered into the United States service from this State did not have the opportunity of going to the front, but wherever duty called them they responded cheerfully to the orders of those in authority, and it was no fault of theirs that they did not all see active service.

The war drew from the National Guard forty-three of the forty-nine companies of infantry, detachments from the Signal Corps, the Sanitary Corps, and the Naval Militia, and, in addition thereto, the State furnished four batteries of heavy artillery, which absorbed one troop of State cavalry.

These troops entered the Volunteer service of the United States on dates varying from May 6, 1898, to July 9, 1898, and continued therein until they were mustered out on dates varying from December 2, 1898, to September 21, 1899, as will more fully appear from the following brief statement of the service of each organization:

FIRST CALIFORNIA U. S. VOLUNTEER INFANTRY.

This regiment was mustered in at San Francisco May 6, 1898, under the President's call for 125,000 volunteers made on April 23, 1898, and went into camp 1,032 strong, at the Presidio, May 7th. The regiment embarked with the first expedition to the Philippines, under the command of Colonel James F. Smith, sailing from San Francisco on the U. S. transport "City of Pekin" May 25th, convoyed by the U. S. S. "Charleston." This was the advance guard of the first army to sail from our shores to engage in a foreign war. The regiment arrived at Cavite, Island of Luzon, June 30th, and disembarked July 3d. Established Camp Dewey at Tambo, near Manila, July 15th. Took part in the battle of Malate trenches on July 31st and August 1st, and in the assault and capture of Manila August 13th. In barracks at Manila, doing guard and patrol duty there, and at Paco, Malacanan, and Pandacan, from the fall of Manila to the 1st of February, 1899. Took part in the campaign against the Filipinos from February 5th to March 21st. A battalion of the regiment, comprising Companies A, B, E, and H, sailed for the Island of Negros March 1st, and were afterward joined by the remaining companies of the regiment at that place. On the 16th of July the regiment embarked at the Island of Negros, on the transport "Sherman," en route for home, arriving at Manila July 18th, leaving Manila via Nagasaki and Yokohama, reaching San Francisco August 23d, disembarking and encamping at the Presidio August 25th, where the regiment was mustered out of the United States service September 21, 1899, after more than sixteen months of active service.

The losses of this regiment were as follows: Killed in action, 8; died of wounds, 2; died of disease, 24; killed by accident, 2; drowned, 1; wounded, 48.

FIRST BATTALION CALIFORNIA U. S. VOLUNTEER HEAVY ARTILLERY.

There was no artillery in the National Guard at the outbreak of the war with Spain. Three of the four batteries comprising the First Battalion of Heavy Artillery were taken from without the National Guard organization, Battery C from Sacramento, formerly Troop B of the Cavalry, being the only National Guard organization in the Battalion. Batteries A and B, together with the field and staff, were mustered into the United States service May 9, 1898, under command of Major Frank S. Rice; Batteries C and D were mustered in on May 10, 1898, at San Francisco; making an aggregate effective force in the Battalion of 603 officers and men. After muster-in, the Battalion was transferred to the Presidio. Headquarters and Batteries A and D were attached to the expeditionary forces (Special Orders No. 53, Headquarters Department of California, May 22, 1898). The two Batteries and Headquarters assigned to the expeditionary forces were held in camp at Presidio during the summer and fall of 1898, and sent to the Philippines in detachments, the first leaving May 24th, and the last November 6, 1898. Battery B was transferred to Fort Baker on June 7th, where it remained until December 5, 1898, when it was assigned to Angel Island, remaining in barracks until mustered out on January 30, 1899. Battery C, on June 5, 1898, was assigned to duty at Fort Canby, Washington, where it remained performing ordinary garrison duty until mustered out February 3, 1899.

The Philippine command was united at Cavite, where it performed garrison duty until February 9, 1899, when it joined in the advance on San Roque and Caridad. It performed outpost duty until June 28, 1899, beyond San Roque, when relieved. On July 27, 1899, the command left the Philippines on the U. S. transport "Sherman" for San Francisco, where it disembarked August 25th, went into camp at the Presidio, and was mustered out of the United States service September 21, 1899.

The losses of the battalion were as follows: Died of disease, 6; wounded 2.

SIXTH CALIFORNIA U. S. VOLUNTEER INFANTRY.

This regiment, consisting of eight companies of the National Guard of California, was mustered into the United States service at San Francisco, 672 strong, on May 11, 1898, under command of Lieutenant-Colonel William R. Johnson. Seven of these companies were from the San Joaquin Valley and one from Sacramento. The regiment went into camp at the Presidio until June 14, 1898, when Headquarters and Companies C and G were ordered to take station at Benicia Barracks. On June 10th, Company F went into camp at Santa Cruz, guarding the California Powder Works. On June 9th, Company A went on duty at Alcatraz

Island, the other companies going to Fort Point, San Francisco. The entire regiment was concentrated at Fort Point, September 10th, and on October 11th was furloughed for one month, and mustered out of the service December 15, 1898, at that point.

This regiment lost 3 men by disease and 1 by suicide.

SEVENTH CALIFORNIA U. S. VOLUNTEER INFANTRY.

All of the Seventh came from the southern part of the State, and were a part of the National Guard. The regiment rendezvoused at Los Angeles, and was ordered to San Francisco on May 6th, where it was mustered into the United States service at the Presidio, May 9, 1898, 1,028 strong, under the command of Colonel John R. Berry. It was ordered to Camp Merritt, San Francisco, May 25th, and returned to Camp Merriam at the Presidio, August 24th, where it remained until October 13th; then ordered to Los Angeles, where it arrived on the 14th and was furloughed until November 12th, when the regiment reassembled and reported for duty at Los Angeles and established Camp Pratt, where it was mustered out December 2, 1898.

It was a great disappointment to the regiment, which was composed of splendid material and commanded by competent officers, that they did not get to the front and see active service.

This regiment lost 20 men by disease.

EIGHTH CALIFORNIA U. S. VOLUNTEER INFANTRY.

This regiment, except one company, was made up of companies from the Second and Fifth Infantry, National Guard regiments, and was mustered into the United States service under the second call of the President, made on May 25, 1898, between July 6 and 9, 1898, 1,281 strong, at Camp Barrett, Oakland, under command of Colonel Park Henshaw. The regiment remained at this point until September 10th, when the field, staff, band, and Companies A, F, K, and L took station at Benicia Barracks; Companies B, C, and E took station at the Presidio; Company M took station at Alcatraz Island; all in obedience to Special Orders No. 130, Department of California, dated September 6, 1898.

In compliance with Special Orders No. 133, Department of California, dated September 13, 1898, Companies D, G, H, and I proceeded to Vancouver Barracks, Washington.

The battalions remained at these several posts until final muster-out, except Companies F and L, which were sent to Angel Island December 22, 1898. The regiment was mustered out between January 28 and February 6, 1899.

This regiment lost 7 men by disease, 1 by suicide, and 1 by homicide.

CALIFORNIA NAVAL MILITIA.

The part taken by the Naval Militia during the Spanish-American War consisted principally in manning some of the converted tugs, such as the "Iroquois," the "Vigilant," and the "Active," doing patrol duty along the coast of the State. In addition to this service, a few officers and some of the men were engaged, and are still, in the United States transport service. From the Naval Militia of this State there were 13 officers and 82 enlisted men mustered into the auxiliary navy of the United States in 1898.

THE SIGNAL CORPS IN U. S. VOLUNTEER SERVICE.

The corps, as an organization, did not enter the U. S. Volunteer service; men were, however, enlisted therefrom as follows:

The First Brigade Signal Corps furnished one commissioned, three non-commissioned officers, and one private for the Spanish-American War.

The Second Brigade Signal Corps furnished one commissioned and seven non-commissioned officers.

The Third Brigade Signal Corps furnished one commissioned and five non-commissioned officers and one private.

Most of these officers and men saw service in the Philippine Islands, acquitting themselves with great credit; and it is to be regretted that the records of the services of these men are not more full and complete.

THE SANITARY CORPS IN U. S. VOLUNTEER SERVICE.

The corps as an organization was not mustered into the U. S. Volunteer service; the officers to the number of eleven being commissioned as surgeons and assistant surgeons of the various regiments, and the enlisted men to the number of sixty-two, either enlisting in companies and being transferred to the Hospital Corps, U. S. Army, or directly into that corps. The members of the corps did excellent service and reflected great credit on the organization, and, as in the case of the Signal Corps, it is unfortunate that the record of their service on file in this office is not more complete.

The total number of Volunteers entering the United States service from this State during the Spanish-American War was 5,771 officers and men. Other thousands offered their services, demonstrating in this practical way the patriotism of California.

RETURN OF U. S. VOLUNTEERS TO THE NATIONAL GUARD.

In recognition of the patriotism and sacrifices made by the members of the National Guard of this State who volunteered and entered the service of the United States in the "Spanish-American War of 1898," the thirty-third Legislature passed a law giving to the companies and members of the National Guard who were mustered into the service of the United States and subsequently discharged therefrom, the privilege of reporting back and returning to duty in the National Guard with full credit for continuous service from the time they were mustered into the United States service until they reported back for duty in the Guard, provided that they so reported within one hundred and fifty days after being mustered out of the United States service. Under this Act, forty companies have reported for duty. Three companies—"E" of the Seventh, located at Santa Paula; "H" of the Seventh, located at Ventura; and "H" of the Second, located at Redding—having failed to comply with the requirements of the law, were mustered out of the service of the State and disbanded.

REORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The work of reorganizing, re-equipping, and re-uniforming the National Guard was attended with some unforeseen delays, and in some respects has been very trying to the officers and all those connected with it. The men in some instances were slow to take advantage of the Act of the Legislature, not fully appreciating the privileges of continuous service which it conferred; but there were instances of alacrity shown, indicating that a majority of the officers and men appreciated the benefits conferred by the law and the patriotic motives of those who inspired it.

NEW COMPANIES MUSTERED IN.

Upon the application of the citizens of their respective localities, and upon the approval of the Board of Location and Organization, N. G. C., the following companies have been mustered into the service of the State since the beginning of your administration:

This Department has made repeated efforts to obtain from the United States Government modern arms and equipment in exchange for stores still due the State on account of stores turned over to California Volunteers, but the law is so worded that only exchange in kind can be made, and at present we have sufficient stores of the kinds remaining to the State's credit to fully equip the Guard. There are still stores due the State on this account to the value of \$5,736.96. Efforts have also been made toward securing the United States magazine carbine, cal. .30, from the regular appropriation, for the cavalry of the Guard, which is practically without carbines; but the War Department has steadily refused to issue any magazine arms to the various States, although the Chief of Ordnance, in a recent communication, stated that he hoped to be able to recommend such an issue in the near future.

INCREASED CONGRESSIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR ARMING AND EQUIPPING THE MILITIA OF THE SEVERAL STATES.

The appropriation by the United States Government for "arming and equipping the militia of the several States" was fixed in 1808 at \$200,000,—when the United States was composed of seventeen States, with a population of 7,000,000,—and was subsequently increased to \$400,000.

In view of the increased population, the additional number of men liable to military duty, the military activity incident to the acquisition of distant territory, and the consequent liability of more frequent foreign complications following upon our changed conditions, it became apparent to those who had given the matter any thought that an increased appropriation by the National Government was necessary in order to meet these conditions, and procure modern arms and improved equipment to put the National Guard of the several States upon a military footing, making it a well-organized, well-equipped, and an effective force, fit at all times for service at home or abroad.

The Adjutant-General, in coöperation with the Interstate National Guard Association and the Adjutant-Generals of the several States, assisted in securing the passage of a bill through Congress increasing the national appropriation from \$400,000 to \$1,000,000. This increase will raise the allowance from the United States Government to the State of California for National Guard purposes from \$7,763.51 to \$19,408.78.

This amount, with the State appropriation, will enable the Adjutant-General to greatly improve the equipment and efficiency of the National Guard of this State.

Much credit is due in this connection to Colonel C. E. Bleyer, secretary, and Lieutenant-Colonel E. J. Dimmick, assistant secretary, of the Interstate National Guard Association, and to Honorable B. F. Marsh, M.C., chairman of the Committee on Militia in the lower house of Congress, for their untiring labors in behalf of the bill increasing the appropriation.

BOARD OF SURVEY, 1900.

At the outbreak of the "Spanish-American War of 1898," the State turned over to the General Government, to aid in equipping the California Volunteers, nearly all of the serviceable arms and equipment in the possession of the National Guard. There was left at the company and regimental armories a large quantity of unserviceable arms, obsolete equipment, and old and worn-out uniforms, the accumulation of years, which the company commanders were carrying on their property returns and for which they were responsible to the State. On January 29, 1900, boards of survey and inspectors for each brigade were appointed to inspect and pass upon the loss of property and to eliminate and destroy all material belonging to the State that had become unserviceable, worn-out, and unfit for further use. The obsolete and unserviceable ordnance stores were shipped to Sacramento, inventoried, and, under an authorization from the Chief of Ordnance, United States Army, dated May 19, 1900, turned in to the United States Arsenal at Benicia, and credited to the State. At the conclusion of this survey and inspection, all arms and equipments left in the hands of the National Guard had been carefully inspected and inventoried by competent inspectors detailed from the office of the Adjutant-General, and only such of it left charged to company commanders as was found to be serviceable and fit for use. This was a much-needed work. It relieves the company commanders of a large number of condemned rifles that were useless and dangerous, if occasion arose for their use, and eliminates from the company assets much useless, worn-out, and utterly worthless property that these officers were carrying on their returns and for which they were held responsible.

THE UNIFORM BOARD.

The war with Spain practically stripped the National Guard of its serviceable equipment, including uniforms. It therefore became necessary to devise ways and means to re-uniform and re-equip the Guard after it reported back for duty in the State. This was in a measure provided for by the thirty-third Legislature, which passed a bill appropriating \$50,000 for uniforms and quartermaster's stores. Under this

appropriation, and as provided by law, a uniform board was appointed by your Excellency on July 5, 1899 (General Orders No. 7), composed of Major-General John H. Dickinson, Colonel A. D. Cutler, retired, and Lieutenant-Colonel J. G. Giesting, Assistant Adjutant-General, Second Brigade, to purchase the necessary uniforms and quartermasters' stores to the extent of the appropriation made for that purpose. When this board completes its work and the requisitions are filled which have been made on the Quartermaster's and Ordnance Departments at Washington, the National Guard of this State will be fully equipped with new uniforms and with the most modern Springfield rifles, cal. .45, and the other equipments will be the best ever placed in the hands of the Guard, including tentage, blankets, and modern field ranges. Many of the companies have supplied themselves with khaki uniforms, paying for them out of accumulated company funds. All of the companies should have this uniform.

For a detailed statement of the work of this Board, see Appendix No. 17.

NAVAL MILITIA.

The Honorable Secretary of the Navy having on June 21, 1899, tendered the U. S. S. "Badger," Captain James M. Miller, U. S. Navy, commanding, for a practice cruise of the Naval Militia of the State, the offer was accepted.

In the matter of attendance on this cruise, California was exceeded in number by New York, Massachusetts, and Illinois only. Out of a membership on January 1, 1899, of 523 officers and men, 274 participated in this cruise, or over fifty-two per cent.

This, taking into consideration the uncertainty of the exact date upon which they were to embark, thereby precluding some of the men from making the necessary arrangements for leaving their business, was a very creditable showing. The officers and men of the different organizations were highly commended by the officers of the "Badger" for their strict attention to duty while on board that ship. The thanks of this Department are due to Captain Miller; Lieutenant-Commander John B. Milton, the executive officer; Lieutenant Thomas D. Griffin, navigating officer; as well as to the other officers of the "Badger," for their painstaking instruction of the officers and men of the Naval Militia.

The cost of the cruise to the State was \$1,293.05 for subsistence.

For a detailed report of the cruise of the "Badger," reference is made to the Navy Department's Report of the Operations of the Naval Militia for the year 1899, and the voluminous report of Lieutenant-Commander Thomas A. Nerney—who was at that time in command of the Naval Militia—extracts from which reports are submitted herewith.

The U. S. S. "Marion" (3d rate), loaned to the State for the use of the Naval Militia, is located at San Francisco, and Headquarters and First, Second, and Engineer Divisions are quartered thereon. This ship has been placed in condition for short cruises, at considerable expense to the State. (See Appendix No. 2.)

The U. S. S. "Pinta" (4th rate), also loaned to the State, is located at San Diego, and the Third Division is quartered on board.

SANITARY CORPS.

The Sanitary Corps has not yet been thoroughly reorganized, but it is expected that the work will be completed in the near future and the rolls cleared of the names of many of the enlisted men who are no longer available for duty.

The equipment taken into the U. S. Volunteer service has been replaced with new, of similar pattern, sufficient for ordinary field service or camps of instruction.

The field chests, litters, and orderly pouches with which the corps is equipped are manufactured from designs made by officers of the corps, and their adaptability and durability for active field service was thoroughly demonstrated in the Philippines.

In a report to the Surgeon-General, U. S. A., Colonel Middleton, Chief Surgeon, Department of California, U. S. A., made special mention of the equipment furnished the California Volunteers by the State.

INSPECTIONS.

An inspection of the Guard was held in June, 1899, in order to comply with Section 1970 of the Political Code, but owing to the fact that most of the companies had just reported for duty under the Act of March 21, 1899, and were without uniforms and equipments, the inspection reports are of little value, and are therefore not submitted with this report.

The Attorney-General having held that the provision of Section 1970 of the Political Code, relating to the time of the annual inspection and muster of the Guard is directory and not mandatory, it was deemed expedient to postpone the inspection of 1900 until the latter part of the year.

CAMP SITE.

Under the provisions of the Act of the Legislature, approved March 4, 1899, a camp of instruction for the National Guard of California was established at or near the City of Santa Cruz, and a commission consisting of the Adjutant-General, Major-General, and senior Brigadier-General, was appointed for the purpose of selecting a suitable site for said camp of instruction.

The commission has made its report, accepting a tract of land containing about 130 acres, known as "De Laveaga Heights," which has been approved by your Excellency, and the necessary papers for the transfer of the property to the State are now being prepared.

UNIVERSITY CADETS.

From the report of Professor Frank Soulé, Acting Professor of Military Science and Tactics, under date of April 24, 1900, the following facts concerning this organization are obtained:

The corps is organized into one regiment of infantry, consisting of two battalions of four companies each, one signal detachment and one artillery company. The regiment and detachments are drilled during the academic year for two hours per week; the senior and junior classes also attend a military lecture during one hour each week.

The corps is inspected once in each year by a United States inspector, who makes a report upon the condition of the same to the Secretary of War.

The total number of cadets drilling at date of report, 569; total number of drills during the year 1899-1900, 42; number of ceremonies, 16.

The discipline and efficiency are good.

First Lieutenant Henry De H. Waite, retired, has recently been detailed for duty at the University by the War Department, and his experience and ability as a soldier will no doubt add greatly to the efficiency of the corps.

ARMORY RENTS AND OTHER CLAIMS GROWING OUT OF THE "SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR OF 1898."

(See Act of the Legislature, approved March 8, 1899, Chapter LXV, Statutes of 1899.)

This was an Act providing for the payment of the armory rents, care of armories, etc., of the companies of the National Guard while they were absent during the war with Spain. Under this Act there were filed up to July 10, 1900, 238 claims, aggregating in amount the sum of \$49,544.47.

THE RETURNING VOLUNTEERS AND VISITING OFFICIALS.

The most interesting historical event occurring in this State during the last fiscal year was the return from the Philippine Islands and muster-out in San Francisco of 12,346 U. S. Volunteers. This brought to the State many distinguished people, including Governors or other high officials, United States Senators, Members of the lower house of Congress, committees of prominent citizens and patriotic women, following each other in rapid succession, from Oregon, Nebraska, Utah, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Wyoming, North Dakota, Idaho, South Dakota, Montana, Minnesota, Kansas, Washington, Iowa, Nevada, and Tennessee.

The first official party to arrive were the Oregonians early in July, and the last to depart from the State were the Tennesseans, who left for their homes on November 23, 1899. Within this time the Governor of Illinois, and the Honorable Secretary of Agriculture also visited the State and were entertained by your representatives.

Acting under your instructions, the Adjutant-General, ably assisted by members of your staff, extended such courtesies as the circumstances and conditions would permit, to these distinguished visitors, many of

whom have since expressed by letter and through the public press their appreciation of the courtesies and attention shown them while in California.

The event of greatest interest, however, to the people of California, was the return from the Philippines and reception of the First California U. S. Volunteer Infantry, the First Battalion of California Heavy Artillery, and the Signal Corps detachment.

As the transport came in through the Golden Gate, his Excellency the Governor was the first to go on board and greet our returning Volunteers, remaining with them until the ship reached her anchorage. The next day, when they landed at the Government dock, his patriotic words of welcome and commendation, in the name of California, found response in every heart.

The greatest ovation ever seen in the West was given the California troops when they arrived in San Francisco, and the enthusiasm with which they were received all along the line of march, from the place of landing to the Presidio, has now become a part of the history of the National Guard of California. It was estimated that more than 100,000 people poured into the city from all parts of the State to do honor to our citizen soldiers, home from foreign service.

The City of San Francisco raised by private subscription the munificent sum of \$60,000, more particularly for the purpose of assisting in the reception and entertainment of the California Volunteers upon their return to this State, but as no part of this fund could be drawn upon, on behalf of the State, or for the entertainment of visitors from other States, and as there was no other fund available for that purpose, the Adjutant-General and the members of the Staff who assisted at these functions found themselves much hampered in consequence; but we have reason to believe that the reputation of the State for hospitality did not suffer on that account.

OFFICE BUSINESS.

The correspondence in this department has been enormously increased incident to the reorganization of the Guard, the adjustment of claims against the United States growing out of the Spanish-American War, and the work incident to the appointment of the Board of Survey and Inspection, in addition to the ordinary routine work of the office.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I would respectfully make the following recommendations:

First—That a law be passed providing that all members of the National Guard of California who served in the U. S. Volunteers, or in the U. S. Army or Navy, during the Spanish-American War, or the insurrection in the Philippine Islands, and who, within one hundred and fifty days from the date of their honorable discharge therefrom, either reported for duty under the Act of March 21, 1899, Statutes of California, or entered the National Guard of California by enlistment or commission, shall be granted continuous service for any and all purposes regarding privileges and exemptions provided by law for members of the National Guard of California; provided, that an officer shall not have credit for continuous service as an officer unless he re-enters the National Guard of California in the capacity of an officer; and, also, that the men who entered the U. S. Volunteer service in any of the Volunteer organizations of this State under the calls of the President dated April 23 and May 25, 1898, and who were not at the time they entered such service members of the National Guard of California, and who, within one hundred and fifty days from the date of their honorable discharge therefrom, entered the National Guard of California by enlistment or commission, shall be granted continuous service for any and all purposes regarding privileges and exemptions provided by law for members of the National Guard of California from the time they entered said U. S. Volunteer service; provided, that an officer shall not have credit for continuous service as an officer, unless he was an officer in said U. S. Volunteer service and enters the National Guard of California as an officer as above provided.

Second—That a law be passed providing that those officers on the "Retired List," National Guard of California, who entered the U. S. Army for service in the Philippines be again placed upon the "Retired List" upon their application therefor after their discharge from said United States service; the Attorney-General having held, in an opinion dated October 18, 1899, that such officers lost their position on the "Retired List" upon entering the United States service. Also, that those officers of the Guard on the "Active List," who entered said United States service, be placed upon the "Retired List" upon their application therefor, after their discharge from said service, with the rank

held by them in the Guard at the time of their acceptance of a commission in the U. S. Army, provided they^s shall have had eight years' continuous service, or ten years not continuous, including both service in the Guard and U. S. Army.

Third—That a sufficient appropriation be made to compile and print 5,000 copies of a history and record of the California Volunteers in the Spanish-American War.

Fourth—That an appropriation be made to pay the claims of Companies B and D, Second Infantry, National Guard of California, for services in 1897. On August 26th and 27th, 1897, upon the call of the Sheriff of Colusa County, Companies B and D, Second Infantry, were ordered out by the Major-General, N. G. C., to suppress a threatened lynching of Pedor Vinally for attempted murder of Florine Poirier at Colusa, Cal. The Attorney-General of California having held, in an opinion dated March 30, 1898, that Section 2040 of the Political Code, relating to the pay of officers and men when performing duty in response to any call as provided by law, failed to make an appropriation for payment in this case, and as the last Legislature failed to make an appropriation for such payment, the said two companies could not be paid. The claims, covering pay, transportation, and subsistence, aggregate \$455.37.

Fifth—A revision, codification, and publication of the laws and "Rules and Regulations" governing the National Guard. Both the laws and the "Rules and Regulations" are in some respects contradictory, in others ambiguous and confusing, and in some cases obsolete and useless.

Sixth—The organization of a machine-gun battery, to be attached to each one of the three brigades.

Seventh—That an appropriation for encampments be made, sufficiently large so that the Guard can be put into camp for at least eight days each year.

Eighth—That an emergency fund be established to be used for the pay, travel, and subsistence of the Guard when ordered out in case of war, insurrection, rebellion, or resistance to the execution of the laws of the State, or for any other necessary purpose; said fund also to be available for the expense of troops ordered out as escort to deceased officers or State officials entitled to military honors. Expenditures from this fund only to be made under direct authorization of the Governor.

Ninth—That a State arsenal be built at Sacramento for the storage and safekeeping of the military stores and supplies belonging to the State,

and to the United States, for which the State is responsible. The accommodations for keeping these stores are totally inadequate, and result in more or less loss by deterioration every year. Under the present conditions, these stores, to the value of many thousands of dollars, are scattered about and kept in unsuitable and unsafe places.

That a military storekeeper and State armorer be appointed for the care, custody, and the proper keeping of the military stores at the State arsenal, at a monthly salary of sixty dollars (\$60.00).

Tenth—That an appropriation be made of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per month for rent and other expenses for each detachment of the Sanitary Corps on duty with each of the five regiments of infantry, N. G. C.

I. (a) In cases where commissions issued by the Governor bear the same date, the seniority in rank of officers in the California U. S. Volunteers will be fixed in accordance with former service in the National Guard of this State. (Approved May 25, 1898.)

(b) While in the United States service, commanding officers of the California Regiments and Battalions are requested to forward regularly to this office a copy of the monthly returns and a copy of all muster-in rolls of detachments, also a copy of the muster-out roll. This should not be neglected, as the interests of the officers and men are closely connected therewith.

Second Call, California Volunteers.

II. In accordance with a request made by the President of the United States upon the Governor of this State, given at Washington, D. C., June 18, 1898, calling for a Regiment of California Volunteers, the companies of the National Guard, as named below, have been designated to form such regiment.

Company commanders will report to Captain C. H. Murray, U. S. Mustering Officer, at the City of Oakland, on the dates designated below, with such men of their command as have been enrolled for the U. S. Volunteer service, and have passed a preliminary physical examination.

Both of these officers rose to places of prominence in the National Guard.

Captain Reinhold Richter, commanding Company I, First Infantry, was mortally wounded August 1, 1898, in a night attack at Malate, Philippine Islands, and died August 4, 1898, regretted by all of his acquaintances. Captain Richter was an officer of sterling character, and died the most glorious of all deaths—that of a soldier on the field of battle, in the full discharge of his duty.

VI. The Sixth and Seventh Infantry, California Volunteers, having been mustered out of the service of the United States, on December 15th and December 2d, 1898, respectively, the commanding officers thereof, and the company commanders of the National Guard of California companies thereof, will assume charge of their armories and report for duty in the National Guard as and from the dates of their muster out of the United States Volunteer service above stated.

Those officers and enlisted men, members of the National Guard of said regiments (including Company E, Second Infantry, which was known as Company F, Sixth California Volunteer Infantry), who did not enter the service of the United States, will be permitted to serve out their present time in the Guard, unless their relations therewith are sooner severed, either by resignations or discharges.

Those members of the Volunteer forces who did not belong to the Guard at the outbreak of the "Spanish-American War" can become members thereof only by taking the regular oaths of enlistment, and in recruiting the companies, commanding officers should give the preference, when desired, to those Volunteers who entered the United States service.

I. The following Acts of the Legislature are published for the information of all concerned:

CHAPTER LV.

An Act to establish a camp of instruction for the National Guard of the State of California, and to authorize the acquisition, by donation, of a site for the same.

[Approved March 4, 1899.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby established, at or near the City of Santa Cruz, County of Santa Cruz, State of California, a camp of instruction for the National Guard of California.

SEC. 2. The Adjutant-General, Major-General, and the senior Brigadier-General of the National Guard of the State of California, are hereby appointed commissioners for the purpose of selecting a suitable site for said camp of instruction, at or near said City of Santa Cruz. They shall, within ninety days after the passage of this Act, examine the different tracts of land offered by the City of Santa Cruz and the County of Santa Cruz, or the citizens thereof, for the location of said camp of instruction, and shall select therefrom, if in their judgment practicable, a suitable site for said camp of instruction.

SEC. 3. After the selection of said site by the commissioners named in the preceding section, and their action meeting the approval of the Governor, the said commissioners shall have the power to procure by donation the site so selected for said camp of instruction. The deed or deeds therefor shall be duly executed to the people of the State of California and delivered to the Controller, after examination and approval by the Attorney-General.

SEC. 4. Said camp of instruction shall be known as and called the State Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of California.

SEC. 5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER LXV.

An Act to ascertain and pay armory rents, armorers' wages, and other expenses arising out of the mustering in of portions of the National Guard and Naval Militia into the United States Volunteer service; also, the expenses incurred in reorganizing the National Guard and to result therefrom; and making an appropriation to pay the same.

[Approved March 8, 1899.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Governor is hereby authorized and empowered to detail one or more officers of the National Guard, as he may deem necessary, to ascertain and determine what, if any, rents for armories, wages of armorers, and any other proper expenses should be paid in consequence of the mustering in of any of the National Guard or Naval Militia, who were mustered into the United States Volunteer service during the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, and also the claims existing or which may have arisen, or which may arise by reason of the said National Guard and Naval Militia having been so mustered in, and also any and all proper charges and expenses against the State on account of the companies, or any of them, which were so mustered in, and by reason of the use of armories for the care and custody of the property left therein, and any proper expenses which have been incurred, or which may be incurred, in the reorganization of said Guard.

SEC. 2. Any officer or officers so detailed shall have and receive the same pay and allowances as an officer of like rank in the United States Army for the time actually employed, together with reasonable traveling expenses.

SEC. 3. Any and all claims so adjusted by said appointed officers shall be transmitted through regular military channels to the Governor, who shall submit the same to the Board of Military Auditors, and, if approved by it, the Controller is directed to draw his warrant in favor of the respective parties, to whom or in whose favor the claims have been allowed, and also his warrant for the pay and expenses of such detailed officer or officers, and for the amounts thereof, and the Treasurer is directed to pay the same.

SEC. 4. The unexpended balance of the appropriation for "armory rents and other expenses, N. G. C.," for the forty-ninth and fiftieth fiscal years, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for the purposes of this Act.

SEC. 5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER CXII.

An Act providing that all encampments of the National Guard shall be held at the State Camp of Instruction, unless otherwise ordered.

[Approved March 20, 1899.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Commander-in-Chief may annually order an encampment for discipline and drill, either by division, brigade, regiment, battalion, or unattached company. All encampments shall be held at the State Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of California, unless otherwise ordered by the Commander-in-Chief.

SEC. 2. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER CXXVII.

An Act regarding organizations, officers, and members of the National Guard who entered the United States Volunteer service in the Spanish-American War of eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, their privileges and exemptions, and retirements, and providing for the return to the National Guard of such organizations, officers, and members.

[Approved March 21, 1899.]

The People of the State of California, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Each and all of the officers and members of the regiments and companies of the National Guard of the State of California who were mustered into the United States Volunteer service in the Spanish-American War of eighteen hundred and ninety-eight and have been discharged therefrom are hereby granted leave of absence from the time of their mustering into the United States Volunteer service until being mustered out of the same, and that within one hundred and fifty days from their being so mustered out they may report for duty to the Brigadier-General of the brigade from which they went, if a regiment; or to the commanding officer of the regiment or battalion from which they went, if a company or division; and they shall at once be recognized as belonging to the National Guard and returned to duty as the company, division, battalion, or regiment which they were at the time they entered said Volunteer service, and any company or division not having the minimum number required by law shall recruit up to the requisite number within the time above specified.

All officers of such companies, divisions, battalions, and regiments as entered said Volunteer service, and shall return to the National Guard as above provided for, shall continue to serve under the commissions held by them at the time they entered the said Volunteer service for the unexpired portion of their respective commissions, the same as if they had not entered such Volunteer service, and had remained continuously in the National Guard.

Those officers of the National Guard who entered said Volunteer service, but whose term of office would have expired had they remained in the National Guard, are hereby granted all the privileges, exemptions, and retirements up to the date of their being mustered out of said Volunteer service, the same as if they had remained in the National Guard, and, should they return to duty within the time herein provided, and be re-elected to any commissioned office, as provided by law, their time shall be continuous for all purposes, as if their said terms had not expired.

Officers and members of the regiments, battalions, companies, and divisions of the National Guard, who did enter the said Volunteer service with their respective commands, if they report for duty with such commands, provided they resume their places in the National Guard, as above provided for, are granted continuous service, as in the National Guard, for all purposes up to such time as they so report; those who do not so report are hereby granted honorable discharge from the National Guard, as of the date of mustering into said Volunteer service of their respective organizations.

SEC. 2. In computing the term of service for any purpose regarding privileges and exemptions and retirements provided by law for officers and members of the National Guard, the time which any officer or enlisted man has served, or may hereafter serve in said Volunteer service, shall be computed and allowed for as continuous service, the same as if such service had been in the National Guard, and including such time not exceeding one hundred and fifty days to those already mustered out of such service, and such time as may be provided under this Act for those not yet mustered out of such service to the time when he shall report for duty in the National Guard as hereinbefore provided; and the same shall apply to any volunteer whose term of service in the National Guard expires before being mustered out of said Volunteer service, or who re-enters the National Guard within the time provided for in this Act.

SEC. 3. The Governor is hereby authorized and empowered to prescribe the time for the re-entry into the National Guard of those organizations, officers, and members who entered in said Volunteer service but have not yet been discharged therefrom, after they shall have been so discharged, and they may re-enter the National Guard upon the terms and conditions, except as to time, provided in this Act, and they are hereby granted leave of absence for the entire period they have been or may be in said Volunteer service.

SEC. 4. No organization, officer, or member hereby granted leave of absence shall draw or be allowed any pay, allowance, money or property from the State of California for the time or any portion of the time they are hereby granted leave of absence, but all organizations shall be entitled to all military allowances provided by law as soon as they are recruited up to the minimum required by law, and that fact is reported to and approved by the Governor.

SEC. 5. This Act shall take effect immediately.

I. The following instructions will govern the reporting for duty of the officers and members of the regiments and companies of the National Guard of California, who were mustered into the United States Volunteer service in the "Spanish-American War of 1898," and have been discharged therefrom; and also the recruiting of said organizations, as provided by the Act of the Legislature, approved March 21, 1899:

(1) Officers and enlisted men of the National Guard who entered said United States Volunteer service will report in writing within the time mentioned and as provided in said Act, and those so reporting will be entitled to all the privileges in said Act granted; and those officers and enlisted men not reporting will be granted an honorable discharge from the National Guard as provided in said Act.

(2) Those officers and enlisted men belonging to the National Guard at the outbreak of said war and who did not volunteer therein, and whose terms of service have not yet expired, will report for duty with their respective organizations, and will be permitted to serve out their said terms of service, unless sooner discharged; and those officers and enlisted men belonging to the National Guard at the beginning of said war, and whose terms of service have expired since May 6, 1898, and have been prevented by conditions arising out of said war from re-entering said National Guard, will be permitted to re-enter said Guard—the officers as such, if re-elected, and the enlisted men if they re-enlist prior to or on the date of the reporting by their company or organization for duty as provided in said Act, and shall have passed such a physical examination as will warrant the surgeon or physician conducting the examination to certify "that, in his opinion, they are free from all bodily defects and mental infirmity which would in any way disqualify them from performing all the duties pertaining to military service." Those whose terms of service have expired as aforesaid and who do not re-enter the Guard will be granted an honorable discharge as of the date of the expiration of their terms of service.

(3) Should any company not have the minimum number (fifty) required by law so report for duty, its ranks may be recruited up to the requisite number, within the time specified in said Act. Recruits will pass a satisfactory medical examination similar to that prescribed in subdivision 2 above, but they shall be between the ages of 18 and 45 years, and not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height, and weigh not less than 120 pounds. A chest measurement of less than 32 inches at termination of normal expansion, or a chest expansion of less than 2 inches, should reject. Minors should not be enlisted without the written consent of parents or legally appointed guardians.

(4) Surgeons of the National Guard will be allowed per diem pay for one day for each company examined and certified to; civilian surgeons may be employed where it is found impracticable for the regularly detailed surgeon to attend, and when so employed will be allowed the per diem pay of a Captain and Assistant Surgeon (\$5.55) per company examined.

(5) No soldier who is over the age of 45 years shall re-enlist, without the written consent of his Brigade Commander, first had and obtained.

(6) It will be necessary for those volunteers whose terms of service have expired, or will have expired prior to their reporting for duty, as provided in subdivision 1 above, to re-enlist in the National Guard at the time of so reporting for duty. Those members of the California Volunteers who were not members of the National Guard, in order to join the Guard, must enlist therein, as provided by law, and in recruiting the companies of the Guard, Captains should give the preference to those volunteers of the Spanish-American War who desire to enlist. This is but a fitting recognition of the service of the California Volunteer, and the commendation of the Commander-in-Chief is extended to officers and members of the California Volunteers for the patriotism and zeal displayed by them in the Spanish-American War, and they should be encouraged to enter the National Guard.

II. The report for duty mentioned herein shall be in substance as follows:

"We, the undersigned, in compliance with the Act of the Legislature, approved March 21, 1899, hereby report for duty in Company ----, ----- Infantry (or otherwise), N. G. C.

Under the column of remarks, state age, whether volunteer or did not volunteer, recruit, etc. Original signatures must accompany all reports. One copy of all reports made should be forwarded, at once, to the Adjutant-General's office, Sacramento, Cal.

III. The Major-General commanding the Division will at once detail the necessary surgeons in each Brigade to make the physical examinations required hereunder; the travel of the Surgeons hereby enjoined is necessary for the service, and they will be allowed reasonable traveling expenses thereunder.

IV. Organizations shall be entitled to all military allowances provided by law, as soon as they are recruited up to the minimum (fifty per company) required by law, and that fact is reported to and is approved by the Commander-in-Chief, as provided in said Act; and the allowances to organizations will date from the time of compliance with the

requirements of said Act of the Legislature, approved March 21, 1899, and not under the provisions of Paragraph 6 of General Orders No. 6, series of 1898 (Attorney-General Tiry L. Ford having, on February 3, 1899, rendered an opinion that all members of the National Guard who entered the United States Volunteer service, thereby severed their relations with and ceased to be members of the National Guard), and the return to duty of the Sixth and Seventh Infantry to the National Guard service will be conditioned on their compliance with the provisions of said Act of March 21, 1899, and not under the provisions of said General Orders No. 6, series of 1898.

V. Election of officers of the different organizations, where vacancies exist, either by resignations, expiration of terms of service, or otherwise, will be ordered by the proper officers, as now provided by law for the election of officers National Guard of California, as soon as the organization has reported for duty as provided in said Act, and same has been approved.

VI. The time for the re-entry into the National Guard of the officers and members of the National Guard of California who entered the Volunteer service, but have not yet been discharged therefrom, will be announced in future orders, as in said Act provided.

V. Paragraphs 287, 288, and 289, Rules and Regulations for the National Guard of California, are hereby amended to read as follows:

287. Articles of public property issued to a company for its exclusive use, will, when practicable, be marked with the letter of the company and number and arm of the regiment. Such articles issued to an enlisted man (arms and clothing excepted) will, as far as practicable, be marked with the number of the man, letter of the company, and number of the regiment.

Haversacks and blanket bags or packs will be uniformly marked on the outside as follows: Cavalry, crossed sabers; artillery, crossed cannons; infantry, crossed rifles; with letter of company above and number of regiment below the intersection; the special corps of the National Guard, according to their respective devices.

The design and all letters and figures will be stenciled in black, the device five inches long, and letters and numbers in full-faced characters, one inch high. The design will

be placed above letters "U. S." on equipments, and the number of the soldier, in characters one inch high, will be placed at the bottom, near the lower edge of the haversack or blanket bag.

The canteen will be marked with the letter of the company, number of the regiment, and number of the man.

288. The public property pertaining to the headquarters of the regiment will be marked "H. Q.," with arm and number of regiment; the equipments in possession of the non-commissioned staff, regimental non-commissioned officers, and band, will be marked "N. C. S.," "N. C.," and "Band," respectively, and with the arm and number of the regiment, and of the man to whom the articles are issued.

289. Articles issued to Naval Militia will be similarly marked, with the number of the Division or the letters "Engr." for Engineer Division, and the letters "Div." in place of letter of company; and the letters "N. M." in place of the number of regiment.

VI. The following changes pertaining to the uniform of the Army of the United States, having on April 24, 1899, been made, such changes are hereby announced for the information of all concerned:

CHEVRONS.*

The rank of non-commissioned officers will be marked on the blouse and overcoat by chevrons of cloth, and on the uniform dress coat, except for the Hospital Corps, by chevrons of gold lace.

The chevrons will be worn points down; those upon the uniform dress coat and blouse will be above the elbow; those on the overcoat will be below the elbow, with the point $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the cuff.

The cloth chevrons to be of the same color as the facings of the uniform dress coat, except those worn by the Hospital Corps, which will be of emerald green. Those for the overcoat of infantry will be of dark-blue cloth.

The Engineers and Signal Corps chevrons are to be piped with white cloth. The bars of the chevrons will be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, separated by silk stitching, white for Hospital Stewards, Acting Hospital Stewards, Engineers, Signal Corps, and for overcoats for infantry; black for all others; the upper and lower edges to be finished or bound with a similar stitching. The arms of the chevron bars to be 6 to 7 inches long, to be the arcs of a circle of about 25 inches radius, and to meet at an angle of about 96 degrees; distance between extreme outer ends, about 9 inches.

Rank will be indicated as follows:

Regimental Sergeant-Major.—Three bars and an arc of three bars.

Regimental Quartermaster Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of three bars.

Regimental Commissary Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of three bars, having a crescent (points front) $\frac{3}{4}$ inch above the inner angle of chevron.

Squadron or Battalion Sergeant-Majors.—Three bars and an arc of two bars.

Chief Musician.—Three bars and an arc of two bars, with a bugle of pattern worn on caps in the center.

Chief Trumpeter.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, with a bugle of pattern worn on caps in the center.

Principal Musician.—Three bars and a bugle.

Drum Major.—Three bars and two embroidered crossed batons.

Ordnance Sergeant.—Three bars and a star.

Post Quartermaster Sergeant.—Three bars and a crossed key and pen.

Post Commissary Sergeant.—Three bars and a crescent (points to the front) $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches above the inner angle of chevron.

Hospital Steward.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, of emerald green cloth, inclosing a red cross.

Acting Hospital Steward.—The same as for a Hospital Steward, omitting the arc.

Private of the Hospital Corps, and all Persons Neutralized by the Terms of the Geneva Convention.—A brassard of white cloth, 16 inches long and 3 inches wide, with a cross of red cloth, 2 inches long and 2 inches wide, in center, to be worn on the left arm, above the elbow.

Sergeant of the First Class of the Signal Corps.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, inclosing a device consisting of crossed signal flags, red and white, and a burning torch in yellow.

Sergeant of the Signal Corps.—Same as for a Sergeant of the first class, omitting the arc.

Corporal of the Signal Corps.—Two bars inclosing same device as for Sergeant of the first class.

First Class Private of the Signal Corps.—Device consisting of crossed signal flags, red and white, and a burning torch in yellow.

Electrician Sergeant.—Three bars and a representation of forked lightning, embroidered in white silk, bars to be scarlet.

First Sergeant.—Three bars and a lozenge.

*The stripes prescribed for "candidates" for promotion will be worn on the upper half of each cuff, and will consist of a double stripe running the length of the cuff, pointed at the upper end, and with a small button below the point of the stripe; for uniform coat, of gold braid; for blouse and overcoat, of cloth of same color as facings of uniform; width of braid or cloth, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch; width of space between braid, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

Troop, Battery, or Company Quartermaster Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of one bar.
Sergeant.—Three bars.
Regimental and Battalion Color Sergeant.—Three bars and a sphere $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter.

Corporal.—Two bars.

Lance Corporal.—One bar.

Cook.—A cook's cap of cloth conforming in color to arm of service, except for Signal Corps, which will be black upon white cloth.

Farrier.—A horseshoe of cloth, $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches long and $3\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide, worn toe uppermost.

Saddler.—A saddler's round knife, of cloth.

Mechanic and Artificer.—Two crossed hammers, of cloth.

First Class Gunner.—An insignia of scarlet cloth neatly piped and stitched on the outside of the right sleeve, halfway between the point of the shoulder and elbow, below the chevron in case of a non-commissioned officer, the shape of the insignia to be that of an elongated cannon projectile $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches long and $\frac{3}{4}$ inch wide, point up. This insignia will be charged only in case of loss or damage, and will be worn upon the right sleeve of the dress coat, blouse, and overcoat.

GOLD LACE CHEVRONS.

The gold lace chevrons will be of the same dimensions as cloth chevrons, stitched upon cloth of the same color as the facings of the uniform dress coat. Those for Engineers to have a stitching of white silk on each edge of the gold lace. Those for the Signal Corps to have the crossed signal flags and torches of the same color and dimensions as those for the cloth chevrons, and embroidered in silk and bullion in high relief.

SERVICE CHEVRONS.

All enlisted men who have served faithfully for one term of enlistment for three years will wear as a mark of distinction, upon both sleeves of the *uniform dress coat*, below the elbow, a diagonal half chevron of gold lace $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, stitched upon a piece of dark-blue cloth of the color of the uniform dress coat, and extending from seam to seam, the front end nearest the cuff and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the point of the cuff.

Those for enlisted men of the Hospital Corps, however, shall consist of single stripe of emerald green facing cloth, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide and 12 inches long, stitched on the outer edges with white chevron silk, and will be worn on both sleeves of the blouse below the elbow.

To Indicate Service in War.—A diagonal half chevron of gold lace, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, with piping on each side $\frac{1}{8}$ inch wide, of cloth of the same color as the facings of the arm of service in which the soldier earned the right to wear it; those for Engineers to have in addition a stitching of white silk on each side of the gold lace. To be worn on both sleeves of the uniform dress coat.

Those for the enlisted men of the Hospital Corps will be worn on both sleeves of the blouse, and shall consist of a single stripe of emerald green facing cloth, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide and 12 inches long, piped on outer edges with orange facing cloth $\frac{1}{8}$ inch wide, indicating war service in the Hospital Corps only.

War service in other arms will be indicated by pipings of the color worn by the arm in which such service was rendered, except in the Engineer Corps, in which case the outer edges of the scarlet pipings shall have a row of white silk stitching.

All soldiers who have served during the War of the Rebellion, and who were honorably discharged; all who served in the Indian campaigns enumerated in general orders from the Headquarters of the Army; all who have served or may serve in the Army of the United States in war, or in such Indian campaigns approaching the magnitude of war, as may from time to time be so designated by the Secretary of War, are entitled to wear the "service-in-war" chevron.

All enlisted men who, between April 21, 1898, and April 11, 1899, were assembled in camps or rendezvous in the United States, or into separate bodies, such as regiments, brigades, divisions, or corps, for the purpose of carrying on military operations and bringing to a conclusion the war with Spain; and all who embarked on transports for campaigns against the enemy in Cuba, Porto Rico and the islands of the Pacific, or on the high seas, or elsewhere, are entitled to wear the "service-in-war" chevron. The foregoing will not apply to enlisted men who were performing service in garrisons on the Western frontier, which is requisite in time of peace, and in no wise considered a part of the Army assembled to carry on the war with Spain.

The chevrons to indicate service and service in war, if more than one, will be worn one above the other in the order in which they were earned, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch distance between them. But one chevron will be worn for each enlistment, the "service-in-war" chevron being worn in place of the "service" chevron for each enlistment in which the right to wear it was earned.

A Lance Corporal shall wear, in addition to the uniform of a private, a chevron having one bar of lace or braid; holding a renewed appointment, he shall wear the uniform of a Corporal, except the chevron shall have but one bar of lace or braid.

Chevrons for Field Uniforms (Khaki).—As described, but of such material as may be found most suitable for service.

STRIPES FOR TROUSERS.

Sergeants to wear a stripe 1 inch wide; *Corporals and Lance Corporals* holding renewed appointments to wear a stripe $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; and *Musicians* to wear two stripes, each $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, of cloth conforming to color of facing.

Engineers.—Scarlet stripes piped with white.

Ordnance Sergeants.—Crimson stripes, $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide.

Post Quartermaster Sergeants.—Buff stripes, $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide.

Commissary Sergeants.—Cadet-gray stripes, $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide.

Enlisted Men of the Hospital Corps.—Of emerald green. Hospital Stewards to be $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide; Acting Hospital Stewards, 1 inch wide; Privates to be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide.

Electrician Sergeants.—Scarlet stripes, $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide.

Sergeants of the Signal Corps.—Black stripes, 1 inch wide.

All stripes to be of cloth.

No stripes will be worn upon the field (Khaki) trousers.

HELMET, FULL DRESS.

All Mounted Troops and Band Musicians.—Body of black felt, or other suitable material, as per pattern in the office of the Quartermaster-General, with leather chin strap. Brass eagle, with motto, shield, and crossed arms, according to arm of service. Number of regiment or device of corps in white metal (German silver) on shield. For Band Musicians a lyre of white metal. Brass side buttons bearing device of corps or arm of service. Top piece, plume socket, and rings all brass. Horsehair plume, with cord and bands of color according to arm of service.

All Foot Troops.—Of the same pattern and material as for mounted troops, with chin strap, brass eagle, and side buttons bearing device of corps or arm of service. The top ornament to consist of a spike and base of brass, as per pattern, instead of the plume socket. No rings.

DEVICES IN WHITE METAL (GERMAN SILVER) FOR STAFF AND STAFF CORPS.

Commissary Sergeants.—A crescent.

Post Quartermaster Sergeants.—A crossed key and pen.

Engineers.—A castle.

Ordnance.—A shell and flame.

Electrician Sergeants.—A symbol representing forked lightning.

CORPS.

The helmet cords are attached to the left side of the helmet, and come down to the left shoulder, where they are held together by a slide; one cord then passes to the front and the other to the rear of the neck, crossing the right shoulder under the shoulder strap and passing separately around to the front and rear of the right arm, where they are again united and held together by a slide under the arm; the united cords then cross the breast and are looped up to the button of the shoulder strap on the left side.

UNDRESS CAP.

Of dark-blue cloth, the diameter at the top slightly less than at the base, the height $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches all around; the seam around the top without a welt, and neatly stitched on each side. The band $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide, with welts projecting $\frac{1}{4}$ inch at the top and bottom, the bottom welt $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the base of the cap. The visor of black patent leather, bound with the same, and molded to shape, green underneath, rounded and sloping downward from the horizontal. A rigid stiffening all around to extend from the base of the cap to within 1 inch of the top, and a hair-cloth stiffening throughout the remainder of the sides and top; four black metal eyelets for ventilation, two on each side, placed above the band; an enameled leather chin strap, fitted with a stout fire-gilt slide and a leather keeper secured at both ends by small regulation buttons, one on each side, immediately back of the ends of the visor.

Badge of corps or letter of company of yellow metal, unless otherwise specified, according to patterns in the office of the Quartermaster-General, placed in front so that the top of the badge will be slightly below the top of the cap, as follows:

Cavalry, Artillery, and Infantry.—Number of regiment in the upper, and the letter of company in the lower angle of the badge, which shall be, for cavalry, crossed sabers; artillery, crossed cannon; infantry, crossed rifles.

Ordnance Sergeants and Soldiers.—The "shell and flame."

Hospital Stewards.—A cross of white metal, inclosed by a wreath of white metal. For acting Hospital Stewards and Privates of the Hospital Corps, a cross of white metal.

Commissary Sergeants.—Crescent of white metal, the points upward, inclosed in a wreath of dead or unburnished gilt metal.

Post Quartermaster Sergeants.—Crossed key and pen of German silver, inclosed in a wreath of dead or unburnished gilt metal.

Electrician Sergeants.—A symbol representing forked lightning, of German silver, inclosed in a wreath of dead or unburnished gilt metal.

Engineers.—The castle, with letter of company above it.

Field and Band Musicians and Trumpeters of Cavalry.—Field Musicians, bugle with number of regiment in the center and the letter of the company above the bugle; Band Musicians, a lyre of white metal; Trumpeters of Cavalry, crossed sabers, with number of regiment and letter of company in upper and lower angles, respectively.

For the Signal Corps.—Two crossed signal flags and a burning torch of white metal, inclosed in a wreath of dead or unburnished gilt metal.

FATIGUE HAT.

All Officers.—Of black or drab felt, according to pattern, to be worn in the field, and in garrison only on fatigue duty and at target practice. For general officers a cord to be of gold, and for all other officers, of gold and black silk intermixed, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster-General.

FATIGUE AND STRAW HATS.

All Enlisted Men.—Of drab-colored felt, with worsted hat cords, conforming in color to patterns in the office of the Quartermaster-General; to be worn in the field, and in garrison only on fatigue and stable duty, at target practice, and when the rubber coat, blanket, or poncho is worn; the color to be uniform for both officers and enlisted men in each troop, battery, or company. During the warm season department commanders may authorize an inexpensive straw hat, of such pattern as they may prescribe, to be worn by officers and enlisted men of their commands, on fatigue and stable duty, at target practice, and when not on duty.

TROUSERS.

Enlisted Men of All Arms except the Corps of Engineers.—Light-blue kersey; to be cut and made in accordance with standard patterns in the office of the Quartermaster-General. Mounted troops to have a reinforce or saddle piece of the same material on seat and legs.

All Enlisted Men of the Corps of Engineers.—Of dark-blue kersey of same pattern as for other foot troops.

An additional service stripe for every three years of service may be worn by the National Guard of California.

II. In compliance with the provisions of Section 2018 of the Political Code of the State of California, the National Guard of California will parade in their respective localities on Tuesday, July 4, 1899, in celebration of the one hundred and twenty-third anniversary of American Independence. Parade reports of the respective commands

will be forwarded to General Headquarters not later than July 20, 1899. (Approved June 13, 1899.)

III. The Annual Inspection and Muster of the National Guard will be held as provided by Section 1970 of the Political Code, and Commanding Officers will arrange the dates of inspection and details thereof in accordance with the provisions of said Section 1970 as amended in 1897. (Approved June 5, 1899.)

IV. The following organizations of the National Guard which were mustered into the United States Volunteer service, in the Spanish-American War of 1898, having reported for duty under the Act of the Legislature approved March 21, 1899, are hereby recognized as belonging to the National Guard and returned to duty therein, and said organizations shall be entitled to their military allowances from the date of their so reporting for duty, viz:

Browne, who has been placed upon the "Retired List"), are hereby granted an honorable discharge from the National Guard, as provided in said Act. The Company Commanders will not be relieved on their bonds until such time as satisfactory settlement has been made with the Adjutant-General for all property and moneys received by them from the State.

VI. A sufficient number of companies having reported for duty in the Second, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh Infantry Regiments, under the Act of the Legislature, approved March 21, 1899, these regiments are hereby recognized as organized regiments of the National Guard, and returned to duty therein, as provided by said Act.

The Field, Staff, and Non-Commissioned Staff officers of said regiments who have reported for duty under the provisions of said Act are hereby recognized as belonging to and being on duty with their respective regiments from the date of their so reporting.

X. Pursuant to letter received at these Headquarters from the Honorable Secretary of the Navy, dated June 21, 1899, and in accordance with the provisions of Section 2022 of the Political Code, the Naval Battalion, N. Captain L. H. Turner, commanding the battalion, is hereby directed to place himself in communication with the Commanding Officer of the "Badger" upon her arrival in San Francisco, to arrange all the necessary details of the cruise.

As the allotment of the annual appropriation by the United States Government will be made in accordance with the number of petty officers and enlisted men who report for and participate in this cruise, it is urged that special efforts be made by the Commanding Officers of Divisions to get out as many men as possible, so that they may have the benefit of the practical instruction offered and to secure the maximum amount of the allotment from the General Government for the use of the Naval Militia.

Per diem during the cruise on the "Badger" will not be allowed or paid, but subsistence will be furnished by the State. (Approved June 29, 1899.)

"By direction of the Secretary of War, all enlisted men who served in the Army of the United States between April 21, 1898, and April 11, 1899, no matter where stationed, will be allowed to wear the service-in-war chevron prescribed on page 5 of General Orders, No. 80, April 24, 1899, from this office."

Each applicant for admission to the National Guard shall pass such a physical examination as will warrant the surgeon or physician conducting the examination to certify "that, in his opinion, the applicant is free from all bodily defects and mental infirmity which would in any way disqualify him from performing all the duties pertaining to military service."

Applicants for original enlistment shall be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, and for Infantry and Artillery the height must not be less than five feet four inches, and weight not less than one hundred and twenty pounds, and not more than one hundred and ninety pounds; and

For Cavalry and Signal Corps the height must not be less than five feet four inches and not more than five feet ten inches, and weigh not to exceed one hundred and sixty-five pounds.

No minimum weight is prescribed for Cavalry or Signal Corps, but chest measures must be satisfactory.

A chest measurement of less than thirty-two inches at expiration, or an expansion of less than two inches, should reject.

Company, Troop, and Corps commanders are authorized, however, in their discretion, to accept desirable applicants who are ten pounds, or less, over weight or under weight, or who vary not more than a fraction of an inch from the required height or chest measures, if they meet all other requirements, and their enlistment is recommended by the medical examiner.

No person under eighteen years of age will be enlisted or re-enlisted; *provided*, that boys between the ages of sixteen and eighteen, who may be needed as musicians, may be enlisted as such with the approval of the Battalion, Regimental, or Brigade commander.

No soldier who is over the age of forty-five shall be re-enlisted without the written consent of the Brigade commander, or in case of Naval Militia, of the Division commander, N. G. C.

No person under twenty-one years of age will be enlisted or re-enlisted without the written consent of father, only surviving parent, or legally appointed guardian. For form of consent in case of minor, see paragraph 356, Rules and Regulations, N. G. C.

Applicants for original enlistment in Naval Militia shall conform to requirements for Infantry; *provided*, however, that commanders of Divisions are authorized, in their discretion, to accept desirable applicants who vary from the standard in regard to height, weight, or chest measures, if they meet all other requirements and their enlistment is recommended by the medical examiner.

Where it is not practicable for applicants to appear before a medical officer of the Guard, Company, Troop, Corps, or Division commanders are authorized and directed to employ a civilian physician to make examinations, at a compensation of forty cents (\$0.40) for each man examined, to be paid out of the allowance for "Armory rents and other expenses," as an incidental expense of the Company, Troop, Corps, or Division.

III. Paragraph 360, Rules and Regulations for the National Guard of California, is hereby amended to read as follows:

360. In cases of re-enlistment the enlistment papers will show the number of re-enlistment, and also whether the same is consecutive or not.

Former members of the Guard, who have been honorably discharged for "Expiration of Term of Service," or on account of "Removal," and have returned to the limits of their commands, and officers who have resigned, been honorably discharged, or whose terms have expired, who re-enlist or re-enter the Guard within ninety days from the date of their discharge or the expiration of their term of office, will be given credit for continuous service, and the enlistment considered consecutive.

Any former member of the Guard who has served satisfactorily a complete enlistment, or continuous term of three years, may re-enlist at any time thereafter for one, two, or three years, at his option.

Enlistments must in no case be antedated.

IV. The practice of some commanding officers of revoking orders making discharges will be discontinued.

A man once discharged from the National Guard can become a member again only by enlistment or commission, as provided by law.

V. Pursuant to telegraphic instructions from the Honorable Secretary of the Navy, dated July 6, 1899, and a letter dated July 11, 1899, changing the date of the arrival of the U. S. S. "Badger" in San Francisco, that portion of paragraph X, G. O. No. 7, c. s., A. G. O., relating to dates of the cruise and drill of the Naval Militia Battalion, is hereby revoked.

Owing to the uncertainty of the date of the arrival of the "Badger" in San Francisco, Captain L. H. Turner, commanding Naval Militia Battalion, will arrange for and designate the dates when the Headquarters and various Divisions will embark. (Approved July 19, 1899.)

I. The following changes and amendments to Firing Regulations for Small Arms for the National Guard of California, having been adopted by the officers mentioned in Section 2031 of the Political Code, are hereby announced and approved:

Paragraph 2 is amended to read as follows: "2. Target practice in the National Guard shall be held in such months of each year as the Commander-in-Chief may designate."

Paragraph 3 is amended to read as follows: "3. Each officer and enlisted man firing with the rifle will be allowed annually 65 rounds of ammunition, and the same will be fired as follows: At rectangular targets: One score of 5 shots at each of the 200, 300, and 500 yard ranges, at first practice; one score of 5 shots at each of the 200, 300, and 500 yard ranges, at second practice; one score of 5 shots at each of the 200, 300, and 500 yard ranges, at third practice. At skirmish targets: One score of 20 shots at time designated."

Paragraph 6 is amended to read as follows: "6. Skirmish firing will be by company at silhouettes at known distances between 600 and 200 yards at target G, as provided in paragraph 390, Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations."

Paragraph 10 is amended to read as follows: "10. The names of all National Guardsmen who have attended 60 per cent of the drills for the year ending on the last day of the month next preceding the one in which the last practice is held, and who have qualified in any of the classifications, will be announced in orders by the Adjutant-General and be published in his report."

Paragraph 16 is amended to read as follows: "16. The target practice of the Naval Militia Battalion will be under the supervision of the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice."

Paragraph 52 is amended to read as follows: "52. Each Company, Troop, Corps, Division, or other commander shall keep a complete record of all target practice held in his organization. He shall make for the Inspector of Rifle Practice four copies of the reports of the practice held in each year, on blank forms furnished by the Adjutant-General. Separate reports will be made of skirmish firing in like manner. The Inspector of Rifle Practice shall carefully examine and certify to the correctness of these reports, and within five days after the completion of the last practice forward three copies to the Brigade Inspector of Rifle Practice (except Inspector for Naval Militia, who shall forward two copies to the Division Inspector of Rifle Practice), who shall verify said reports, and within ten days after their receipt by him forward two copies to the Division Inspector of Rifle Practice, who shall, within ten days after their receipt by him, forward one copy to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice. The Inspector-General of Rifle Practice shall, within twenty days after his receipt of same, forward copies of all reports to the Adjutant-General, together with his report, as prescribed in Section 2008 of the Political Code."

Paragraph 55 is amended to read as follows: "55. Classification for revolver practice: Ten shots will be fired at each practice, of which there shall be four, to be held in such months as the Commander-in-Chief may designate. Each officer and enlisted man firing with the revolver will be allowed annually 40 rounds of ammunition, and those firing will be classed as follows: Average of 90 per cent, first class; average of 80 per cent, second class; average of 70 per cent, third class; average of 60 per cent, fourth class. The names of those averaging less than 60 per cent for the four shoots will not be announced in orders, and only first-class men will be permitted to compete for the State Medal for revolver practice."

II. In compliance with Section 2018 of the Political Code, Paragraph 2, the National Guard will parade for target practice in their respective localities in the year 1899 as follows:

One practice at rectangular targets will be held during each of the months of September, October, and November. The practice at skirmish firing will be held after the practice at rectangular targets is completed, and may be held either in the month of November or December. The additional practice for those firing with the revolver will be held in either November or December.

Regimental commanders and the commanding officer of the Naval Militia Battalion will designate the days in above-named months when the practice of their commands will be held, and detail an officer to inspect same when a regular Inspector of Rifle Practice cannot be present. Brigade commanders will issue like orders for Cavalry and Signal Corps in their commands.

These orders will not apply to the First Infantry as regards time, but if said regiment returns to duty in the Guard in sufficient time for practice this year, the same will be held on dates designated by its Regimental commander.

III. No score will be accepted by these Headquarters unless same has been actually supervised and attested by an Inspector of Rifle Practice, or a duly authorized officer, and a copy of the order so authorizing must be filed with said Headquarters. Particular attention of inspecting officers is called to Paragraph 52, Small Arms Firing Regulations. The attention of all commanding officers is also called to Section 2020 of the Political Code.

IV. Company and other commanders preparing rolls for reports of target practice will take particular care to enter the number of State Medal held by each member, in column for that purpose.

V. Medals and bars for various classes will be awarded as follows:

RIFLE.

Rifleman: Medal with Bronze Bar.
 Sharpshooter: Medal with Silver Bar.
 Distinguished Marksman: Medal with Gold Bar.

REVOLVER.

Third Class: Medal with Bronze Bar.
 Second Class: Medal with Silver Bar.
 First Class: Medal with Gold Bar.

After the first qualification a bar only will be awarded.

VII. The greater part of the National Guard having been mustered into and served in the United States Volunteers during the Spanish-American War of 1898, and no complete target practice having been held in that year, owing to disarrangement caused by said war, thereby preventing members from qualifying in various classes in that year; therefore, in order that they may not be deprived of the consecutive yearly decoration for 1898, it is hereby provided that all members of the Guard who became such prior to the 9th day of July, 1898, and who qualify in the practice for the year 1899, will receive, in addition to the usual medal and bar for 1899, a bar for the year 1898 also, in accordance with the class in which they qualify in 1899.

VIII. The ammunition for rifle practice shall contain not less than 66 grains of powder and 405 grains of lead. Ammunition for revolver practice will be Colt's revolver cartridges, caliber .38 long.

VIII. Blank forms for returns and instructions governing skirmish firing for 1899 will be issued later from this office.

I. The First Infantry Regiment, California Volunteers, having, on September 21, 1899, been mustered out of, and honorably discharged from, the United States service; and Section 3 of the Act of the Legislature, approved March 21, 1899, and entitled "An Act regarding organizations, officers, and members of the National Guard who entered

the United States Volunteer service in the Spanish-American War of eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, their privileges and exemptions, and retirements, and providing for the return to the National Guard of such organizations, officers and members" (Statutes of California, 1899, page 158), having authorized the Governor to prescribe the time for the re-entry, into the National Guard, of those officers and men who entered the United States Volunteer service during the "Spanish-American War of 1898," it is therefore ordered that the officers and members of the First Infantry Regiment, California Volunteers, who were, at the time of their entry into the United States Volunteer service, members of the National Guard of California, may re-enter the National Guard at any time on or before November 30, 1899, as provided in said Act.

All other officers and members of the National Guard of California, who entered the United States Volunteer service in the "Spanish-American War of 1898," and have been honorably discharged therefrom, subsequent to the date of the approval of said Act of March 21, 1899, may re-enter the National Guard at any time on or before November 30, 1899. Those who may hereafter be discharged from such service may re-enter the National Guard at any time within sixty days from the date of their muster-out of the United States Volunteer service.

The instructions mentioned in General Orders, No. 5, c. s., A. G. O., will govern the reporting for duty of said organization, officers and members thereof, and the recruiting of said organization to the minimum required by law; and also the reporting for duty of all other officers and members of the National Guard above mentioned. I. The following rules and regulations for Skirmish Firing having been submitted by Colonel J. F. Burgin, Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, N. G. C., and adopted by the officers mentioned in Section 2031 of the Political Code, are hereby announced and approved as follows, to wit:

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR SKIRMISH FIRING IN THE NATIONAL GUARD OF CALIFORNIA, FOR 1899.

1. The trophy, a silk flag, awarded in 1897 to Company M, Seventh Infantry, will again be competed for in accordance with these rules.

2. At least eighty per cent of the members of each company of infantry should, on the completion of the course of practice at rectangular targets, be exercised in this firing.

3. The target for this firing will be (target H) a line of thirty skirmishers represented by the three kinds of figure targets. Ten of each of the figures D, E, and F will be employed and arranged by placing a kneeling figure on the right flank of the line of figures followed by a standing and then a lying figure, and continuing this arrangement throughout the line; the figures will be placed at equal intervals; that between the centers of any two consecutive standing figures being three yards; adjacent figures one yard between centers.

4. For this practice, hits in any portion of the targets, whether from direct or ricochet fire, will be counted and scored three if in target D (standing), four if in target E (kneeling), and five if in target F (the lying figure); provided, that in counting the hits, for this as for all other firings at these targets, only those are considered that have struck within or on any portion of the steel frame, omitting hits in any portion of the paper silhouette that may happen to project beyond the frame, which is the actual target.

5. The range and consequent adjustment of sights will be announced by the company commander; the number of shots, and whether by volley, or slow or rapid fire, ordered for each halt.

6. The practice, therefore, partakes of the nature of known-distance firing, combined with an advance and retreat and variation in the class of fire, dependent upon the distance from the target, which is regarded as the enemy.

7. It would not be just to introduce an influence dependent upon the officers' possible errors when estimating the range; firing will therefore be conducted over ranges where the distances are known and plainly marked, and the halts so ordered that elevations, correct, or nearly so, can be announced at each halt.

8. Pieces will not be loaded until the halt has been ordered. Aim will be taken at the bottom of the targets. For volley firing, commands will be those laid down in Drill Regulations; the commands for firing with counted cartridges will be those prescribed in Drill Regulations for firing a limited number of rounds at will.

9. When the company is formed, twenty-three rounds of ammunition will be issued to each man who is to fire, and the company carefully inspected to see that no additional cartridges are carried by any soldier.

10. The company will be formed in single rank, at close order, six hundred yards from the target, advance in quick time one hundred yards, or to a distance of five hundred yards from the target, deploying during the advance to one yard between files, halt, kneel, and fire one volley. The advance will be then resumed, first at quick then at double time, to a distance of four hundred yards from the target, when a halt will be ordered and two volleys fired, position kneeling; then advance, first at quick and then at double time, to a distance of three hundred yards from the target, halt, fire two cartridges, position lying; advance double time to a distance of two hundred and fifty yards from the target, fire two cartridges, position lying; advance double time to a distance of two hundred yards from the target, kneel and fire rapidly five cartridges; retreat to a distance of three hundred yards from the target, halt, and fire three cartridges, position lying; retreat to four hundred yards from the target, halt, kneel, and fire three cartridges; retreat to five hundred yards, halt, fire two volleys, position kneeling.

11. After the last volley is fired, the targets will be examined by the officer in charge and the proper credits for hits made.

12. The halts, where rapid fire or fire with counted cartridges is delivered, will not exceed forty-five seconds in duration, extending from the last note of the signal "Commence Firing" to the last note of the signal "Cease Firing." For each shot fired before the commencement or after the close of the interval, three points will be deducted from the total score.

13. As it may be necessary to replace a missed-fire, each participant will be furnished with three (3) additional cartridges, as indicated above, which are only to be used to replace a missed-fire, and must be accounted for by said participant at the end of the practice, by producing "missed fire" or perfect cartridges to correspond with the extra number allowed. For each of the cartridges not returned three points will be deducted from the total score, and for each cartridge returned above three, two points will be deducted.

14. The commanding officer of the company will provide extra rifles, to be supplied in case of an accident disabling a soldier's piece. At the next halt the soldier, in addition to the prescribed number of shots, will fire those he was not able to deliver at the preceding halt by reason of a disabled rifle.

15. From the beginning to the end of the firing, no person or officer will be permitted to aid, assist, advise, or coach the company, men or officers.

16. The calculation of percentage will be based as follows, viz:

(a) At least eighty per cent of the total number of the company should be present and participate.

(b) If over eighty per cent, percentage is based on men actually present, or number of points made divided by highest number of points possible to be made with the number of men shooting.

(c) If under eighty per cent, percentage is based as if eighty per cent of company were present, or number of points made divided by highest number of points possible to be made with eighty per cent of the company.

17. The company making the highest percentage shall be entitled to the Trophy, to be held until after the contest for the next year, when it will be delivered to the winning company for that year. The Trophy to become the property of the company winning it three years in succession.

18. In case of a tie between two or more companies, the same will be shot off at a time and under such conditions as may be directed by the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice.

19. Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations to govern in all cases not herein fully provided for.

20. No ammunition except such as may be furnished by the State, or approved by the Adjutant-General, will be used in these contests.

To the People of California:

WHEREAS, The nation has sustained a sad and irreparable loss by the death of the Honorable Garret A. Hobart, Vice-President of the United States of America, whose many distinguished services as a public officer and high personal worth and integrity as a citizen have endeared him to the hearts of the American people;

AND WHEREAS, Saturday, November 25, A. D. 1899, has been set apart for the funeral services;

THEREFORE, In testimony of the sorrow of our people for the death of the illustrious American, I recommend that all State offices be closed upon the said day of the funeral, and I direct that the National flag be displayed at half-mast upon said day from sunrise to sunset upon all State public buildings and upon all armories of the National Guard of the State of California; and I further direct that the ensign and union-jack be displayed at half-mast on said day from sunrise to sunset upon all vessels belonging to the State, and upon all vessels of the State Naval Militia.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of this State to be hereunto affixed, this 23d day of November, A. D. 1899.

Bangham, Assistant Adjutant-General, is hereby detailed to represent the Inspector-General, for the purpose of making a complete inspection of all State and United States Government property in the possession of the various Commanding Officers in the First Brigade, National Guard of the State, and he is also authorized and directed to condemn and destroy all State property worn out in the service, or worthless.

VII. The Board of Location and Organization of the National Guard of California, having favorably acted upon a call for the organization of a company of infantry at Hanford, Kings County, and the record of the proceedings had thereunder having been received at this office and approved, and said company having been organized and sworn into the service of the State on March 14, 1900, said company is hereby listed as Company I, Sixth Infantry, National Guard of California, and declared to be mustered into the service, to date from said March 14, 1900. (Approved March 28, 1900.)

VIII. Service in which organizations of the National Guard have borne a meritorious part may be engraved upon silver rings, fastened on the pikes or lances of the colors, standards, or guidons, the rings to be one inch wide and placed one inch apart, commencing one inch from the spear head.

On the pikes or lances of the National colors will be placed rings for United States service, and on the pikes or lances of the State colors will be placed rings for State service.

Troops of Cavalry or Signal Corps may carry similar rings on the lances of their guidons for service as detached organizations.

The service for which rings will be allowed, and names and dates to be engraved on same, will be announced from the Adjutant-General's office.

In accordance with the foregoing, the following organizations of the National Guard are hereby authorized to carry one or more rings on the pike of their National colors, inscribed as designated:

First Regiment of Infantry, five rings inscribed as follows: "Spanish-American War, 1898;" "Malate Trenches, July 31 and August 1, 1898;" "Manila, August 13, 1898;" "Filipino Insurrection, February 5 to March 21, 1899;" "Island of Negros, March 23 to July 4, 1899."

Second Regiment of Infantry, one ring inscribed: "Spanish-American War, 1898, as a part of the Eighth California U. S. V. Infantry."

Fifth Regiment of Infantry, one ring inscribed: "Spanish-American War, 1898, as a part of the Eighth California U. S. V. Infantry."

Sixth Regiment of Infantry, one ring inscribed: "Spanish-American War, 1898."

Seventh Regiment of Infantry, one ring inscribed: "Spanish-American War, 1898."

Troop B, Cavalry, is authorized to carry one ring on the lance of their guidon inscribed: "Spanish-American War, 1898, as Battery C, First Battalion, California U. S. V. H. A."

IX. Commanding officers making quarterly demands for allowances will not execute them until the *close* of the quarter for which the same are made. The account current submitted with said demands will show *all* the receipts and expenditures of State money in the quarter for which the account is rendered. The practice of some commanding officers of making demands before the close of quarter and therefore only showing a portion of the financial transactions, and of others in waiting for some time after the close of the quarter and then submitting vouchers for expenditures made *after* the close of quarter, will be discontinued. The dates of vouchers submitted will correspond to the quarter for which the account is rendered; in other words, vouchers showing expenditures in one quarter will not be submitted with the account for another. The above direction as to the time of making demands will also apply to all returns and reports that are made for a definite period. Promptness in making returns and reports is necessary, but when they are made *before* the time designated confusion is often caused thereby.

X. Paragraph 715 of the Rules and Regulations for the National Guard of California is hereby amended by substituting the word "shall" for "should" in the first line, said paragraph as amended reading as follows:

"715. The Board *shall* have authority to summon, administer oaths to, and examine witnesses, and to call for or take such depositions as may be necessary to arrive at a correct understanding of the case."

XI. The detail of Major Charles Jansen as a member of the Board of Survey for the Second Brigade, made January 29, 1900, in General Orders No. 2, A. G. O., is hereby continued under his present commission as Captain, he having resigned as Major and been commissioned Captain of Troop A, Cavalry, qualifying under said commission April 14, 1900.

Company C, Second Infantry, having received the highest percentage under the rules governing the contest for the Silhouette Target Firing Trophy, said company is hereby awarded the custody of the trophy—a silk flag now in the possession of Company M, Seventh Infantry—until after the Skirmish Firing for the year 1900.

The commanding officer of Company M, Seventh Infantry, is hereby directed to ship said trophy by express to the commanding officer of Company C, Second Infantry, at Nevada City, California, who will receipt for the same to this office and also to the commanding officer of Company M.

II. The following changes and amendments to Firing Regulations for Small Arms for the National Guard of California, having been adopted by the officers mentioned in Section 2031 of the Political Code, are hereby announced and approved:

Paragraph 52 is amended to read as follows:

"52. General, Division, Brigade, Regimental, and unattached Battalion commanders will keep a complete record of all target practice of their respective Headquarters. The commanding officer of each Company, Troop, Signal Corps, Naval Militia Division, or other organization, shall keep a complete record of all target practice held in his command, and he shall make two copies of the report of the regular State practice held in each year, on blank forms furnished by the Adjutant-General. Separate reports will be made of skirmish firing in like manner. The Inspector of Rifle Practice shall carefully examine and certify to the correctness of these reports, and within five days after the completion of the last practice, forward to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, through channels, one copy of such report, and return the second copy to the commanding officer making report. These reports must be forwarded so as to reach the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice within twenty-five days after completion of practice, and intermediate headquarters will indorse thereon the time of receipt and forwarding. The Inspector-General of Rifle Practice shall, within twenty days after his receipt of same, forward all reports to the Adjutant-General, together with his report, as prescribed in Section 2008 of the Political Code."

III. In compliance with Section 2018 of the Political Code, Paragraph 2, and Paragraph 2, Firing Regulations for Small Arms, the National Guard will parade for target practice in the year 1900 during the months of May, June, July, August, September, October, November, and December. The practice at skirmish firing will be held at the time of the encampment, to be announced later.

Regimental commanders and commanding officer of the Naval Militia Battalion will make arrangements as to the days, within the above named months, when the practice of their commands will be held, and detail an officer to inspect same when a regular Inspector of Rifle Practice cannot be present. Brigade commanders will issue like orders for Cavalry and Signal Corps in their commands.

IV. Retired officers and officers on the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief may report to any Inspector of Rifle Practice, who will forward their scores, properly certified, to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice for consolidation on one report.

General, Field, and Staff Officers, and also enlisted men absent from their commands with leave, may report to any Inspector of Rifle Practice, who will forward their scores, properly certified, to the Inspector of Rifle Practice of the organization of which they are members, to be entered on the proper report.

The practice of entering scores of members of one organization on the report of another will be discontinued.

V. Those officers and men who are unable to appear at any regular practice, the reason for whose absence is acceptable to their commanding officer, may be allowed to complete their score at any subsequent practice in the discretion of said commanding officer and the Inspector. Officers or men commissioned or enlisted after the beginning of the practice for 1900 may also be allowed to complete their scores in like manner.

VI. No score will be accepted by these Headquarters unless same has been actually supervised and attested by an Inspector of Rifle Practice, or a duly authorized officer, and a copy of the order so authorizing must be filed with said Headquarters. Particular attention of inspecting officers is called to Paragraph 52, Small Arms Firing Regulations. The attention of all commanding officers is also called to Section 2020 of the Political Code.

VII. Company and other commanders preparing rolls for reports of target practice will take particular care to enter the number of State Medal held by each member, in column for that purpose.

VIII. Medals and bars for various classes will be awarded as follows:

RIFLE.

Rifleman: Medal with bronze bar.
 Sharpshooter: Medal with silver bar.
 Distinguished Marksman: Medal with gold bar.

REVOLVER.

Third Class: Medal with bronze bar.
 Second Class: Medal with silver bar.
 First Class: Medal with gold bar.

After the first qualification a bar only will be awarded.

IX. The First Infantry, National Guard of California, having been mustered into and served in the United States Volunteers during the Spanish-American War of 1898, and no complete target practice having been held in that year, owing to disarrangement caused by said war, thereby preventing members from qualifying in various classes in that year, and said regiment not having been reorganized in time to participate in the practice of 1899; therefore, in order that they may not be deprived of the consecutive yearly decorations for 1898 and 1899, it is hereby provided that all members of said regiment who became such prior to the 7th day of May, 1898, and who qualify in the practice for the year 1900, will receive, in addition to the usual medal and bar for 1900, a bar for the year 1898 also, in accordance with the class in which they qualify in 1900, and those who reported for duty with the regiment on or before December 1, 1899, will receive a similar bar for 1899.

X. The ammunition for rifle practice shall contain not less than 66 grains of powder and 405 grains of lead. Ammunition for revolver practice will be Colt's revolver cartridges, caliber .38 long.

XI. Commanding officers in making reports will be guided by Paragraph 52, Firing Regulations for Small Arms, as to the number, and not by the directions on the blanks.

I. In accordance with the recommendation of the Acting Surgeon-General, Colonel W. D. McCarthy, the following regulations are hereby adopted for the government of the Sanitary Corps, N. G. C., under the provisions of Section 2009, Political Code, State of California:

REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE SANITARY CORPS, NATIONAL
 GUARD OF CALIFORNIA.

1. The enlisted strength shall be as follows:
 One Hospital Sergeant for the Surgeon-General's office.
 Two Hospital Sergeants for the Division Surgeon's office.
 One Hospital Sergeant for each Brigade Surgeon's office.
 The Hospital Sergeants assigned to the Surgeon-General's, Division, and Brigade Surgeons' offices shall be uniformed, rank as, and perform the duties of, Hospital Stewards.
- One Hospital Steward for each Regiment of Infantry as now prescribed by Section 1990, Political Code, State of California.
- One Hospital Sergeant, who shall be uniformed, rank as, and perform the duties of, Acting Hospital Steward for each Battalion.
- One Private for each Company, Troop, or Signal Corps.
2. Each commanding officer of a Regiment is authorized and directed to enlist, or cause to be enlisted by a medical officer of the Regiment, a sufficient number of men for assignment to his command, provided that said men shall be recommended by the Surgeon of the Regiment and shall have passed a satisfactory examination as to their qualifications before a board of medical officers; the surgeons and assistant surgeons on duty with a Regiment at the time of the enlistment being hereby appointed and designated as said board.
3. So far as practicable the men enlisted by each Regimental Commander, or under his direction, shall reside in the same locality; any exception to this provision shall be approved by the Surgeon-General.
4. The enlistment and detail of the men for Troops of Cavalry and Signal Corps shall be under the direct supervision of the Chief Surgeon of the Division.
5. The regulations relating to enlistments for Cavalry shall apply, provided that men not conforming strictly to physical standard may be enlisted on authority of Surgeon-General.
6. Enlistment papers will be executed in duplicate, with the report of examination attached, and forwarded by the officer or surgeon making the enlistment direct to the Chief Surgeon of the Division, who will render to the Adjutant-General a monthly return accompanied by one of each set of enlistment papers, said return to be forwarded through office of Surgeon-General.
7. Members of the Sanitary Corps on duty with a Regiment will be discharged by order of the Regimental Commander on recommendation of the surgeon, and for the same reasons and in the same manner as prescribed for other branches of the service in Section 1929, Political Code, State of California.
- Members of the Corps not assigned to Regiments will be discharged by order of the Commanding Officer of the Division, on recommendation of the Chief Surgeon of the Division.
8. A register of the members of the Corps on duty with a Regiment shall be kept at Regimental Headquarters.
- A register of the entire Corps shall be kept at Division Headquarters with a record of the organization to which the members are assigned.
9. The Hospital Stewards provided for in Section 1990, Political Code, State of California, shall, previous to their appointment, pass a satisfactory examination as to their qualifications before a board consisting of the medical officers on duty with the Regiment.
10. Hospital Sergeants will be appointed, warranted, and detailed to duty by the Surgeon-General, upon recommendation of the senior medical officer of the command to which they are to be assigned, after passing the required examination, as provided for Hospital Stewards.
11. Any of the examinations herein provided for may be taken before any board for the examination of officers under Paragraph 5, Section 2009, Political Code, State of California, if desired.
12. Hospital Stewards provided for in Section 1990, Political Code, State of California, though liable to discharge, will not be reduced. The appointment of a Hospital Sergeant may be revoked by the Surgeon-General upon the recommendation of the surgeon under whom he is serving or by sentence of a court-martial.
13. All orders, and all reports and communications relating to the Sanitary Corps shall be sent through regular channels. At each Headquarters they shall be referred to the proper officer of the Sanitary Corps, who will return them with his indorsement to the Headquarters from which he received them, and they shall thence be sent to the next Headquarters as required. All reports or communications to the Commander-in-Chief will pass through the office of the Surgeon-General.
14. All recommendations for appointment of commissioned officers of the Corps, accompanied by the report of the Examining Board, shall be forwarded through inter-

mediate commanders to the Commanding Officer of the Division, who will forward the same to the Surgeon-General, who will approve or disapprove and submit the same to the Commander-in-Chief.

15. Each Regimental Surgeon shall make a report to the Surgeon-General as to the condition and equipment of the Corps under his command, accompanied by a complete inventory of all property in his charge on December 31st and June 30th of each year.

16. The Surgeon-General shall make an annual report to the Commander-in-Chief as to the condition and equipment of the Corps on June 30th of each year.

17. In addition to reports herein prescribed, medical officers on duty with troops will make such additional reports to the Commanding Officer thereof as may be required by him.

18. Medical property and equipment shall be issued under direction of the Surgeon-General to the Surgeon of each Regiment, who shall receipt for the same and be held responsible for its care and security, the disposition and transfer of said property being at all times subject to the orders of the Surgeon-General, or of the Chief Surgeon of the Division or Brigade. Any transfer made by Brigade or Division Surgeons shall be immediately reported to the Surgeon-General and proper receipts forwarded.

19. No location for a camp or quarters for troops to be used for more than three days will be selected, unless recommended in writing by a medical officer.

20. In case of a vacancy in the office of Surgeon-General, or the absence of said officer from the State, the senior medical officer on duty with the Guard shall act as Surgeon-General.

21. Except where otherwise provided by the laws of this State, these regulations, or the orders of the Commander-in-Chief, the regulations for the Army of the United States pertaining to the Medical Department shall govern the Sanitary Corps so far as the same may be effectively applicable.

II. Section 2009, Political Code, State of California, governing the Sanitary Corps, is hereby published for the information of all concerned:

2009. 1. The Medical Department of the National Guard of California is hereby organized into a Sanitary Corps, which shall consist of one Surgeon-General, with the rank of Colonel, who shall be the executive head of the Corps, and such number of Commissioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates as may be required to furnish an efficient service for the organized strength of the National Guard.

2. The commissioned strength of the Sanitary Corps shall be determined by the organization of the National Guard, to wit: To each organized Division, one Chief Surgeon, with the rank of Colonel; to each organized Brigade, one Chief Surgeon, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel; to each organized Regiment, one Surgeon, with the rank of Major; and a Surgeon, with the rank of Captain, for each Battalion.

3. The appointment of the commissioned officers of the Sanitary Corps shall be made by the Commander-in-Chief, upon the recommendation of the Division, Brigade, Regimental, or Battalion Commanders.

4. The Commander-in-Chief is hereby authorized to transfer enlisted men of the National Guard to the Sanitary Corps, or cause to be enlisted for the same as many Hospital Sergeants, Hospital Corporals, and Privates as the service may require, who may be mounted, and permanently attached to the Sanitary Corps, under such regulations as the Commander-in-Chief may prescribe.

5. No person shall receive the appointment of Surgeon unless he is a licensed graduate of a medical school, and unless he shall have been examined and approved by a Medical Board, consisting of not less than three Surgeons, designated by the Commander-in-Chief, upon the recommendation of the Surgeon-General.

6. No person shall be transferred to or enlisted into the Sanitary Corps unless he shall have passed a satisfactory examination, as to his qualifications, before a Board of Medical Officers, to be appointed by the Commander-in-Chief, upon the recommendation of the Surgeon-General.

7. Assignments of commissioned and non-commissioned officers and privates of the Sanitary Corps shall be made, and their duties prescribed, by the Commander-in-Chief, upon the recommendation of the Surgeon-General.

8. Privates of the Sanitary Corps shall do duty as cooks, nurses, and attendants in Hospitals, and as stretcher-bearers and ambulance-drivers, and attendants in the field, and such other duties as may be required of them by proper authority.

9. The pay and emoluments of members of the Sanitary Corps shall be the same as provided by law for the pay of troops of the National Guard; they shall be subject to detail by the Surgeon-General.

10. The Sanitary Corps shall be equipped and uniformed the same as the same department in the United States Army. The funds to be expended by this Department shall be expended by the authority of the Commander-in-Chief, upon the recommendation of the Surgeon-General.

III. Section 1981, Political Code, having been held inoperative by the Attorney-General in an opinion dated September 28, 1897, no action will be taken under the said section.

IV. Colonel W. D. McCarthy will at once proceed with the reorganization of the Sanitary Corps under the regulations herein prescribed.

The Inspector-General of Rifle Practice will supervise the competition, which will be governed by the rules prescribed in "Small Arms Firing Regulations for the National Guard of California."

V. The full report of the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice of the practice for the year 1899 will be published in orders in the near future.

VI. The Inspectors of Rifle Practice on the staffs of the various commanding officers of the Guard will meet in the Supreme Court Chambers at the State Capitol, Sacramento, on the evening of July 14, 1900, to discuss the matter of target practice, and a revision of the regulations governing the same. All competitors at the State competition are invited to be present and make any suggestions they may deem proper concerning target practice. VII. VIII. In compliance with the provisions of Section 2018 of the Political Code of the State of California, the National Guard of California will parade in their respective localities on Wednesday, July 4, 1900, in celebration of the one hundred and twenty-fourth anniversary of American independence. SIR: The Uniform Board, National Guard of California, begs leave to submit the following report:

The Board organized on July 7, 1899, and proceeded to prepare specifications and forms of proposals for caps, blouses, trousers, overcoats, and chevrons for the Infantry and Cavalry; and caps, shirts, and trousers for the Naval Militia; which were finally adopted on July 10, 1899, and advertisements calling for proposals were inserted in the Los Angeles "Times," Sacramento "Record-Union," and San Francisco "Chronicle."

On July 15, 1899, the Board adopted its standard samples of cloth and all material and findings to be used in the manufacture of the above articles.

The Board desires here to acknowledge its indebtedness to Colonel O. F. Long, Quartermaster U. S. A., at San Francisco, for most material assistance received from him in the preparation of the specifications, in the listing and adopting of the standard samples, and in the testing and inspection of the manufactured articles when received. Colonel Long has always been most kind and obliging, and we thank him on behalf of the State for his very valuable assistance.

On August 26, 1899, the following bids of proposals were received by the Board, in response to the advertisements mentioned, and to furnish the articles specified:

A practical test was made of the different ranges or field kitchens, and contracts made for 36 each of the two last named. This will fully equip the Guard with "ranges."

In addition to the foregoing contracts, 900 pairs leggins have been purchased from the United States Government, at 50 cents each.

Cloth for trousers and shirts for the Naval Militia have been purchased from the United States Government to the amount of \$1,233.01, and made up and delivered, together with caps, at an additional expense, all told, of \$1,281.25.

The Band on the U. S. S. "Marion" has been uniformed also at a cost of \$304.90; being caps, coat, trousers, etc., for twenty men.

Contracts let by the Board required articles delivered to be fully up to the standards and samples, and we have employed an inspector, who rigidly inspected and stamped each article upon acceptance.

Payments have been made, seventy-five per cent on delivery, balance when contract is completed. This is the proviso in the contracts.

There have been received by the Board and delivered to various companies, etc., prior to July 1st, 1900:

By Mandel, Pursch & Weiner: 1,320 blouses.

This firm asked to be relieved from furnishing any more under their contract, and Pettibone Bros. Mfg. Co. being willing to furnish all required at their price of \$3.54, Mandel, Pursch & Weiner were relieved from furnishing any more blouses and settled with in full.

The outstanding contracts will all be filled within the month, we are informed. In fact, 62 blouses, 989 pairs of trousers, and 150 overcoats, herein enumerated as having been contracted for, have already been received and delivered. Also, the Naval Militia have their outfit.

The Board will then consider what to purchase with the funds remaining; probably, though, it will go for overcoats.

The apportionment of the \$50,000 suggested by you has been followed almost exactly, and results in each company having 60 complete uniforms except overcoats, and they have been issued, an average of 32 to each company.

APPENDIX No. 18.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS ON CAMP SITE.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., December 20, 1899.

HONORABLE HENRY T. GAGE,
Governor of California, and Commander-in-Chief, N. G. C.,
Sacramento, California:

SIR: The undersigned, acting under and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon them by an Act of the Legislature entitled "An Act to establish a Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of the State of California, and to authorize the acquisition, by donation, of a site for the same," approved March 4, 1899 (Statutes 1899, page 65), beg leave to report that the City of Santa Cruz, having received by bequest a tract of land known as the "De Laveaga Heights," embracing upward of six hundred acres, offered to donate to the State of California such portion of said tract as might be required. No offer has been received from any other source. The commissioners named in said Act have visited the proposed camp site at Santa Cruz twice, and have thoroughly examined it and carefully considered its position and availability from every standpoint, and beg leave to report as follows:

The proposed camp site is about one and a half miles from the sea beach at Santa Cruz, by the most direct route, which passes through the city and upon its principal street. It is at a considerable elevation, overlooking the entire Santa Cruz Valley and Monterey Bay. There is an abundance of room for the encampment of the Division, N. G. C.

Major Norboe, until recently Engineer on General Muller's Staff, Third Brigade, N. G. C., has prepared some maps of the property, which are referred to herein.

Colonel William D. McCarthy, Surgeon on the Division Staff, N. G. C., has visited the grounds and examined them carefully, and reports that the sanitary conditions of the camp are most excellent.

After consulting with the Mayor and other officials of the City of Santa Cruz, and considering the matter fully, we beg leave to recommend that the offer of Santa Cruz be accepted, and that a deed be accepted by the State to a portion of the land mentioned, to about one hundred and thirty acres, with the right to use such portion of the remainder as the commanding officer of any encampment sees fit to use during such encampment. The City of Santa Cruz to furnish all necessary water for any encampment; the same to be piped to such places as may be indicated, when the camp shall be established. The City of Santa Cruz to care for and keep the camp site in good condition, together with any building and property thereon, and to have the use of the camp site, when the same is not required by the State, but the same is not to be plowed or cultivated in any manner. The said City of Santa Cruz also to provide not less than three arc lights, during the encampment, free of charge.

We are unable to say whether the description is exact or not, in the accompanying papers, signed by the Mayor and Mr. Hihn of Santa Cruz, as a committee, but presume that it is.

For your information, we beg leave to submit herewith a communication signed by the Mayor and Mr. Hihn on behalf of the City of Santa Cruz. We also ask you to consider the maps now on file in the Adjutant-General's office at Sacramento, made by Major Norboe, showing the proposed arrangement of tentage on this ground, and also the body of land proposed to be accepted.

We are informed that the City of Santa Cruz has been assured that we shall have the best of railroad rates, and reference is made thereto, in the accompanying communication, and what is of still more importance is the fact that transportation by water to and from the site is available to the major portion of the State.

We feel assured that the City of Santa Cruz will also assist in the building of a proper storehouse, which can be used permanently on the encampment grounds.

Considering the location and availability of this site, and all things considered, we believe that it would be difficult to find a healthier, more accessible, or better camp ground for our National Guard.

We respectfully propose that, with due regard to the above considerations, the proposed site be accepted, and that the Attorney-General be requested to pass upon necessary deeds and agreement, to the end that the site may be accepted, and rendered available for use at the next encampment.

Proposition of Committee Representing City of Santa Cruz to State of California Relative to Camp Site for National Guard.

WHEREAS, The Legislature of the State of California, by an Act entitled "An Act to establish a Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of the State of California, and to authorize the acquisition, by donation, of a site for the same," approved March 4, 1899, did establish at or near the City of Santa Cruz, County of Santa Cruz, State of California, a Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of California; and

WHEREAS, The Adjutant-General, Major-General, and senior Brigadier-General of the National Guard of California were by the said Legislature appointed a commission for the purpose of selecting a suitable site for the said Camp of Instruction at or near the City of Santa Cruz; and

WHEREAS, The said commissioners have examined certain tracts of land at or near the City of Santa Cruz for the location of the said Camp of Instruction, and have selected from the said tracts of land, as the most suitable site for the said Camp of Instruction, a certain tract, being a portion of what is known as "De Laveaga Heights," situated near the City of Santa Cruz; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Santa Cruz, and the Board of Supervisors of the County of Santa Cruz, have, and each of them have heretofore by resolutions duly adopted, tendered and offered to the State of California, for the purposes and uses of the said Camp of Instruction, without consideration other than that arising from the location of the said Camp of Instruction, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, such portion of the said "De Laveaga Heights" as may be selected by the said commissioners; and

WHEREAS, The undersigned have been duly appointed a committee to represent the said Mayor and Common Council of the City of Santa Cruz, in all matters referring and relating to the establishing and location of the said Camp of Instruction;

Now, therefore, There is hereby tendered to the State of California, in accordance with the premises, without consideration other than that arising from the location of the said Camp of Instruction thereon, the said tract of land so selected by the said commissioners, and in the event of the action of said commissioners meeting the approval of the Governor of the State of California, as required by the said Act of the said Legislature, said City of Santa Cruz shall execute to the people of the State of California the necessary conveyances therefor.

It is further promised and agreed that during any encampment or encampments of the National Guard of California, the said National Guard shall have the privilege, under the direction and control of its commanding officers, of using such other portion or portions of the said "De Laveaga Heights" for the purposes of instruction or drill as may at that time be agreed upon by such commanding officers and the Board of Supervisors of said Santa Cruz County and the Mayor and Common Council of said city.

It is further promised and agreed that said city shall place on said tract of land sufficient water pipes and hydrants to supply the said National Guard free of cost with all water necessary for its use.

It is further promised and agreed that said city will, without cost to the State or said National Guard, suitably and properly grade the road which leads from Branciforte Avenue to the said tract of land.

It is further promised and agreed that during such encampments there shall be placed on said tract of land, without cost to the State or the National Guard, at least three arc lights or lamps supplied with electric current, and placed at such points as may be chosen by the commanding officers of the National Guard.

This committee further states that the undersigned W. H. Lamb, Mayor of said city, has arranged with the Southern Pacific Company that said company will transport the members of the National Guard to and from said city, to and from all points in said State connected by rail, during the times of any encampments of the said National Guard at said Camp of Instruction, at a rate considerably less than one half the regular rates.

With reference to the proposed building of an armory or storehouse on said tract of land, this committee has no authority to bind said city, but it is satisfied that there will be no difficulty in securing by subscription from the citizens of said city and of said county a sufficient sum of money to defray part of the expenses of said proposed building.

The tract of land selected as aforesaid is bounded by a line beginning in the middle of Blackburn Gulch road, at the southwest corner of "De

Laveaga Heights" tract; thence easterly along the southerly boundary of said tract to the east side of the first gulch, being the gulch through which passes the Pilkington road; thence northerly along the east side of said gulch and along the right branch thereof to the top of the hill; thence continuing northerly in the same general direction to and along the middle of another gulch on the north side of the hill to the graded road; thence northwesterly along said road to the fence inclosing the orchard; thence westerly along a line near to said fence to the said Blackburn Gulch road; and thence along said road southerly to the place of beginning; the use of the roads in said tract being reserved.

Resolved, By the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Santa Cruz, that there be and hereby is tendered and offered to the State of California for the purposes and uses of a State Camp of Instruction for the National Guard of the State of California, without consideration other than that arising from the location of said Camp of Instruction in accordance with the provisions of said proposed bill, such portion of said tract of land as may be selected by commissioners appointed for that purpose, and that said Mayor and Common Council hereby agree and promise to enter into and make such conveyance or conveyances as may be necessary in the premises; and be it further

Resolved, That Mayor W. H. Lamb and F. A. Hihn are hereby appointed a committee to represent said Mayor and Common Council and said City of Santa Cruz before the Legislature of the State of California or any committee thereof, or any Board of Commissioners created thereby, in all matters connected with the proposed location of said Camp of Instruction.

Report of Major P. M. Norboe, Engineer Officer, Third Brigade, N. G. C., in Regard to the Proposed Site for Camp of Instruction for National Guard of California, near City of Santa Cruz.

SIR: You are hereby directed to proceed at once to Santa Cruz to inspect the Laveaga camp site, with the view of determining the practicability of supplying the site with water from the Santa Cruz water works, and also to plat that portion to be selected by the State as a camp site.

In compliance therewith I proceeded by first train to Santa Cruz, arriving there on Sunday, the 4th inst.; made the necessary investigations on the 5th inst.

I found, according to the records of the Santa Cruz water works and of the City Engineer, that the elevation of the reservoir from which the city draws its water is 400 feet above the sea, with a depth, when full, of 31 feet, making a maximum elevation of the surface of the water of 431 feet.

The elevation of the highest point on the proposed camp-site is given as 320 feet, leaving a difference in elevation of 80 to 111 feet. The distance is approximately three miles.

There is a pressure regulator on the principal main leading from the reservoir, and about 2,000 feet from the same, which reduces the pressure in the pipes throughout the city to about 90 pounds per square inch, equivalent to a head of about 200 feet. It is considered unsafe to subject the pipes in the city to a greater pressure than they now sustain, and as the Heights are over 300 feet above the city the pipes cannot be used.

A new pipe will be necessary, which may tap the main immediately above the regulator, thus getting the pressure from the reservoir, and saving 2,000 feet in length of pipe required.

The greatest demand to which the water-supply will ever be subject will be during a Division encampment. Assuming that such a camp would contain 4,000 men and 300 head of horses, allowing 5 gallons per day to each man and 10 gallons to each horse, would require 23,000

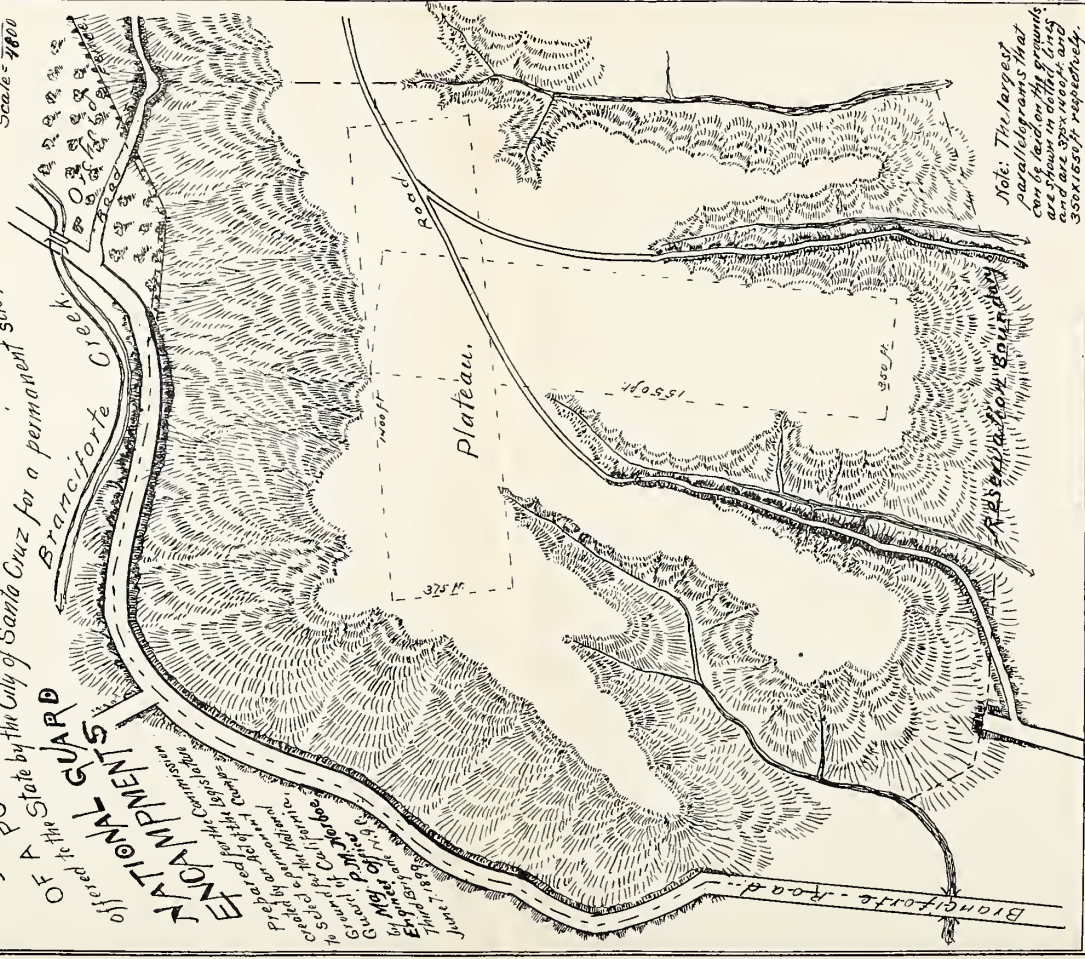
MAP OF A PORTION OF

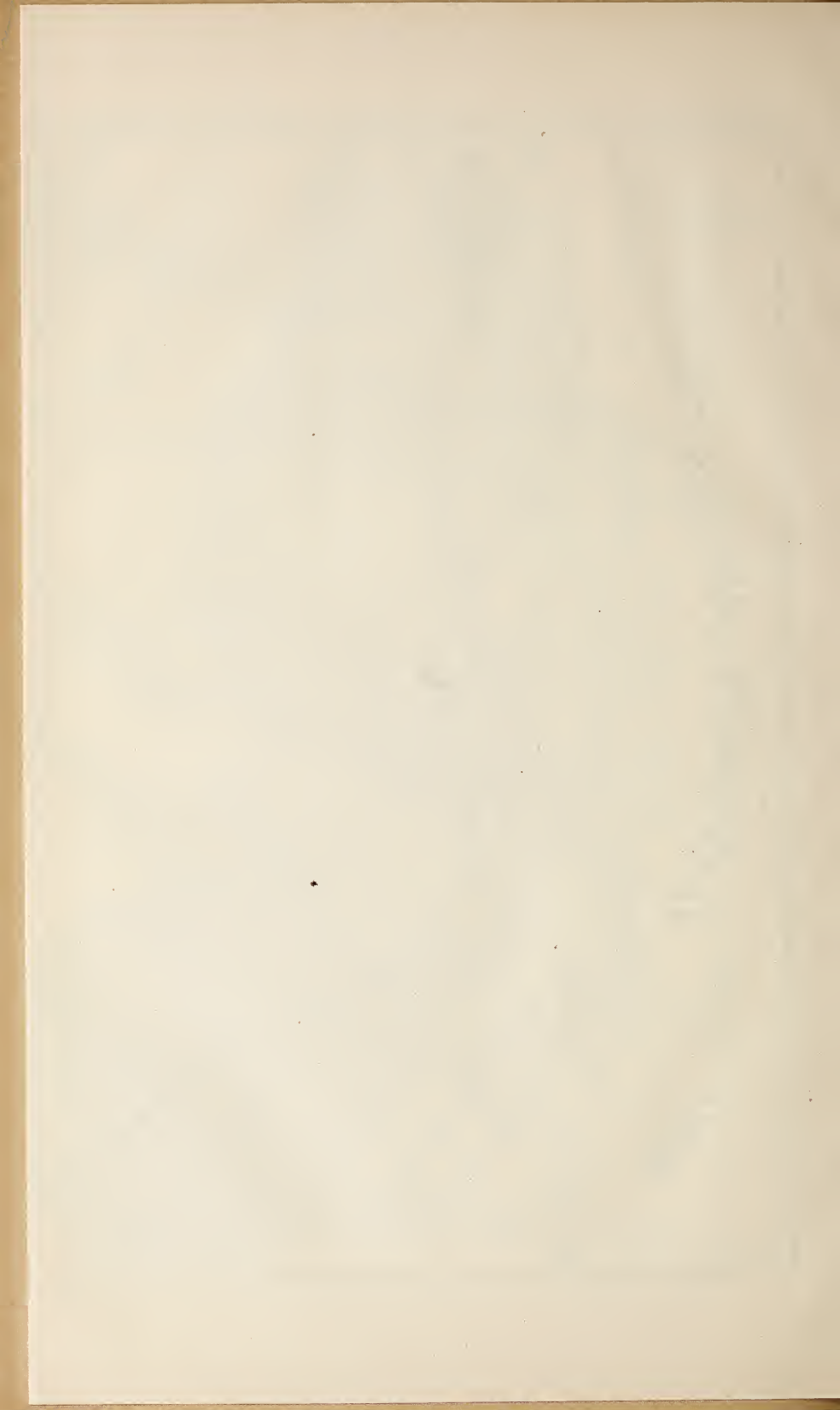

gallons for a day's supply. Allowing for waste and sprinkling, will bring the total up to, say, 30,000 gallons for each twenty-four hours. Nearly all of it will be used during daylight and probably two-thirds will be consumed within six hours, or at the rate of 3,300 gallons per hour.

Under the conditions obtained, a pipe four inches in diameter would be required; but by far the cheaper and safer way would be to provide tankage on the grounds for at least one full day's supply, in which case a 2½-inch pipe will suffice.

Should a camp be held this year, the city will scarcely be prepared to lay the long pipe necessary, but I am assured that the Council will adopt an alternative plan as a temporary expedient, viz: to put in a temporary pumping plant at the foot of the bluff west of the camp site, and pump from either Branciforte Creek or from Mr. Hihn's ditch.

It seems probable that further investigation may show this latter to be the better plan for a permanent means of furnishing the water.

I have prepared a sketch plan of the proposed camp site, showing the shape and approximate size of the area available for camping purposes.

The question of sinks is one that will demand early consideration. Owing to the narrowness of the grounds, all of the plateau lands will be required for tent space and parade grounds, so that the sinks will either be located uncomfortably close to the tents, or down the side of the bluffs in the brush where it will be difficult to dig pits, on account of the steep slope and the rocky nature of the ground.

I take the liberty of suggesting, therefore, that permanent latrines be constructed on the side-hills, out of sight from the camp grounds, and that they be provided with "washout" receptacles and sewer pipes to carry the sewage down into the bottom of the brushy ravines, too far away to become offensive.

In compliance with instructions (unofficial) from General R. L. Peeler, I send this report direct to General Headquarters, and forward copies through channels.

**EXTRACTS FROM THE NAVY DEPARTMENT'S REPORT OF
THE OPERATIONS OF THE NAVAL MILITIA FOR
THE YEAR 1899.**

NAVY DEPARTMENT,
WASHINGTON, November 3, 1899.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the report on the operations of the Naval Militia during the past year, and to call your especial attention thereto.

Early last year, under your direction, and for the first time, extensive preparations were made for giving the different State organizations a tour of duty at sea, as nearly as possible under regular navy conditions.

A careful itinerary was arranged, and three naval vessels were assigned to this service, each with an excellent complement of officers and men, especially selected with a view to the important work committed to their charge. This work has been faithfully and carefully completed, and the accompanying report is filled with timely and valuable information.

I take pleasure in commending the zeal and fidelity with which the officers connected with the vessels assigned have carried out their instructions.

In a report made to you one year ago I had the honor of calling your attention to a scheme for the organization of a National Naval Reserve, which was embodied in the form of a bill (H. R. 11,535) and presented to Congress upon your recommendation.

The experience of the past year has suggested certain changes in the above plan; such changes are embodied in the report of the officer in charge of Naval Militia affairs, and are cordially approved.

I desire to add the hope that the general plan for the organization of a National Naval Reserve may again receive the indorsement and recommendation of the Department.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following annual report upon matters connected with the Naval Militia organizations now existing in several of the States:

* * * * *

The Department being fully alive to the necessity for being able to immediately utilize a reserve force upon the outbreak of war, recommended to Congress, in the last report of the Secretary of the Navy, a scheme for the organization and enrollment of a National Naval Reserve.

Lack of time having made it impossible for the Congress to consider and pass upon this important matter, and the Department realizing that the only class fulfilling the conditions mentioned above which might possibly be made available in an emergency was that of the several

State Naval Militia organizations, decided to give such of these organizations as would accept its offer a period of drill and instruction on board ship at sea, such drill and instruction to conform as near as possible to what obtains on the modern man-of-war.

With this idea in view, the Department assigned three vessels, the U. S. S. "Prairie," the U. S. S. "Michigan," and the U. S. S. "Badger," and placed the vessels and the entire matter of drill and instruction under your direct supervision.

* * * * *

The U. S. S. "Badger."—This vessel, under the command of Commander James M. Miller, U. S. N., was assigned to a course of drill and instruction of the Naval Militia organizations of Pacific Coast States.

The Governors of California and Oregon were informed of the Department's proposals as to a course of instruction and drill for the Naval Militia organizations of their respective States, and each offered all practical coöperation.

The itinerary for the cruise of the "Badger" was as follows: Leave San Francisco August 20; arrive Portland, Or., August 23. Leave Portland with Oregon Naval Militia from August 24 to September 1. Leave Portland September 1 and pick up Eureka Division of California Naval Militia September 3, cruising to San Francisco with Eureka Division, picking up San Francisco Division September 5. Leave San Francisco September 6, returning to Eureka with Eureka Division on the 11th. Leave Eureka September 11, and return to San Francisco September 13. Coal ship at San Francisco from September 13 to 16. Leave San Francisco September 16, picking up Santa Cruz Division September 17, Santa Barbara Division on the 18th, and San Diego Division on 19th. Return to San Francisco about October 1.

The following is a copy of the instructions furnished to the commanding officer of the U. S. S. "Badger":

It is the desire of the Department that the Naval Militia organizations of the Pacific Coast States shall each take a tour of duty for one week under way at sea, with a view to their practical instruction and drill in actual man-of-war routine, and in target practice under varying conditions. To this end the Department has arranged an itinerary, and has communicated its intentions to the Governors of the States concerned.

In order to facilitate this work you will communicate directly with the Adjutants-General of these States in sufficient time to complete all necessary arrangements. In order to aid you in so doing, copies of all communications passing between these several States and the Department will be forwarded to you.

Each State will be expected to subsist its own organization, and to provide proper bedding and individual mess gear.

At the beginning of each tour the "Badger" will remain in port no longer than one day, and will pass not less than five of the remaining days actually at sea, and not more than two days at subcaliber practice in such bay or harbor as you may deem desirable.

For purposes of target practice you are authorized to expend for each complete State organization six rounds for each 5-inch gun, fifty rounds for each 3-pounder rapid-fire gun, and subcaliber ammunition at your discretion.

As soon as possible after the end of each tour of drill and instruction you will have a board, consisting of the navigator, gunnery-instruction officer, and surgeon, report upon the following points:

1. The efficiency of each officer, based upon his knowledge of the naval duties of the rank he holds under the State, and his manner of performing such duties.
2. The previous naval service, if any, of each officer.
3. Enlisted force: (a) Number of petty officers and enlisted men; (b) professional knowledge; (c) number that have served in the Navy; (d) number in seafaring class; (e) number in all other classes, with their occupations; (f) efficiency for the naval service; (g) general physique of the organization.
4. Discipline of the organization.
5. Character of local work performed by the organization.
6. Recommendations and additional remarks.

When circumstances are such as to prevent carrying out the instructions contained herein, you will use your own discretion.

Copies of the itinerary of the cruise and of all communications between the Department and the States relating to this service will be forwarded to you from time to time.

You will keep the Assistant Secretary informed of all arrangements made, and will furnish him with copies of all important correspondence.

In case you do not arrive at San Francisco in time to make the inclosed itinerary practicable, you will put off the commencement of the cruise to the earliest date possible, and will inform the Governor of each State of your action.

The reports called for in the above instructions were made, and with the exception of those in regard to the officers, which will be retained in the files of the Navy Department, are herein given for each State, as follows:

* * * * *

California, first detail.—Ten officers, 29 petty officers, and 70 enlisted men took advantage of the Department's proposal of an eight-day cruise on the U. S. S. "Badger." Of the enlisted force, 6 petty officers and 6 enlisted men had seen previous service at sea.

The report of the board of officers states:

U. S. S. "BADGER."

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., September 13, 1899.

SIR: 1. In obedience to your order of the 24th ultimo, we respectfully make the following report upon the First, Second, and Fifth Divisions of the Naval Militia of the State of California, which were on board this vessel eight days on a cruise of drill and instruction.

2. * * *

3. There were 100 petty officers and enlisted men on board. The professional knowledge, efficiency for the naval service, and discipline we consider good.

4. The physique is very good.

5. The character of local work performed is given by divisions. The First and Second Divisions—both of San Francisco—have the U. S. S. "Marion," which they use as an armory. They have been drilled at physical exercise, infantry, and artillery, both on the "Marion" and on shore. In artillery, they have the Hotchkiss 1-pounders, which they frequently mounted in a cutter and took out for drill. They had target practice once a month with 0.45 caliber Lee-Remond, at 200, 300, and 500 yards range, giving prizes for qualification in the three higher classes of marksmanship. In boats they have been exercised at rowing, sailing, and at fleet tactics. They have made various cruises, covering from one to four days, in steam and sailing schooners, the vessels being wholly manned by the militia. On the "Marion" they have been instructed in marlinspike seamanship, at steering, upon standing and running rigging, parts of ship, and somewhat upon the organization of a ship's company, such as watch and station billets and messing. They have also been instructed upon the compass.

6. The Fifth Division (Eureka) has been drilled at physical exercise, infantry and artillery, both in armory and outside. This division has also a 1-pounder Hotchkiss, with which they frequently drilled in a cutter. They have had boat drill and signals (wigwag). This division has no vessel, and is in consequence at a disadvantage. We believe their efficiency would be much increased if a steam launch, fully equipped, were supplied.

7. The marks assigned to the various drills are: Signals, fair; pistols, good; sword exercise, indifferent; setting-up exercise, very good; great guns, very good; navigation, good.

8. Appended hereto is a summary of the enlisted force, giving their occupations.

9. We believe the efficiency of the militia of this coast would be increased if an officer of the regular naval service were detailed to drill and inspect them. They need instruction in navigation, seamanship, and gunnery. They should at least be supplied with standard books on professional subjects.

10. The San Francisco divisions would gain much benefit if they could be allowed to go aboard our vessels while anchored in the harbor, at such time as the commanding officers of the vessels might deem it suitable, for drill and instruction. We believe this would be practicable, as the anchorage for naval vessels is very near the wharf where the "Marion" is moored. In this connection we think the "Marion" could be of service to our vessels anchored in the harbor in the way of signaling during the day and also at night, if a night-signaling apparatus were installed in the "Marion." This could be done at small expense, as the "Marion" now has a dynamo, and is also connected with the electric-lighting system of San Francisco.

11. We suggest, if it is impracticable to supply modern guns to the different militia divisions, that complete models of "V" and "VI" be supplied. We also recommend that 30 single sticks be supplied to each division.

California, second detail.—Fourteen officers, 47 petty officers, and 104 enlisted men took advantage of the Department's proposal of an eight-day cruise for instruction and drill on the U. S. S. "Badger." Of

the enlisted force, 8 petty officers and 6 enlisted men had seen previous service at sea.

The report of the board of officers states:

U. S. S. "BADGER,"
SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., September 29, 1899.

SIR: In obedience to your order of the 24th ultimo, we respectfully make the following report upon the Third, Fourth, and Sixth, and Engineer Divisions of the Naval Militia of the State of California, which were on board this vessel from seven to eleven days on a cruise of drill and instruction:

3. There were 151 petty officers and enlisted men on board.
4. The professional knowledge and efficiency for the naval service we consider good and the discipline very good. The physique is very good.
5. The character of local work performed is given by divisions.
6. The Third Division (San Diego) has the U. S. S. "Pinta," which they use as a drill and instruction ship. She is under the command of Lieutenant Thomas M. Shaw, who is navigator of the entire organization of the Naval Militia of California. The Third Division has been drilled at infantry, including target practice at 200, 300, and 500 yards with .45 caliber. It has been drilled at artillery—school of the section—with 3-inch B. L. R. field piece; at gun drill on "Pinta" with imaginary 5-inch and 6-pounder quick-firing guns, using Howitzer and 3-inch B. L. R.; the division has also been drilled with the Gatling, at fire drill, and general quarters, all with bugle. In seamanship the division has been exercised in boats at rowing, sailing, and fleet tactics, using international code. Members of the division have been exercised at marlinspike seamanship, using ground tackle, and at setting sails. They have also been instructed in the use of the mariner's compass.
7. The Fourth Division (Santa Cruz) has been drilled at physical exercise, infantry, both in armory and outside, including target practice at 200, 300, and 500 yards with .45 caliber Lee-Metford magazine rifles, and in artillery with 3-inch rapid-fire guns. This division has a whale-boat which is unserviceable, and a cutter in need of repairs. They have been used, however, both in rowing and sailing.
8. The Sixth Division (Santa Barbara) has been drilled at infantry and target practice the same as the Third Division. The division has no gun and therefore has not been drilled or instructed in gunnery. The division has a whale-boat and cutter belonging to the "Pinta," in which the members have been exercised at rowing and sailing.
9. The Engineer Division is composed mostly of residents of Los Angeles, and has been completely organized a few weeks only. The members have been drilled somewhat at infantry in the armory. They have been given lectures or talks on triple and quadruple expansion engines, marine boilers, condensers and pumps, naval architecture and ship construction, screw propellers, and other matters pertaining to marine engineering.
10. The marks assigned to the various drills are: Signals, fair; pistol, good; sword exercise, indifferent; setting-up exercise, very good; navigation, good; great guns, very good.
11. Appended hereto is a summary of the enlisted force, giving their occupations.
12. To increase the efficiency of these divisions we make the following suggestions: If the "Pinta" were put in seagoing condition she could make frequent short cruises, officered and manned by the militia, which would be of inestimable value to the organization. Each of the divisions should be supplied with models of modern rapid-firing guns, with signal outfit for wigwag, and with at least 20 single-sticks; they should also be supplied with standard professional books. The "Pinta" is wired for electric lights, receiving the current from the City of San Diego; if an electric generating set and night-signaling apparatus were installed we believe the Third Division would perfect themselves at night-signaling. The Santa Cruz and Santa Barbara Divisions should each be supplied with a steam launch, fully equipped, and with 1-pounder Hotchkiss gun, to be mounted in steam launch. Whenever any of our vessels visit the different ports where members of this organization are located, they should be allowed to go on board for instruction at the discretion of the commanding officer.
13. The officers of this organization are unanimous in the opinion that it should be national and under the Navy Department instead of being under State control; we are also of the opinion. We believe the cruises made on this vessel have tended more to increase the efficiency of the Naval Militia than a whole year of drills on shore, and such cruises should be given the organization as often as possible.
14. We repeat our suggestion made in our last report, that a naval officer be detailed to drill and instruct the different divisions of the organization on the Pacific Coast.

SOUTHERN CRUISE.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 30, 1899.

SIR: In compliance with General Orders No. 8, dated July 22, 1899, and issued from General Headquarters at Sacramento, California, the members of the Naval Militia were ordered to cruise on board the U. S. S. "Badger" for eight days. The report of the Northern cruise is made separately.

The Southern cruise commenced after the Third Division at San Diego, and a portion of the Engineer Division at the same place, had been embarked, September 20, 1899.

The "Badger" was in command of Commander James M. Miller, U. S. N., and Lieutenant-Commander John B. Milton, U. S. N., Executive Officer, with the following officers of the Navy:

Brigadier-General W. H. Seamans, Adjutant-General of the State of California, was present during the cruise, as a guest of Captain Miller, but at the same time it is well known that all the work of the Naval Militia was closely observed by the Chief of Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, during the entire cruise.

Subsistence for officers and men was furnished by the State, and the entire matter was ably and most satisfactorily managed by Lieutenant Douglas White, Paymaster of the Naval Militia, whose report, in detail, is attached hereto.

The Medical Department was in charge of Ensign Benjamin A. Plant, Assistant Surgeon, whose report is also hereto attached.

Lieutenant Junior Grade Frank Van Vleck, Passed Assistant Engineer, N. M., N. G. C., was assigned to duty in the engine-room, together with eighteen petty officers and men of the Engineer Division, all of whom were under the supervision and instruction of Lieutenant W. C. Herbert, Chief Engineer of the "Badger."

Lieutenant-Commander Thomas A. Nerney performed the duties of Executive Officer of the ship, under the instruction of Lieutenant-Commander J. B. Milton, U. S. N., while all the other officers of the Naval Militia performed the duties of their respective grades, each under the instruction of a regular officer of the ship.

LOG.

The U. S. S. "Badger" left San Francisco Sunday morning, September 17, 1899, at 10:30, on the Southern cruise of the Naval Militia, N. G. C. Brigadier-General W. H. Seamans, Lieutenant-Commander Thomas A. Nerney, Paymaster Douglas White, Assistant Surgeon Benjamin A. Plant, and two chief petty officers of the Naval Militia were on board. Weather very foggy. Arrived at Santa Cruz 10:45 A. M. September 18, 1899, in a heavy fog. Took on board two officers of the Fourth Division, and thirty-one petty officers and men.

Left Santa Cruz at 12:15 (noon) for Santa Barbara. Arrived at Santa Barbara at 4 P. M., September 19, 1899, in a heavy fog. Took on board three officers and forty petty officers and men.

Left Santa Barbara at 7 P. M., September 19, 1899, and arrived at San Diego at 11 A. M., September 20, 1899. Took on board Lieutenant Shaw, and four officers of the Third Division, and sixty petty officers and men of the Third Division; also Lieutenant Frank Van Vleck, Passed Assistant Engineer, and eighteen petty officers and men of the Engineer Division.

Left San Diego at 4:40 P. M., September 20, 1899. Arrived off San Clemente Island at 2 P. M., September 21, 1899, and changed course toward Santa Catalina Island. Arrived off Santa Catalina Island at 4:30 P. M., September 21, 1899. Continued on course and arrived at San Pedro at 7 P. M., and dropped anchor. Got under way at 7:10 A. M., September 22, 1899, and headed toward San Diego, Cal. This was to avoid the heavy fog prevailing at this place. Arrived two and one half miles off Coronado and anchored at 5:56 P. M., September 22, 1899.

September 23, 1899, commenced subcaliber practice at 9:30 A. M.

Sent gig ashore at Coronado at 2:15 P. M., with General Seamans and Paymaster White. At 10 A. M., Sunday, September 24, 1899, lying at anchor off Coronado, immediately after Sunday inspection, all hands were called aft on deck, and a medal of honor presented to Michael Gibbons, oiler, and a Dewey medal to Louis Rassmussen, coal passer. The presentation was made by Commander Miller, Captain of the U. S. S. "Badger," after which he called for three cheers to be given to the heroes honored. Three rousing cheers were given by the officers and crew of the U. S. S. "Badger," and of the Naval Militia, N. G. C.

At 5 P. M., General Seamans returned on board from Coronado.

September 25, 1899, got under way for actual target practice, and after actual practice with the secondary batteries and 5-inch guns headed for Coronado, where the ship dropped anchor at 4:15 P. M., about two thirds of a mile off Coronado Hotel.

September 26, 1899. General Seamans left ship at 10:15 A. M., in the gig. Hoisted anchor and got under way at 1:25 P. M., for San Diego. Dropped anchor in San Diego Bay at 2:40 P. M., and 3:15 P. M. all hands were called aft, where Commander Miller made a parting speech, which was replied to by Lieutenant Lindsay presenting a set of resolutions to Commander Miller and Lieutenant-Commander Milton, thanking them for the interest and attention given the organization during the cruise. At 3:35 P. M., commenced landing the Third and Engineer Divisions. All landed at 4:30 P. M.

September 27, 1899. Up anchor and under way at 2 P. M. Dropped pilot (Captain A. H. Dill) outside heads off Point Lobos at 2:50 P. M., and headed for Santa Barbara.

September 28, 1899. Dropped anchor off Santa Barbara at 8 A. M. (very heavy fog). Commenced landing the Santa Barbara Division at 8:30 A. M., finished at 9:30 A. M., and got under way at 10:30 A. M.

September 29, 1899. Came to anchor at 9:10 A. M., off Santa Cruz. Commenced disembarking Fourth Division at 9:20 A. M., and sent off last boat load at 9:45 A. M. Up anchor at 10:10 A. M., and under way at 10:30 A. M., for San Francisco. Arrived at San Francisco at 5:30 P. M., September 29, 1899.

The officers and crew of the "Badger," by their constant and careful instruction to the officers and men of the Naval Militia, during this cruise, have done more for this organization in the art of naval warfare than could possibly have been done in months of the present mode of drill and instruction in the Naval Militia, and it is hoped that at least one cruise a year will be held similar to this one.

The officers and men of the Naval Militia were at all times diligent, attentive, and most anxious to learn, and were also prompt in observing every order issued.

In conclusion, the commanding officer of the Naval Militia wishes to say that the conduct, appearance, and general qualifications of both officers and men were very good.

The commanding officers of divisions are commended for their untiring zeal and attention, which assisted in a very great measure in making the cruise what it was—a success in every particular.

SIR: I have the honor to report as the operations of my department during the cruises of the different Divisions of the California Naval Militia, on board the U. S. S. "Badger," as follows:

From the First and Second Divisions, and that portion of the Engineer Division assigned to the U. S. S. "Marion," commissary was furnished for 54 men for a period of 8½ days.

From the Third Division and that portion of the Engineer Division assigned to the U. S. S. "Pinta," commissary was furnished for 78 men for a period of 6 days.

From the Fourth Division (headquarters at Santa Cruz, Cal.), commissary was furnished for 31 men for a period of 11 days.

From the Fifth Division (headquarters at Eureka, Cal.), commissary was furnished for 44 men for a period of $8\frac{1}{2}$ days.

From the Sixth Division (headquarters at Santa Barbara, Cal.), commissary was furnished for 40 men for a period of $8\frac{1}{4}$ days.

From San Francisco, there were embarked upon the Southern cruise three men (petty officers), for whom commissary was furnished during a period of 13 days.

During the entire period of both cruises, the commissary department furnished $1,997\frac{1}{2}$ rations for enlisted men, at a total cost for this subsistence of \$996.05, or a cost of a slight fraction under 50 cents per ration. This expenditure included a first-class commissary, in which fresh meats, fresh vegetables, and butter were furnished to the men in excess of regulation Government ration. In fact, the ration of the Naval Militia was superior in every respect to the regulation Government ration, which, at Government prices, is estimated to cost 30 cents per ration.

Owing to the accommodations for the messing of the officers upon the "Badger," it was impossible to establish a ward-room mess; therefore, by the kindness of the officers of the "Badger," the officers of the Naval Militia were admitted to the "Badger's" ward-room mess at a cost of \$1.50 per day per officer. For this subsistence of officers the following amounts were paid:

From the First and Second Divisions, and that portion of the Engineer Division assigned to the U. S. S. "Marion," 5 officers were quartered in the "Badger's" ward room for a period of 8 days, at a total expense of \$60.

From the Third Division, and that portion of the Engineer Division assigned to the U. S. S. "Pinta," 5 officers were quartered in the "Badger's" ward room, for a period of 6 days, at a total cost of \$45.

From the Fourth Division (headquarters at Santa Cruz), 2 officers were quartered in the "Badger's" ward room for a period of 11 days, at a total cost of \$33.

From the Fifth Division (headquarters at Eureka, Cal.), 4 officers were quartered in the "Badger's" ward room for a period of 8 days, at a total cost of \$48.

From the Sixth Division (headquarters at Santa Barbara, Cal.), 3 officers were quartered in the "Badger's" ward room for a period of 8 days, at a total cost of \$36.

From Battalion Headquarters, 1 officer was quartered in the "Badger's" ward room for a period of 20 days, at a total cost of \$30; 2 officers for a period of 12 days, at a total cost of \$36; and 1 officer for 6 days, at a total cost of \$9.

Total cost of the subsistence of officers during both cruises of Battalion, \$297.

in the number of hammock lashings required. This line was furnished by the "Badger," and a receipt therefor signed by myself, which will reach Headquarters through the proper channels.

SIR: Pursuant to the provisions of Paragraph VIII of Special Orders No. 4, approved June 5, 1899, detailing the undersigned to ascertain and determine what rents, wages, and other proper expenses should be paid in consequence of mustering into the United States Volunteer service of any portion of the National Guard, under the Act of the Legislature, approved March 8, 1899, I have the honor to report that there have been filed under said Act two hundred and thirty-eight (238) claims for the following:

The above reductions of \$8,878.07 made by the officer on detail duty were made because, in most instances, the services, rentals, or supplies were sought to be collected under the Act of March 3, 1899, when the State had already made ample appropriations to pay the same. In others, the claims could not be allowed under the Act, as other provisions had been made to meet the same, in a few items, by Congress, and there were a few cases of overcharges.

WAR CLAIMS OF THE STATE AGAINST THE UNITED STATES.

Included among the other duties in above Special Orders No. 4, was the completion of the war claims of the State against the United States, growing out of the war with Spain. This duty I have performed, and claims aggregating the sum of \$18,177.98 have been prepared by me and presented to your Department, and these claims were made the subject of a special report on June 20, 1900, a copy of which report is attached hereto, marked "Exhibit D," and made a part hereof.

The total claims of the State against the United States growing out of the war with Spain thus far prepared aggregate \$172,664.64.

ACCOUNT ORDNANCE-STORES CLAIMS AGAINST THE UNITED STATES.

The State furnished to the United States in the "Spanish-American War of 1898" ordnance stores aggregating at cost price the sum of \$59,060.83, and has received, in exchange, most of this property in kind. A statement of these receipts is marked "Exhibit F," and attached hereto.

The Federal Government will not pay any cash for these stores, but will exchange stores in kind only for the same.

EXTRA PAY OF THE NATIONAL GUARD IN 1898—SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR.

Under the Acts of July 8, 1898, and the amendments of March 3, 1899, allowing pay at State rate to the officers and men of the National Guard, Militia, or Naval Reserves, who were accepted into the Volunteer army, and such officers and men thereof as appeared at the rendezvous for muster but were rejected, 2,340 claims have been collected, aggregating \$48,218.29.

Blanks for the collection of these claims were distributed to the Captains of companies when the last of the companies of the Guard that entered the Volunteers had reported back for duty and been accepted under the Reorganization Act of the Legislature, approved March 21,

1899, and it is largely through the efforts of the Captains and their organizations that so many of these claims have been collected. It has been a difficult matter to reach all the men of the Volunteer organizations entitled to claims under the said Act of Congress, as many of the men immediately after their muster-out of the Volunteer service took their departure from the local company town or city, and became scattered not only over this State but over the United States, and some are in the Philippines. Many of these men have been reached by mail, but there will be other claims coming in from time to time. The Captain in his own locality has been directed to aid those Captains of other companies to locate these men, and aid them in presenting their claims, and it is expected that most of those entitled to claims will ultimately be reached.

The 2,340 claims filed I have gone over carefully, and adjusted the same to agree with the record of the men's service as shown from the data on file in the Adjutant-General's office, as will more fully appear from the claims themselves. Attached hereto is a statement of such adjustments made by me, and also extracts from the different Acts of Congress, Orders from the War Department, etc., relating to or affecting these claims, which is marked "Exhibit G."

I will state, in passing, that there is now in the State Treasury as unexpended balances of the funds appropriated for the support of the National Guard for the forty-ninth and fiftieth fiscal years the sum of \$19,104.69, which, owing to the conditions growing out of the war with Spain in 1898, were not expended, as most of the companies were in the Volunteer service.

Attached hereto is a statement of these balances in funds, marked "Exhibit H."

Herewith I hand you 2,340 claims of the men for extra pay, aggregating \$48,218.29.

I submit herewith, also, two letter-books, containing copies of nearly 1,000 letters relating to the war claims, which were deemed of sufficient importance to be copied.

In closing up my duties under the detail relating to the war claims mentioned in Special Orders No. 4, series of 1899, A. G. O., I wish to thank you for the many acts of kindness to myself, and to express my appreciation for the uniform courtesy extended to me by your Department while engaged in the duties attendant upon such detail.

Adjutant-General of California, Sacramento, Cal.:

SIR: In pursuance of the provisions of Paragraph VIII of Special Orders No. 4, series of 1899, A. G. O., I have the honor to report, in regards to the claims of the State of California against the United States, as follows:

At the time of the call for troops, in the war with Spain, both in the first call in April, and in the second call in June, 1898, the Captains of those companies who were ordered into the U. S. Volunteer service purchased, with their State allowances to the company for armory rents and incidental expenses of the company, subsistence and other supplies, and contracted other expenses necessary to the comfort of the men while en route from their homes to the State rendezvous at San Francisco. In the hurried preparation for departure of their companies, the Captains, in many instances, omitted to obtain the proper vouchers for these expenditures. Among the other duties mentioned in Special Orders No. 4, above referred to, I have collected from the various Captains who entered said U. S. Volunteer service eighty-nine of these vouchers, aggregating \$1,629.07, as per following statement, viz:

These eighty-nine vouchers, aggregating the said sum of \$1,629.07, will be presented, with the other claims below enumerated, for payment against the United States Government. These vouchers were not collected without difficulty, owing to the long lapse of time since the same were paid (the last one, of \$156, having but been received from the Captain on June 15, 1900), and I take this opportunity of thanking the Captains of those companies for their uniform courtesy and assistance in the matter of collecting these vouchers, involving as it did a large amount of extra work, and it is largely to their individual efforts that so many of these vouchers were at last obtained. These have been perfected in suitable form for presentation against the United States Government.

I submit herewith the following claims in favor of the State of California against the United States Government under the Acts of Congress, approved July 8, 1898, and March 3, 1899, to wit:

The above 203 vouchers represent new claims that have not yet been passed upon by the Auditor for the War Department, and are in the nature of new matter accumulated since the claim of October 1, 1898, was filed at the War Department, while the reply to Statement of Differences, aggregating \$6,150.29, has already been before that officer, and were suspended by him under the Act of July 8, 1898, when passed upon by him on November 16, 1898, because the indebtedness accrued after July 8, 1898, but for which claim is now made under the Act of March 3, 1899, permitting payments after as well as prior to July 8, 1898.

Among the above vouchers now presented for transportation are a number that were for livery hire, incident to the assembling of the men at their local armories prior to their departure for the State rendezvous (aggregating \$200.30), the reimbursement of the State for which is somewhat problematical; but in view of the fact that the service was rendered in good faith, and the expenditure was incident to the war with Spain, these vouchers are included in the claim against the United States for payment.

The above are all the claims that are now submitted for payment against the United States. There will be the claims for extra pay of the

men under the two Acts of Congress above referred to, but these claims will be made the subject of a separate report.

In the matter of the certificate which the Governor is asked to sign to be attached to the above claims against the United States, and mentioned in the letter from the Auditor for the War Department, dated May 23, 1899, I wish to call your attention to the variance in the language of the certificate relating to the transportation of troops from the law itself. The law contemplates the reimbursement of the State for transportation of those men who were enrolled with the companies from their local armories to the State rendezvous, whether "accepted" or "rejected." The certificate sent out by the Auditor for the War Department contemplates transportation only for those men who were "accepted."

In my judgment, the State is entitled, under the law, to be reimbursed for transportation for both the "accepted" and the "rejected" men.

In adjusting the claims of the men, due attention has been paid to the records of their service, as shown by the files of the Adjutant-General's office, in connection with the certificates of the Captains of Companies, as to the time of their service. Time has been allowed in full from date of enrollment, where shown; otherwise, time of service has been taken from the records shown on the muster-in and muster-out rolls of the California Volunteers. This has made reductions in some instances, which reductions are shown on the claims themselves.

Of the 890 claims, aggregating \$17,516, for those men who were "not members of the National Guard," will state that a large number of men were sworn into the Guard on the eve of the war with Spain, but in the confusion and haste of preparation for that struggle the Captains of Companies neglected to forward the oaths of enlistment of those men; and the men, consequently, were not given credit for such service with the State, and the State lost the credit of their service in the report to the General Government of the National Guard strength entering the U. S. Volunteer service. Many of these oaths were lost, but I understand that there are still others yet in possession of the companies themselves, the originals of which have never been forwarded to the Adjutant-General's office. A list of those men who were not members of the National Guard companies, as shown by the records in the Adjutant-General's office, has been forwarded to the Captains of Companies, with the request to carefully scan the same to see if any of the names thereon belonged to their National Guard organization at the outbreak of the war with Spain, and, if so, to report that fact, and forward any oaths in their possession to the Adjutant-General's office. When these reports of the Captains are all in they will undoubtedly show many more claimants as belonging to the Guard, and if deemed expedient the changes can then be made on the lists of claims tendered herewith.

Acts of Congress and Rules of War Department in Relation to Pay of National Guard, Militia, and Naval Reserves—"Spanish-American War of 1898."

ACT OF APRIL 22, 1898—

Reorganizes the Army, and provides for the enlistment of the National Guard companies and regiments, in their entirety, in the Volunteer army of the United States.

ACT OF MAY 26, 1898 (G. O. No. 56)—

Provides that the pay and allowances of such of the Volunteers as are received into the service of the United States under the Act of Congress, approved April 22, 1898, and the Acts supplemental thereto, shall be deemed to commence from the day on which they joined for duty and enrolled at the Battalion, Regimental, or State rendezvous.

ACT OF JULY 7, 1898 (G. O. No. 96)—

Provides that the pay and allowances of all enlisted men and officers of the Volunteers received into the United States service * * * shall be deemed to commence from the day on which they had their names enrolled for service in the Volunteer Army of the United States and joined for duty therein, after having been called for by the Governor on the authority of the President; and all officers and enlisted men who have not been so paid shall be so paid by the Pay Department of the Army, etc.

ACT OF JULY 8, 1898—

Directs the Secretary of the Treasury to pay to the Governor of any State the reasonable costs, charges, and expenses that have been incurred by him in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer army in the existing war with Spain by * * * paying the men of the States who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer army of the United States.

CIRCULAR OF SEPTEMBER 14, 1898 (No. 36)—

Authorizes paymasters in the U. S. Army to pay from date of enrollment to date of muster into the service, in which case certificate should be required that the men have not been paid for the same time by the State. (This latter provision overruled by the Comptroller of the Treasury, January 18, 1899. See G. O. No. 14, below.)

GENERAL ORDERS No. 1, U. S. ARMY, JANUARY 6, 1899—

Directs company commanders of Volunteers to note on final statement or payrolls the amount paid to each officer or soldier by the State from date of enrollment to date of acceptance into the Volunteer army, in order that such amounts may be deducted. (This order overruled January 18, 1899. See below.)

GENERAL ORDERS No. 14, U. S. ARMY, JANUARY 18, 1899—

Revokes G. O. No. 1 of January 6, 1899, and states that the Comptroller of the Treasury decided that no stoppage or deduction should be made by the Pay Department in the pay due a soldier on account of any payment that may have been made to him under State militia law, by the Governor or State authorities from date of his enrollment or joining for duty to date of acceptance into the Volunteer army of the United States.

ACT OF MARCH 3, 1899—

Provides that no reimbursement shall be made for service of members of the National Guard, organized militia, or Naval Reserve of any State who were not accepted into the Volunteer army of the United States, and no reimbursement shall be allowed for payments in excess of the pay and allowances by laws of State for grade in which he was accepted into the Volunteer army of the United States.

Allows State pay for such officers and men of said National Guard, or militia, or Naval Reserves, as appeared and remained at place of muster and who were afterward received into the service of the United States, for the period between the date of assembly at the rendezvous and the date they were mustered into the United States service; *provided*, that for all officers and men of the National Guard, or militia, or Naval Reserves of the State who appeared at the rendezvous for muster and were rejected by the medical examiner or mustering officer, pay shall be allowed for the same to the State at State rate from date of assembly to date of rejection; *provided*, that where States have not paid to the officers and men the pay allowed them by this Act, or any part thereof, the same shall be paid by the States direct to the officers and men, and no money allowed by this Act for officers and men shall be covered into the treasury of the State.

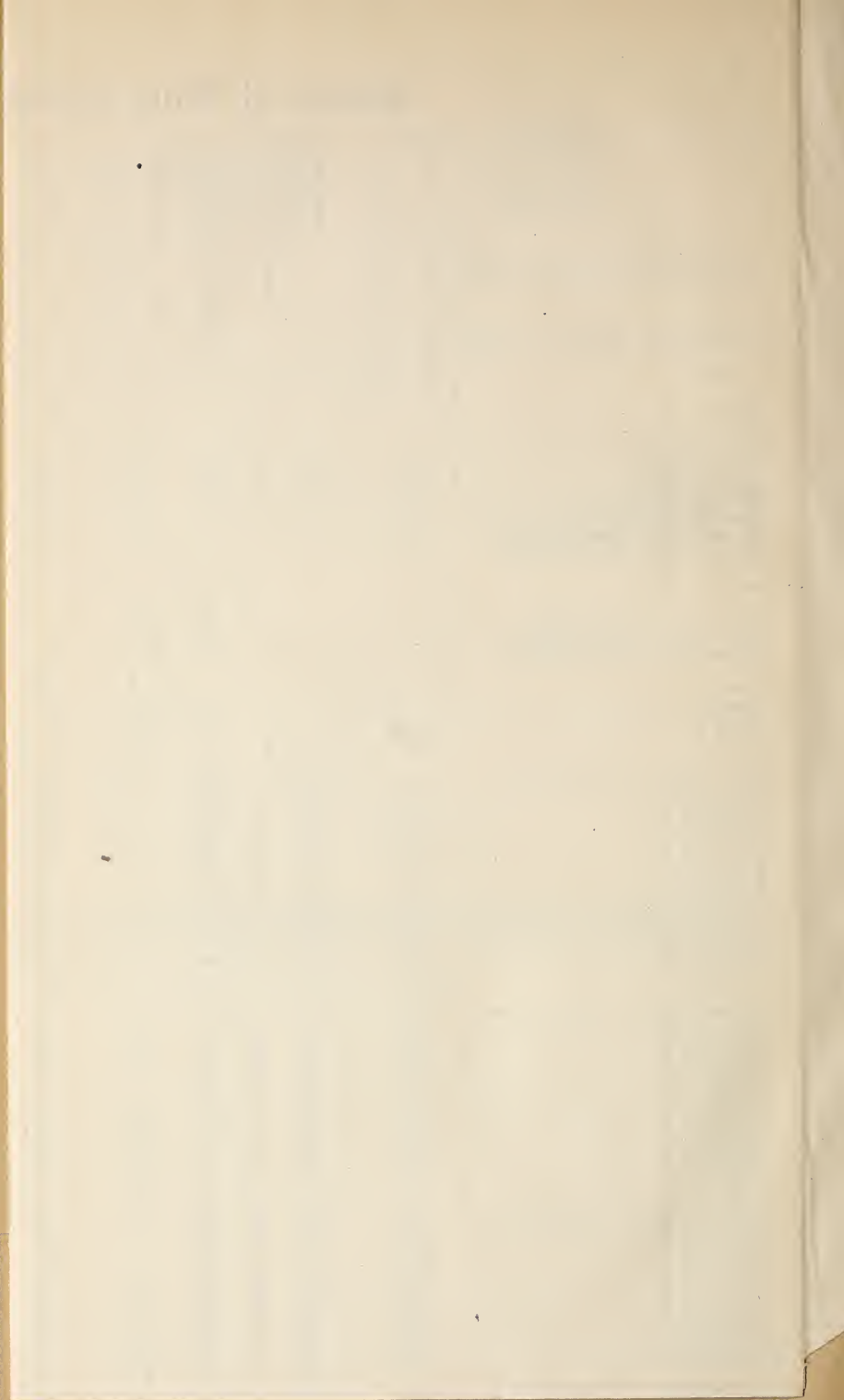
