Activities:

Special Order No. 53 of June 22, 1921, issued by the Adjutant General of the State of California, authorized the organization of a Howitzer Company of Infantry to be located in Los Angeles, California, and on June 24, 1921, the new organization was inspected and mustered into the service of the State. Second Lieutenant, Charles W; Jessup, of the First Separate Company, Infantry, was assigned as temporary Commander of the Howitzer Company, on June 24, 1921, and was relieved of that command on June 27, 1921, when First Lieutenant Ralph V. McClain was assigned to the position. The Company assembled at their headquarters on June 30, 1921, for inspection for Federal recognition by the War Department. The Company passed inspection successfully and Robert R. Morris was assigned as Captain of the Unit.

ACTIVITIES OF THE 160TH INFANTRY REGIMENT

The history of the 160th Infantry Regiment began on October 14, 1917, when the former Seventh Infantry Regiment, California Mational Guard, and six companies of the Second Infantry, California Mational Guard were consolidated and redesignated the 160th Infantry Regiment, 40th Division, United States Army. The Regiment saw service in France during the World War, returned home in March, 1919, and was demobilized at Camp Kearney, California, May 7, 1919.*

When the Armistice was signed on November 11, 1918, the National Guard of California consisted of six companies of infantry, and the task of reorganizing a new National Guard confronted the State. The National Defense Act of June 4, 1916, provided the manner of proceedure, and in April, 1920, permission was granted to the State of California by the Militia Bureau, to organize one regiment of infantry to include the six companies then in existence. It was decided, however, to delay the final organization of the regiment until all the former members of the National Guard, who served in the United States Army during the World War, were discharged from the service.

On August 23, 1921, the 160th Infantry Regiment was organized with headquarter in Los Angeles. The Regiment was the first organization to be mustered into the new National Guard. The AdjutantGeneral's Order of August 28, 1921, redesignated the Second, Third, and Fourth Separate Battalions of Infantry as First, Second, and Third Battalions, 160th Infantry Regiment. The units comprising the Regiment, and their locations were as follows:

On September 19, 1921, the Service Company was organised and stationed in Los Angeles. Eleven days later, October first, Company H, 160th Infantry Regiment was designated Regimental Headquarters Company and stationed in Los Angeles.**

A new company was organised in Pasadena and sustered in as Company H, 160th Infantry Regiment on October 6, 1921, thus completing the organisation of the Regiment with the exception of the Medical Detachment, which was not organized until April 4, 1922.***

The first commanding officer of the new 160th Infantry Regiment was Colonel Walter P. Story, who was promoted from major to the rank of colonel on August 23, 1921. Colonel Story had served as captain in the infantry during the World War. He joined Company E, Infantry in 1920, and on December four, the same year, was premoted from private to captain. Two months later, on February 2, 1921, Captain Story was commissioned major and assigned to command the Second Separate Battalion of Infantry that became the First Battalion, 160th Infantry Regiment on August 23, 1921, and Major Story became Colonel, commanding the Regiment.

Most of the credit for the success of the Regiment belongs to Colonel Story. The new Mational Guard Regiment was, as provided in the Mational Defense Act, to be the counterpart of a regular United States Army Infantry Regiment. Any deviation from the prescribed requirements would result in the withdrawal of Federal recognition, which would automatically cut off all financial assistance from the government. Colonel Story proved to be equal to the occasion, and with the hearty support of the citizens of Los Angeles County soon developed a splendid organization. On July 15, 1922, Harcourt Hervey was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel and assigned to the 160th Infantry Regiment.

In the sixteen years since its organization, there have been but few changes in the regimental units of the 160th. On September 12, 1922, the location of Company G was changed from Redondo Beach to Los Angeles. On March 23, 1924, the locations of Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, Alhambra and Company M, Glendale were also moved to Los Angeles. Five years passed before another change occured. Then, on February 18, 1929, Company F, Santa Ana, and Company H, Pasadena, were transferred to the 185th Infantry Regiment and designated Companies F, and H of that

see General and Special Orders 1922, Special order No. 47, page 73, paragraph 2.

Regiment. A vacancy existed in Company F, 160th Infantry Regiment until June 2, 1930, when a new company was organized in Los Angeles and mustered in. A new company was organized in Los Angeles and mustered in as Company E, 160th Infantry Regiment, February 17, 1930, to take the place of Company H, transferred to the 185th Infantry Regiment in 1929, and another new company also in Los Angeles was organized and mustered in as Company F, on June 2, 1930, to replace Company F, transferred to the 185th the previous year.

The first encampment attended by the newly organized regiment was held at Del Monte, July 15, to 29, 1922. Colonel Harold D. Coburn, United States Army, was in command of the camp and two weeks of intensive, close and extended order drills resulted in considerable improvement in the execution of these maneuvers. Skirmish formations and other infantry drills as prescribed by the 1919 drill regulations were also thoroughly worked out. Considerable night drilling was also indulged in. When the Regiment returned home on Sunday, July 30, 1922, the residents of Los Angeles had their first view of the entire 160th Infantry, fully equipped and ready for service. The fact that the Regiment was composed entirely of boys from Los Angeles or near by towns, was a source of pride to the people of those localities, who witnessed the parale from the Southern Pacific Depot, to Minth and Broadway, where the troops were dismissed.

What was probably the first public appearance of the 160th Infantry, took place on Armistice Day, November 11, 1921. In a monster parade, that was part of a three day celebration sponsored by the American Legion, the 160th Infantry made its initial public appearance. Although only about two months old, the Organisation, made a splendid showing. In the evening, the 160th held a military ball at their armory in Exposition Park.*

About a month later, on December 2, 1921, the 160th Infantry participated in a reception tendered to Marshal Ferdinand Foch, who commanded the allied armies in France during the World War. The Marshal was a visitor in Los Angeles and a guest of that city for a short time.**

The next event of importance was May 30, 1922. The crowds along the line of march, viewing the parade as it passed at two p.m., did not know that the Guardsmen had started their day at nine o'clock that morning. As an illustration; part of General Order No. 8, dated May 27, 1922, 160th Infantry Regimental Headquarters, read as follows:

The members of the Service Company, Howitzer Company, Regimental Headquarters Company, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, Medical Detachment and Companies A, B, C, D, E, K, and L will report at the State Armory, Exposition Park, at 9:00 a.m., May thirty. Companies A, B, and C will report to the officer in charge of ceremonies of the Rainbow

Division at 10:00 a.m. at the State Armory, and will cooperate under his instructions. Upon completion of the ceremonies, these companies will return to the State Armory, reporting their arrival to the Regimental Adjutant. Mess call will sound at 10:45 a.m. The men will be fed by companies in the Drill Court at the Armory. Mach man will be issued a mess kit and cup. First call for parade will be at 11:45 a.m., assembly at 11:50 a.m. Troops will be marched to Versont and Exposition Boulevard, where they will entrain on special cars. They will detrain at First and Hill Streets. The Companies will form for the parade with the right of the Battalion resting on First and Hill Streets. They will then be marched to First and Broadway, and take their position in parade, with head of column resting on First Street, at Broadway. Formation for parade will be by battalion in column of platoons. The line of march will be First and Broadway, to Seventh Street, west on Seventh to Hope Street, north on Hope Street to Bible Institute. This formation will be considered a drill and will be shown accordingly on pay rolls. At the conclusion of the ceremonies, troops will entrain at Seventh and Figueroa Streets, and detrain at Vermont and Exposition Boulevard, thence march to the Armory, where company commanders will take charge of their companies for replacement of uniforms, equipment and dismissal."

The Order reveals that the "citizen soldier" had a rather strenous day.

The year 1922, witnessed several changes in the Staff of the 160th Infantry Regiment. Captain Clarence O. Hively, Regimental Adjutant during the organizing of the Regiment, resigned May 8, 1922, and Captain Beverly M. Eskridge succeeded him as Adjutant. On October 23, 1922, Captain Woodward B. Mayo was promoted to major and Regimental Surgeon. Also each of the three battalions lost its major by resignation. Major Barnest B. Kirk, Arthur E. Koepsel, and William B. Heinecke resigned and their places were filled by the appointment of Seth E. Howard, Hewitt Callender and Carle H. Belt.

A school for training in the use of the automatic rifle was held during September, 1922. Six men were selected from each unit in the Regiment to attend the school and become proficient in the proper care and handling of the rifle. The school was held, September five, twelve, nineteen, and twenty-sixth. These men were to return to their respective companies at the conclusion of the school and instruct their comrades in the use of the automatic rifle.

The 160th Infantry Regiment participated in the usual holiday parades during 1923. The annual encampment was held on the digling reservation, near Salinas, California, July eight to July twenty-third. The remuneration for services during the camp was disappointing. The Federal Government paid its alloted \$1.00 per day per man, but the State failed to make provision for the payment of a like amount. However, public spirited citizens subscribed a fund for the Guardsmen and most of the men

received their share from the fund, but not to exceed \$1.00 a day for the fifteen days spent at camp.

A short while after returning from camp the following poem, written by Captain Frank C. Tillson, 160th Infantry Regiment, was adopted as the Regimental Motto:

"Follow Through"

When your pack is getting heavy and the road seems long and rough,
When you're weary, tired, and footsore, and a soldiers life seems tough,
Then remember that your buddy may be just as tired as you.
So raise your chin and grin a bit—a soldier "Follows Through."

When the bullets clip the grass tops and your wounded comrades mean,
When you're crawling out to God-knowswhere and you feel you're all alone,
When your cartridges are finished—then your bayonet will do,
For the testing of a soldier is the way he "Follows Through."

When you get a bullet through the arm and you're feeling sort o' sick.

It's a good excuse for lying down—are you going to quit or stick?

The enemy are still in front—then what are you going to do?

You will never know your limit unless you "Follow Through."

When Brotherhood of Adventure meets, the lodge of the Men at Arms,
When the Strong Men sit by the great god Mars, and talk of War's alarms,
When the sentry stops you at the gate—what will you say and do?
For the only question he will ask you is,
"Did you "Follow Through?"

This history leaves poetry and returns to action and duty. A fierce brush fire started December 10, 1923, near Burbank, where Company I, 160th Infantry Regiment was stationed. The fire swept to the top of sunset ganyon and on toward La Cresenta three miles distant, where the beautiful homes of many wealthy people were located. Only a change in the direction of the wind saved the homes. From Adjutant General's Orders for 1923, Order No. 24, paragraph 1, the following was taken:

The assembly of Company I, 160th Infantry Regiment at its station, Burbank, California, on December 10, 1923, pursuant to verbal orders of that date, for the purpose of fighting a forest fire, preserving order, and protecting property for more than four hours is hereby confirmed and made of record as a regularly ordered additional drill for the company."

A few of the social activities of the Regiment during the year 1923 are worthy of mention. The first was the Military Circus held April 12, to 18, 1923. The entertainment was full of variety; but one of the most interesting features was the bronco busting exhibition by the two world's famous cowgirls, Edythe Sterling and Dorothy Morrell. The proceeds from the circus were placed in the welfare fund of the Regiment.*

From a Los Angeles paper the following item is takens

"Members of the 160th Infantry, California National Guard, under command of Colonel W. P. Story, were guests of Sid Grauman on Narch 1, 1923, when the "Master Showman" entertained the organisation at his Hollywood Egyptian theatre, where Douglas Fairbanks, in "Robin Hood" is drawing capacity crowds. The affair was arranged by Grauman in appreciation of the many services rendered him by the "fighting boy" of the 160th, who among other things assisted in the formal opening of Grauman's Metropolitan Theatre a month or so ago."

In 1924 the 160th Infantry Regiment was called upon on several occasions to parade and perform escort duty. On May 30, 1924, the Regiment participated in a mammoth parade and exercises in the Los Angeles Coliseum at 1:30 p.m. Earlier in the day Colonel Story and a detachment from the 160th, assisted in services held at Pershing Square Monument. The Seventh California Volunteer's Association was in charge of the services. Patriotic addresses were delivered by Judge Charles S. Crail, Reverend Paul C. Elliott, and William Roger Galbreth.***

The 1924 annual encampment was held at Monterey, August two to sixteen. The two weeks of drills, maneuvers, and camp life improved the effeciency of the Regiment. Colonel Walter P. Story and his officers were highly complimented by Brigadier-General A. J. Borree, on the fine showing made by the Regiment at the Encampment.*

On September 12, 1924, Los Angeles staged a National Defense day test that was believed to have scored one hundred per cent with the National Government. Animated by the same spirit that has inspired Americans every where to rush to the Nation's defense in time of peril, fifteen thousand, seven hundred, one day volunteers gave the city's answer to the call to rally against the imaginary hosts of a theoretical armed invasion. Led by two grey-haired veterans who fought on opposite sides in the Civil War, their Ladies Auxilaries, patriotic and civic organisations, National Guardsmen, members of the Reserve Corps, and young men who will be the soldiers of the future, united in a monster parade that drew cheer after cheer from the vast throng. Secretary Wilbur, United States Navy, was guest of honor for the day. At the Coliseum the Secretary delivered an address from which the following quotation is taken:

"I bring you greeting from the President of the United States, whose own som, Calvin Coolige Jr., had he lived, would shortly have enrolled in a military school. Neither the President nor myself are apologizing for defense day, neither do I apologize for asking for appropriations for adequate naval defense."

At a banquet that evening the Secretary said:

"I am not intimating there is danger of war with any country; but America owes to her sons and daughters, that we should be ready to meet attack at any time. The best thing for the peace of the world is a strong United States of America."

Thus ended the Mational Defense day test of 1924 in Los Angeles.**

Besides the Armistice Day parade, on November 11, 1924, there was another parade in which the 160th took part. On December 27, 1924, Los Angeles celebrated the opening of Mulholland Drive, the newest and most scenic of Los Angeles highways. The 160th Infantry, with more than one thousand men in line, and a detachment of another thousand from the Pacific Fleet, under command of Admiral S. S. Robison, led a procession down Hellywood Boulevard. Nearly eight thousand persons, including fifteen bands marched down the boulevard to Hollywood Bowl, where additional exercises were held.

One of the highlights of 1925 was the ceremony of the adoption of the 160th Infantry Regiment by Los Angeles as its cum, on March seventeenth. On that evening the Regiment was mobilized at the Armory, entrained, and detrained at Tenth and Broadway; from that initial point, the Regiment paraded up Broadway to Fifth Street, west on Fifth Street to Olive Street, and south on Olive Street to a position in front of Pershing Square. There, while thousands of citizens stood with bared heads and a Regiment stood in salute to the colors beneath the monuments in Pershing Square, Los Angeles formally adopted the 160th Infantry, California Mational Guard, as "Los Angeles" own." The chairman of the evening was the Honorable Rex Goodcell, United States Collector of Internal Revenue, and the principal speaker was Major Rupert Hughes, a well known moving picture actor and author. When the adoption ceremonies had been completed, Colonel Koester, representing the Winth Corps area, presented the 160th with a new set of colors. The old colors, which were carried in the late war, were returned to the Adjutant General, State of California, to be placed in a permanent and honored niche with the other colors of the State.

The 160th Infantry Regiment took part in an unusually large number of parades in 1925. All the usual holiday parades were held. On June 6, the Regiment paraded in honor of the Shriners. The Fourth of July parade was combined with Defense Day and an estimated mumber of fifty thousand persons took part in the huge spectacle. In Movember Los Angeles' own paraded twice. The first was on Armistice Day, which was observed with a parade followed by literary exercises in Los Angeles Coliseum. The second occasion was the arrival in Los Angeles of the big fourteen inch mobile coast defense rifle, which was to be placed at Fort Mac Arthur of the Coast Defense Plan. Some of the dimensions of the huge gun are as follows: Length, 95 feet; weight complete, 700,000 pounds; weight of gum itself 223,782 pounds; maximum range 1400 pound shell, 46,000 yards; maxisum range 1500 pound shell, 40,000 yards; weight of powder charge, 426 pounds. The gun is mounted on a specially built railway carriage, with a power plant in front which furnishes electricity for loading, firing, and operation of the hydraulic and compressed air equipment, which takes up the receil of the huge gun.#

From a Los Angeles correspondent the following item was taken:

"Fitting tribute was paid to Colonel W. P. Story of the 160th Infantry Regiment at the regular Exposition Park concert of the Regimental band, in form of a salute, composed for this occasion by Munzlio La Forti, the brilliant bandmaster. The "Commander's Fanfare" was played as a prelude to the famous march, "Bashington Greys". Applause from an audience estimated in excess of tea thousand, answered the musical salute, as the trumpeters of the band lowered their instruments. Every Sunday

this excellent band delights immense audiences from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. with band and solo numbers of classic, popular, and standard type music free of charge. No collection is taken, the plaudits of the public being its ideal award. Colonel Story, in true, generous "old man" fashion has some into his own pocket, equipped the band with needed instruments, parade uniforms for the concerts, and has seen to it that Numsio La Forte, one of the best bandwasters available, was appointed. It is reported that Colonel Story each week writes his check to pay for rehearsals and Sunday concerts of the 160th Infantry Regiment band.**

Two years later this band was selected as the official band for the California State Fair, when Bandmaster La Forte and musicians recieved a medal from the management of the Fair in recognition of the splendidsservices rendered. Although Colonel Story was Brigadier-General then his interest and pride in the splendid band never waned.**

Another outstanding accomplishment of the 160th Infantry in 1925 was the winning of several awards during the annual encampment at Del Monte. The Third Battalion was declared the most distinguished battalion and Company A the most distinguished rifle company. The most distinguished Battalion Headquarters Company was First Battalion Headquarters Company, 160th Infantry Regiment; — The most distinguished Howitzer Company was also the unit from the 160th; and the 160th Service Company and Medical Detachment also recieved distinguished awards.*** The attendance record for 1925 revealed that Company L and Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 160th Infantry Regiment were two of the ten best companies in attendance for the year.**

The Regiment started 1926 with the triumph of one of its units over the 212th Artillery Regiment of New York. The incident started in February 1926, when the 212th Artillery Regiment of New York issued a challenge in the American Rifleman, the official organ of the Mational Rifle Association. The challenge was to any regiment or rifle club in the United States to meet in competition with rifle, pistol or any other weapon. No organization seemed inclined to accept the challenge, but finally the National Rifle Association arranged a match with Company H, 160th Infantry Regiment. The agreement provided that Company H select its team of ten men from Company H, while the 212th Artillery

Regiment would select the best shots from its entire regiment. Ten men on each team fired; each man on the pistol team shooting fifty shots at twenty yards, and each man on the rifle team shooting ten shots standing, ten shots sitting, ten shots kneeling, and ten shots prone. The Artillery Regiment was outclassed by Company H as the following score indicates:

Pistol Score

Company H, 160th Infantry Regiment 4524 points 212th Artillery Regiment 3566 points Company H won by 958 points

Rifle Score

Company H, 160th Infantry Regiment 3873 points
212th Artillery Regiment 2940 points
Company H won by 933 points

The pistol team of Company H was composed of Captain W. R. Jackson, Lieutenant F. C. Payne, First Sargeant S. E. Worley, Sargeant Milton Robinson, Sargeant E. B. Douglas, Sargeant L. A. Woss, Corporal Starr Baisley, Corporal Roman Piesinger, Corporal LeRoy Rusth and Private Whestland. The rifle team was composed of Lieutenant F. C. Payne, Sargeant Milton Robinson, Sargeant L. A. Moss, Corporal Starr Baisley, Corporal LeRoy Rusth, Corporal Roman Piesinger, Privates, first class, Dennie Boots, Burleigh Putnam, J. E. Pearson, and Wheatland. In both matches the lowest man on Company H was higher than the high man on the Artillery team.*

On May 11, 1926, Adjutant General R. E. Mittlestaedt reviewed the 160th Infantry Regiment. As the troops passed in review the victorious rifle and pistol team formed in line with the Staff and each member of the team was presented with a medal by the Adjutant General.

On June 18, 1926, Colonel Story was promoted to Brigadier-General, when provision was made for the formation of the 40th Division and Brigadier-General David P. Barrows was promoted to Major-General in charge of the Division.

General Story was placed in command of the 79th Brigade.

The promotion of Colonel Story was followed on July 24, 1926 by the promotion of Lieutenant-Colonel Harcourt Hervey to Colonel of the 160th Infantry Regiment. Colonel Hervey was an ex-army man, having served in the United States Artillery during the World War. He went to France with the First Division and was successively promoted, first to captain and then to major in the Fifth Field Artillery, and at the age of twenty-six was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel. He participated in all the overseas activities of the First Division. He returned to the United States with the First Division and was in command of the

Sixth and Fifth Field Artillery Regiments in order. On November 19, 1920, Colonel Hervey resigned from the Regular Army and returned to his home in Los Angeles. He was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel in the 160th Infantry Regiment July 15, 1922. Colonel Hervey received the citation for the Meritorious Service at the hands of the American Expeditionary Forces, France. He was awarded the Croix de Guerre, in connection with the offensive at Soisson's in July, 1918. In additional he received division, brigade and regimental citations. Colonel Hervey assumed his duties as Colonal of the regiment with the absolute trust and confidence of every man in the regiment.

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The promotion of Lieutenant-Colonel Hervey to Colonel was followed by the advancement of Major Seth E. Howard to Lieutenath-Colonel of the regiment. Lieutenat-Colonel Howard's acquaintance with National Guard affairs, began in 1901 in the State of Michigan. In November, 1916 he was enrolled in the Los Angeles Military Training School, where he resained until May, 1917, when he became a director in the school. The Lieutenant-Colonel attended the second officer's training camp at the Presidio, San Francisco in August, 1917, where he remained two months. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant on November 27, 1927 and assigned to the 13th Infantry at Camp Fremont, Palo Alto, California. He was appointed Assistant Regimental Adjutant, March 1, 1918, and a few months later on August 1, 1918 was commissioned captain and became Regimental Adjutant in the 13th Infantry. About three months later, November 12. 1918, he was promoted to Major in the Second Battalion, 13th Infantry Regiment stationed at Camp Mills, New York. Hajor Howard was discharged from the Regular Army April 2, 1919. In October, 1921, he entered the 160th Infantry Regiment, was commissioned captain on October 8, 1921, and assigned to the Regular Staff as Plans and Training Officer. On September 11, 1922, Captain Howard was promoted to Major and assigned to command the First Battalion, 160th Infantry Regiment. He remained in command of the Battalion until his promotion in July, 1926 to Lieutenant-Colonel and executive officer of the Regiment.

Captain William G. Harris was promoted to Major of the First Battalian to succeed Major Howard. Major Harris had an enviable record of service in France. He was commissioned First Lieutenant of Company C, 160th Infantry Regiment on December 7, 1920, and on May 10, 1921, he was promoted to Captain of Company C. which position he held until his promotion to major. As senior captain in his battalion he received his promotion as a matter of routine. However, his administrative ability in military affairs, had long been noted and it is safe to assume that his semiority was but an incidental contributing factor in his promotion. Opinions among the officers of the First Battalion seem to indicate that the new regime was a fitting successor to the splendid one just ended.**

A new innovation was inaugurated in the 160th Infantry Regiment immediately after the annual Encampment of 1926. A company composed of new recruits was organised October 1, 1926 and Captain Harry Brown was assigned as Captain of the new unit. The company was composed of all the men in the regiment who had enrolled since the termination of the 1926 training encampment and included in addition to the enlisted men those who were members of the candidate officer's school. The later were detailed to the Recruit Company as instructors. The personnel of the Company was carried for pay on the rolls of the organisation in which they originally enlisted, but for purposes of training and quarters, were grouped as a unit in a separate locker room and parlor. The training of recruits began with instructions planned to develop first, the spirit that is required in the true soldier. It then passed into the primary phases of the professions of arms and took up the advanced study and practice only after a thorough mastery of principles. The success of the project would, it was hoped, have a far reaching effect on the regiment. It relieved the company commanders of the bugbear of recruit training.

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The year 1926 closed with a very impressive event. On December 21, 1926, the annual review and banquet to General Walter P. Story was held. More than eleven hundred officers and men passed in review. General Story and his party were escorted about the parade grounds by Colonel Harcourt Hervey, commander of the 160th Regiment. In the General's party was Lieutenant-Colonel Seth Howard, 160th Infantry Captain, Arthur St. Regie, fencing master of the regiment, Lieutenant L. Biscayart of the private staff of the French Artillery, and forty bankers and business men of Los Angeles. A detailed inspection of the troops was conducted by Colonel George F. Hamilton of the Regular Army and his staff of fifteen officers. The inspection and review was preceded by a "Christmas" banquet in the mess hall of the regiment.

The year 1927 started out with a review of the regiment on the second anniversary of the adoption of the 160th Infantry as "Los Angeles" Own" on March 22, 1925***On April 19, 1927, three former officers of the old Seventh Infantry Regiment were guests of the 160th at mess and drill. The event was one of great interest to the members of the Regiment, as the 160th that entered the World War in 1917 was none other than the old Seventh. With rapt attention the gathering listened to General Charles F. A. Last, who was on the Staff of the Seventh as rifle inspector and instructor. He drew a vivid picture of the days in the old armory at Eighth and Spring Streets, Los Angeles, and the difficulties which confronted the National Guard in the "Mineties".

General Frank C. Prescott inspired the crowd with a lively patriotic talk. His intense belief in his country and its institutions and his uncomprimising attitude toward what this generation calls pacifican was deeply impressed in the minds of his listeners. General Prescott was a major in the Seventh Infantry in the "Wineties" also. General William G. Schrieber, the last commander of the ald Seventh Infantry Regiment as it existed before the War, entertained and interested the crowd with his comparisons between the old days and the new. Comparisons which emphasize progress invariably introduce elements both of pathos and of humor, and of these General Schrieber made the most. The program was instructive because the 160th Infantry Regiment learned much of the past history of their organisation, and considerable tradition that had come down to them, was corroborated. It was a very enjoyable evening as well as an unusual one."

The annual encampment of the 160th Infantry Regiment was held at Del Monte
July 14-27, 1927. At that encampment the following awards were made to
various units of the 160th Infantry Regiment: The First Battalion—best Battalion; Service Company—best all around company; Company L—best rifle company; Company D—b at machine gun company; Regimental Readquarters Company—
best headquarters company.**

Two changes took place in the staff of the 160th in 1927. Captain Beverly M Eskridge, Regimental Adjutant, was transferred to command the Howitzer Company, 160th Infantry on March 7, 1927, and on March 27, Major Paul Aradt, Officers Reserve Corps, was commissioned Captain in the California Mational Guard and assigned to the 160th Infantry Regiment, where he was appointed Regimental Adjutant. Captain Armit had a long and distinguished record in the Regular Army. Ralisting July 5, 1896, he was assigned to the Third Artillery and promoted to Corporal in the Third Artillery Band. He was promoted to Sargeant in 1901 and saw service in Honolulu in the Tenth Coast Artillery. Transferring to the infantry in February, 1914, he was appointed First Sargeant, Headquarters Company, Second Infantry. He was commissioned Captain of Infantry, Officers Reserve Corps, in 1916, and was on active duty as captain on Hovember 2, 1917, with the 32nd Infantry. Discharged with that rank Hovember 15, 1920, he was appointed Warrant Officer, December 29, 1920, and retired as such July 19, 1926. Captain Arndt was promoted to Major, Officers Reserve Corps in 1925, and held that commission as well as that of Captain in the California National Guard.***

In June 1927, Major Woodward B. Mayo, Medical Corps, resigned. Major C. Benson Wood, Medical Reserves, was temporarily appointed as Regimental Surgeon and he succeeded in reorganizing the Medical Staff.

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The 160th Infantry Regiment was called for duty during the visit of Colonel Charles Lindberg in his plane the "Spirit of St. Louis" on September 21, 1927. The guardenen performed guard duty, holding back the immense crowd that was so anxious to get a close up view of the National Guardenan of Misrouri, who had succeeded in crossing the Atlantic Ocean in his airplane."

There is one more noteworthy item of 1927. First Sergeant Jeffery, Regimental Headquarters Company furnished a unique record of attendance. For two full years, 1926 to 1927, the Sergeant never missed a drill night. That was a fine record but when it was revealed that he had to travel sixty miles each way to the armory, it was astonishing. Some one figured that in the two years Sergeant Jeffery had traveled by auto five thousand, seven hundred miles in order to be present at roll call. He received the headr award for one hundred per cent drill attendance for both years.**

The year 1927 closed with a big birthday dinner in honor of General Story. Besides the Regiment, the wives, sweethearts, and friends of the guardsmen were in attendance. A huge birthday cake was presented to the General. In his characteristic style he "passed the buck", and gave credit for whatever success the Regiment had attained to the officers who had assisted him in making the Regiment one of the best. He also "blamed" the non-commissioned officers and the rank and file who had steadily and with determination done the things that were expected of them. He even laid part of the success to the wives, mothers, and sweethearts of the members for their toleration and support. Incidentally, he invited the women folks to form an auxiliary, to come and bring their "knitting" and join them. After the dinner General Story reviewed the Regiment in one of their annual drills."

The year 1928 resulted in only one change in the Regimental Staff. In April of that year Doctor Alfred Fellows was promoted to Major and appointed Regimental Surgeon, to fill the vacancy created when Woodward B. Mayo resigned.

The annual encampment of the 160th Infantry Regiment was held August 12 to 26, 1928, and was their first camp at San Luis Obispo. For several years the 160th Infantry encampment was a regimental affair, there having been no other units at the camp site on the same date with the southern regiment. In 1929, however, the schedule was changed. The completion of new and enlarged facilities at San Luis Obispo in that year enabled the 160th and 185th Infantry Regiments, 40th Air Service, and 40th Tank Company to meet together in camp from July 21 to August 4, 1929. The attendance statistics show that the 160th Infantry Regiment had the largest attendance of any of the four infantry units, with a per centage of 94.195; while the 185th was second with a percentage of 89.515.

On August 22, 1929, the 160th Infantry Regiment was ordered to do guard duty during the visit of the air liner Graf-Zeppelin. The Graf-Zeppelin arrived in Los Angeles on the morning of August twenty-six and remained until late that night. The guardsmen patroled the fences bordering the airport, holding back the immense crowds of people, who were determined to get as near to the giant dirigible as possible. From 1:00 a.m. until about 11:00 p.m. the 160th Infantry and a battalion of the 185th Infantry Regiment sealously guarded the airport. At about 10:30 p.m. the giant ship left her moorings and started on her trip to Lakehurst.**

On November 11, 1929, the eleventh annual Armistics Day parade was held in Los Angeles. As a climax to the day's celebration, the 160th Infantry gave a regimental parade before a throng of fifty thousand people in the Los Angeles Coliseum. Officers and men were steel helmets and all rifles carried fixed bayonets. A few days later Colonel Hervey received from V. Hogan, chairman of the Armistice Day parade committee, the following letter:

The Eleventh Annual Armistice Day Committee of the American Legion extends to you sir, and through you to your staff and the men under your command, its deep appreciation for your kind participation in the Armistice Day exercises held in the Coliseum. The review of your splendid Regiment was the outstanding feature on our program. We keenly appreciate the time and effort it required to properly assemble your Regiment for such an occasion, and we wish to assure you sir, that we are indeed grateful for your kind and considerate cooperation.

Two changes in the commanding officers of the Regiment took place in 1929. On June one, Lieutenant Colonel Seth E. Howard was transferred to the command of the

newly organized 185th Infantry Regiment. Captain Harry G. Brown was promoted to major on March 18, 1929.

The annual convention of the National Guard Association in Los Angeles, on September 17 to 19, 1929, was the occasion for considerable activity in the 160th Infantry Regiment, especially among the officers. A grand military ball at the Hotel Ambassador on Friday evening was the chief social event of the convention. The 160th Infantry band furnished the music for the dance.

There was one weak point in the otherwise effecient regiment. The 160th possessed no rifle range, and depended upon private rifle clubs for their range for shooting. This handicap resulted in a rather poor showing on the part of the 160th in competitive rifle matches. Company H of Pasadena, however, was an exception. When Company H was transferred to the 185th Infantry in March, 1929, the marksmanship average in the Regiment was again lowered. The year 1930, however, witnessed a determined effort on the part of the Regiment to improve at target practice. The result was gratifying, as the following scores indicate: At rifle practice in 1929 the Regiment's official score was 16.76%, and the 1930 score was 42.6%; with pistel 1929--0%, 1930--15.1%; Machine gun 1929-35%, and in 1930-37.3%. In 1932 the 160th placed five of the twelve members on the National Guard State rifle team. Several years had gone by without this Regiment placing one man on the team prior to 1932. Also in 1932, the 160th Infantry Regiment was second in the regimental shoot, being bested by the 185th Infantry Regiment - However, the real triumph came at the Southwestern Regional Marksmanship Competition held at San Luis Obispo September 30 to October 2, 1932. The shoot was under the auspices of the National Rifle Association. The 160th Infantry rifle team composed of Private William Arnold, Sergeant Kenneth Wilkes, Private William Carroll, Lieutenant Frank C. Payne, Corporal W. A. Cunningham, Private R. R. Newman, Lieutenant Arthur Shivell, Lieutenant Harold W. Roberts, and Captain Daniel H. Hudelson defeated the 159th Infantry, the 143d Field Artillery, the United States Navy, and marine teams. *** The navy team was selected from about five thousand men in the Parific fleet, and the winner was not determined till the last few shots were fired. It was then revealed that the 160th had won by one point over the navy. The victory was important since there were no contests at Camp Perry in 1932, as no funds were available for that purpose. The 160th Infantry Regiment was emulating the spleadid record of its predecessor, the old Seventh Infantry Regiment, which boasted of many of the best shots in the California National Guard from 1908 to 1916.

Lack of space forbids the enumeration of the many reviews, parades and social activities of the 160th Infantry Regiment and only a few will be given. On September 8, 1930, the 160th was reviewed by General Charles P. Summerall, Chief of Staff, United States Army. Maturally, the Regiment was at its very best on such an occasion. "Splendid, fine indeed," General Summerall said to Brigadier-General Walter P. Story and Colonel Harcourt Hervey as the last rank passed by. The review was colorful as rank after rank swung by, sabers flashing and accourtements of the soldiers gleaming, while the band played the Company's own stirring march."

I few changes in the commanding officers will next be mentioned. On February 14. 1930. Major Carle H. Belt was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel of the 160th to fill the vacancy created when Lieutenant-Colonel Seth E. Howard was transferred to the 185th Infantry Regiment. Lieutenant-Colonel Belt was appointed Captain of the First Separate Company Infantry on December 30, 1920. The First Separate Company Infantry became Company B of the 160th Infantry Regiment when the Regiment was organised. Colonel Belf advanced from captain to major on Movember 6, 1922, and to lieutenant-colonel in 1930. Another change was the transfer of Captain Paul Arndt to Plans and Training Officer on August 19, 1930. Captain Arndt was succeeded by Captain Jesse E. Brinker, who had a long service record in the Regular Army, having first emlisted in August, 1900. In January, 1927, he joined the 160th Infantry and was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to the Service Company. On March 25, 1929, he was commissioned Captain and appointed assistant Plans and Training Officer, which office he held until appointed Adjutant. The promotion of Major Belt to Lieutenant-Colonel led to the appointment of Captain Marvin C. Bradley as Major. He accepted his commission on July 9, 1930. The next change came two years later August 1, 1932, when Major Harry G. Brown died at the United States Veteran's Hospital, Sawtelle, California. Major Brown had served as a member of the First Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry in the Spanish-American War, and he enlisted and served in the United States Coast artillery during the World War. On March 4, 1921, he became a member of the California National Guard, advancing through the various grades until he attained his commission as Second Lieutemant, August 28, 1921. He was promoted to Captain February 20, 1922, and to Major, March 18, 1929. He commanded the Second Battalion from that date until the time of his death. The Major was deeply interested in the military profession and contributed much to the efficiency of the 160th Infantry Regiment. Captain Henry C. Newton was promoted to Major on March 2, 1933, te fill the vacancy created by Major Brown's death. Major Newton had enlisted in Company E. Third Separate Battalion and was appointed First Lieutenant on July 8, 1921. About a year later, November 3, 1922, he was promoted to Captain, which position he held until his promotion to Major. The next change came on May 3, 1933, when Captain Brinker was transferred to the command of Company I, and Captain Arnold E. McCord was transferred from Company I to Regimental Adjutant. Captain McCord was destined to serve one year and four months before a

bandit's bullet ended his life. Captain McCord attempted to arrest a hold up man and was shot by the bandit. Captain McCord's record in the National Guard was as follows: He was commissioned Second Lieutenant July 3, 1923, prosoted to First Lieutenant July 7, 1924, and to Captain May 10, 1927. He was in command of Company I from December 11, 1926 to May 2, 1933, when he was appointed Adjutant, 160th Infantry Regiment. Company I acted as military escort at the Captain's funeral, and the famous 160th Infantry Band led the procession. Captain Daniel H. Hudelson was transferred from Company M to fill the vacancy caused by the untimely death of Captain McCord. Captain Mudelson joined the Mational Guard in 1925, and on May 19, 1925, was appointed Second Lieutenant. One year later, on May 25, 1926, he was promoted to First Lieutenant, and on April 20, 1931 was appointed Captain.

The next change was the transfer of Lieutenant-Colonel Carle H. Belt to the Mational Guard Reserve, and the elevation of Major William G. Harris to Lieutemant-Colonel. Lieutemant-Colonel Harris' record in the National Guard dates from 1920, when the new Mational Guard was in the making. He was appointed First Lieutenant in December, 1920, and promoted to Captain on May 10, 1921. He was then in command of the Third Separate Company Infantry, which later on became Company C, 160th Infantry Regiment. On July 26, 1926, Captain Harris became Hajor and on May 6, 1934, he was advanced to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. Captain Henry H. Vickery was promoted to Major to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Major Harris. Major Vickery was commissioned First Lieutenant in the Mational Guard on January 23, 1923, and promoted to Captain June 30, 1924. He remained in command of Company K from 1924 to May, 1933, when he was transferred to Headquarters, 160th Infantry. On July 31, 1934, Major Alfred Fellows, Regimental Surgeon, resigned. Major Fellows was commissioned Captain in the Medical Detachment on February 17, 1925, and spent approximately mime years in the service. Captain Edwin R. Butterfield was promoted to Major and Surgeon on March 23, 1935. He had been commissioned as Captain in the Medical Detachment on July 5, 1929.

From changes in commanding and staff officers our history turns back to March 10, 1933, on which date a severe earthquake rocked Long Beach, Santa Ana, and nearby towns at 5:55 p.m. The entire Regiment was soon in their armory awaiting a call or emergency order. Brigadier-General Story and Colonel Hervey arrived in San Pedro about midnight. They were followed by a detachment of ten officers and seventy-five enlisted men of the 160th Infantry, who left Los Angeles at 7:00 a.m. March eleven, and by moon that day had established kitchens and were serving meals. Later, another one hundred men joined the seventy-five; and four kitchens were established and maintained by the 160th Infantry Regiment. Kitchen So. 1 was located at the State Armory; No. 2, Bixby

Park; No. 3 at Belmont Shore; and kitchen No. 4 was at North Long Beach. It was estimated that the four kitchens served approximately fifty-seven thousand meals on March eleventh; sixty-two thousand on March twelve; fifty-two thousand on March thirteen; fifty-one thousand on March fifteenth. Thereafter the number decreased rapidly. Officers of the Regiment in charge of the kitchens were Major C. M. Bradley; Captains C. W. Hoffman, H. E. Hopping, H. C. Wright, W. H. Furniss, S. L. Peebles, J. K. Willer, G. R. Smith; First Lieutenants W. W. Burgess, W. O. Anderson, C. W. Roth; Second Lieutenants R. M. Lowe, M. S. Mortimer, T. F. Heyne, S. W. Dass, E. W. Green, L. M. Lowe, A. Gillespie, and F. J. Lynch.*

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On Sunday, November 6, 1932, the 160th Infantry Regiment inaugurated a beautiful innovation, when memorial services, dedicated to the men and women who served and died in the World War, were held. The services were held in the magnificent First Baptist Church of Los Angeles. The Regiment, led by Colonel Harcourt Hervey and his staff, marched in formation to the church, where a section had been reserved for them. Many beautiful features of the service must be omitted. Major Herschel R. Griffin, Regimental Chaplain, delivered the memorial address on "Peace Time Patriotism." In a masterful and eloquent manner he paid tribute to the dead, pointed out the peace time enemies of the ideals for which these men had fought and died, called for a new patriotism and citizenship dedicated to the welfare of our Christian institutions and for a world view of sympathy and understanding. The service proved to be of such worth that it was decided to perpetuate it as an annual Armistice day event.

On Monday evening, March 28, 1932, Brigadier-General W. A. Story presented to eleven units of the 160th Infantry Regiment Excellent Attendance Ribbons for attendance during the year 1931. The eleven units on whose guidous General Story pinned a ribbon were as follows: Headquarters Company, Service Company, Headquarters Company First Battalion, Company D, Headquarters Company Second Battalion, Company H, Headquarters Company Third Battalion, Companies I, K, M, and Medical Detachment. There were four non-commissioned officers in the Regiment who had not missed a drill in five years, namely: Master Sergeant Alfred J. Challener Jr., Service Company; Staff Sergeant Fred B. Manley, Service Company; Master Sergeant Ralph D. Maxfield, Headquarters Company; and Technical Sergeant Delus Jeffery, Headquarters Company.

In the Winth Corps Area Regional Rifle Match held August 31, to September 4, 1933, the team from the 160th stood third. The United States Marines was

first and a civilian team second. The 160th team was the best of the California National Guard teams at the meet. Further improvement in the markman-ship of the 160th Infantry was demonstrated in the 1935 National Championship Natches at Camp Perry, when in the Championship Regimental Team Natch the 160th Infantry six man team took second place, the 114th Regimental Infantry, New Jersey National Guard being first. The State National Guard team won ninth place in the National shoot at Camp Perry.* In 1936, five of the members of the 160th Infantry Regiment were on the State Rifle team to compete at Camp Perry. The team finished in twenty-third place in the finals, but several members won individual medals.**

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On Sunday, July 15, 1934, the 160th Infantry Regiment was ordered to San Francisco for duty during the strike of the longshoremen. The need for the liOth was caused by the calling of a general strike in San Francisco of union sympathisers on that date. The efficiency and reliability of the Regiment was put to a severe test and the unit proved to be equal to the occasion. The emergancy call was received in Los Angeles late in the evening of the fifteenth and by 6:00 a.m. July sixteen, ninty-two percent of the Regiment was breakfasting at hastily set up field kitchens. Equipment was soon loaded, packs rolled, and all were set to go. At 8:00 a.m. the Regiment entrained in four sections and one hour later was on its way to San Francisco. The troops arrived in the city about 9:00 p.m. The time consumed in calling the men to arms, which was difficult because it was Sunday and many men were not at knome, the assembling and loading of equipment sufficient for field service, and the trip to the city consumed only twenty-two hours. The Regiment remained on guard duty in San Francisco until Saturday evening, July twenty-first, when they were relieved and the 160th entrained immediately for San Luis Obispo, where they spent two weeks in camp. ****

Perhaps the largest encampment and review held in California since the Camp Kearney days was that of the Fortieth Division, held July 7, to 28, 1935. The National Guard units of Utah and Nevada joined with those of California in staging a maneuver in which blue and red armies opposed each other. These maneuvers increased the efficiency of the National Guard, as conditions were similar to those which would arise during actual hostilities. On Friday, July ninteenth, the entire 40th Division passed in review before Governor Frank F. Merriam, California; Governor Blood of Utah; Major-General Paul B. Malone,

of 1934 and the Mational Guard. Adjutant General's Office.

George B. Leach, Chief of the Mational Guard Bureau; Lieutenant-General Von Boetticher, German military attache; Major-General Barrows; and Brigadier-Generals Walter P. Story and Wallace A. Mason. Thousands of spectators witnessed the review.*

The 160th Infantry was shocked and grieved upon learning of the death of Brigadier-General Seth E. Howard, Adjutant-General of the State of California, on June 26, 1935, while enroute from Sacramento to San Francisco in the discharge of duties pertaining to his office. The General had entered the National Guard as Captain in the 160th Infantry Regiment and became Major in charge of the First Battalion, 160th Infantry in 1922. To this Battalion fell the honor of escorting the remains to their last resting place and firing the usual military salute at the grave of the departed General.**

When 1937 had reached its half way mark another of the few changes made in the Regimental commanding officers took place. On July 7, 1937, Colonel Harcourt Hervey was promoted to Brigadier-General, 40th Brigade, to succeed General Walter P. Story, who had been advanced to Major-General, 40th Division, California Hational Guard. The promotion of Colonel Hervey was followed by the transfer of Colonel Wayne R. Allen from the 159th Infantry Regiment to the command of the 160th Infantry Regiment. On September 12, 1937, Colonel Allen was presented to his new command by Brigadier-General Hervey at the usual mess and drill might. The splendid military discipline of the officers and men of the 160th Infantry soon removed any existing resentment on the part of the Regiment because of the transfer of an outside officer to their regiment. It also removed any embarassment on the part of Colonel Allen.

Licutement-Colonel William G. Harris assumed temporary command of the 160th Infantry Regiment July 7, 1937, when Colonel Hervey was promoted to Brigadier General. On September twentieth Colonel Harris was transferred to the Staff, 40th Division and Major Robert S. Dicey was promoted to Licutement-Colonel on Nevember 10, 1937. Licutement-Colonel Dicey has been in continuous military service since October 4, 1918, when he entered the ranks as a private and occupied in turn the grades of corporal, sergeant, and first sergeant of infantry until May 12, 1920. At that time he was appointed Second Licutement of infantry and assigned to Company A, First Separate Battalion. On June 27, 1921,

He was promoted to Captain of Company A, and was in command of that Company, when the unit became Company A, 160th Infantry Regiment, on August 23, 1921. He continued in command of Company A until February 13, 1926, when he was promoted to Major. Eleven years later, on November 10, 1937, Robert S. Dicey was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel of the 160th Infantry Regiment. His duties Have carried him into the training of commissioned and non-commissioned officers. He has served as plans and training officer, and is familiar with every phase of the military and extra military activities of the regiment. He had worked faithfully, consistently, and effeciently for many years and deserved the promotion.*

Before describing the encampient of August 1937, it seems appropriate that reference we made to the encampment of July 2, to 10, 1887, held at Healdsburg, California. A few lines from the report of Colonel William R. Shafter, First Infantry, United States Army, to the War Department, Washington, D. C. , will reveal to some extent the wast improvement in the California National Guard during the last fifty years. Colonel Shafter stated that: "The tents used in camp, with the exception of a very few belonging to the State, were private property, and consisted of several kinds; wall, Sibley, and A tests. I doubt very much if many of them would turn rain in an ordinary storm." Note the next comment on arms: "With the exception of a part of one regiment, all the troops were armed with the Springfield rifle, model of 1873, and of these fully fifty per cont were totally unfit for service. This has resulted from long and constant use, and the lack of material and labor to keep them in proper repair." Of accoutrements he noted that: "With very few exceptions none of the companies were provided with knapsacks, haver sacks, or canteens. The companies that possessed these articles held them as private property. The cartridge-boxes were also private property. All the clothing worn by the men was purchased by private funds, that furnished by the State having long since been worn out and never replaced. Its condition was fair, and in the main servicable." About messes he stated: "All organizations were messed by contract, and there was no organised commissariat." Colonel Shafter firmly believed that the militia and regular regiments should encamp together. He stateds "It would benefit the National Guard because they would have the opportunity of learning by contact, drill, guard, and routine duties of the garrison camp. They would also have the benefit of a rigid discipline in view, and see the good results obtainable from it. The benefit to the regulars would be the association with the men upon whom our country must rely in the moment of danger. It would also give the regulars an opportunity to note the spirit which aminates the men who turn out and subject themselves to expense, discipline, and hard work, without expectation of any adequate return for the services rendered by them. *** And now in conclusion fifty years later, the 160th Infantry Regiment, organized in 1887 as the Seventh Infantry Battalion, was attending the Fourth Field Army

mansuvers at San Luis Obispo. In the maneuvers of 1937 the 160th Infantry Regiment made a striking contrast to the Seventh of fifty years ago. Supplied by the Federal Government with the same equipment as the Regulars, using the same drill tactics, and formation; with motorized equipment, splendid commissariat equipment, machine gum squads, riot squads, and schools for recruits, non-commissioned officers, splendid armories and atheletic facilities; it is quite apparent that the California Mational Guard has made wonderful strides upward as time marched onward.

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
