Well anyway I got an instructor. To this day I don't know what sort of an impression I made on him then, nor do I know what he thinks of me now. At least he seems to tolerate me.



Tuesday's 10-inch ceiling enabled us to get this fine view of "C" Squadron, which they will be happy to send to their folks with a few footnotes!



A/C Donald Bredeen from the "Inland Empire"—Spokane, Washington—lists his hobby as fishing and hunting and says he was a


radio op on B-17 patroling the Pacific for submarines. That's going in for big "game!"




