Activities:

On February 12, 1918, the Winth Separate Company, California Infantry, was organised in Los Angeles and mustered into the service of the State. Charles T. Rea was appointed Captain and Thomas R. Lee, First Lieutenant.

Soon after the Company was mustered in, the Federal authorities began taking men from its ranks. In March 1918, eleven men were called from the Minth Separate Company into the United States Army; eighteen were called in April, and eleven in May. Twelve more were called in June, seven in July, three in August, four in September, four in October and two in November. Approximately seventy-five men were taken from the Minth Separate Company during the war. In October all assemblages were discontinued on account of the epedemic of influence.

On the tenth of January 1919 the members of the Company held their first meeting in several months, and it was decided to start a recruiting campaign for new members. This proved to be futile, as only a few men could be persuaded to join the organization. After the signing of the armistice, interest in military affairs seemed to be entirely lacking. Months of effort on the part of the Minth Separate Company to recruit the necessary number of men to meet the Federal requirements, resulted in absolute failure.

There were twenty-eight privates and one Cpatain on the roll when the Company was finally mustered out of the service, July 25, 1919.
