## Activities:

Battery E, Second Pield Artillery, was organized August 4, 1917, in response to the proclamation issued by the President of the United States July 3, 1917.\*\* It was not difficult to fill the ranks of the Second Field Artillery which was known as the "Grizzlies". Recruits were attracted by the high rating which the organization held in military circles. The men composing Battery E were strong and healthy, having been employed in the lumber camps of Mendocino and Humboldt Counties. The officers of the unit had hopes of using these men on their football team later in the fall.

The unit was in National Guard service for one day only, when it was mustered into Federal Service, and redesignated Battery E, 144th Field Artillery.\*\*\*\*
