ACTIVITIES:

The Eleventh Division of the Naval Militia of California was organized at Los Angeles April 9, 1917, and mustered into the service of the State on the same date. On April fourteenth four officers and fifty-six men of the Division were enrolled in the Federal Service, as National Naval Volunteers.* As this Division was organized after war was declared between the United States and the German Government, it is reasonable to assume that the members were desirous of entering the Federal Service immediately.

After enrollment the officers and men of the Division were mobilized with the other divisions of the Naval Militia on board the U. S. S. "Oregon" at Mare Island, and officers and men were assigned to duty; some on vessels of the Pacific Fleet under orders to proceed to the Atlantic Coast, and others to duties on shore.

The Naval Militia of California was not reorganized after the World War, and the enrollment of its members into Federal Service in 1917 brought an end to this organization.
