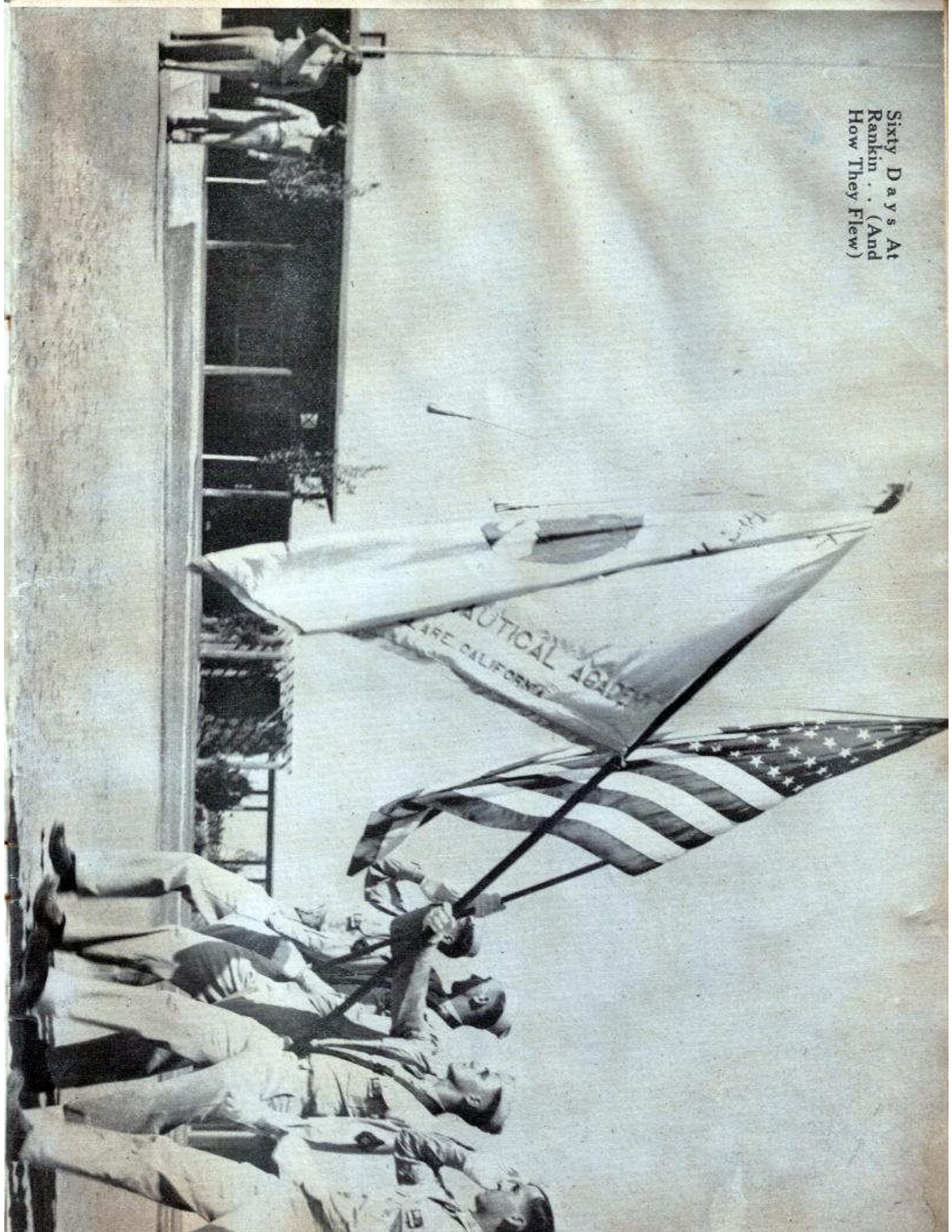

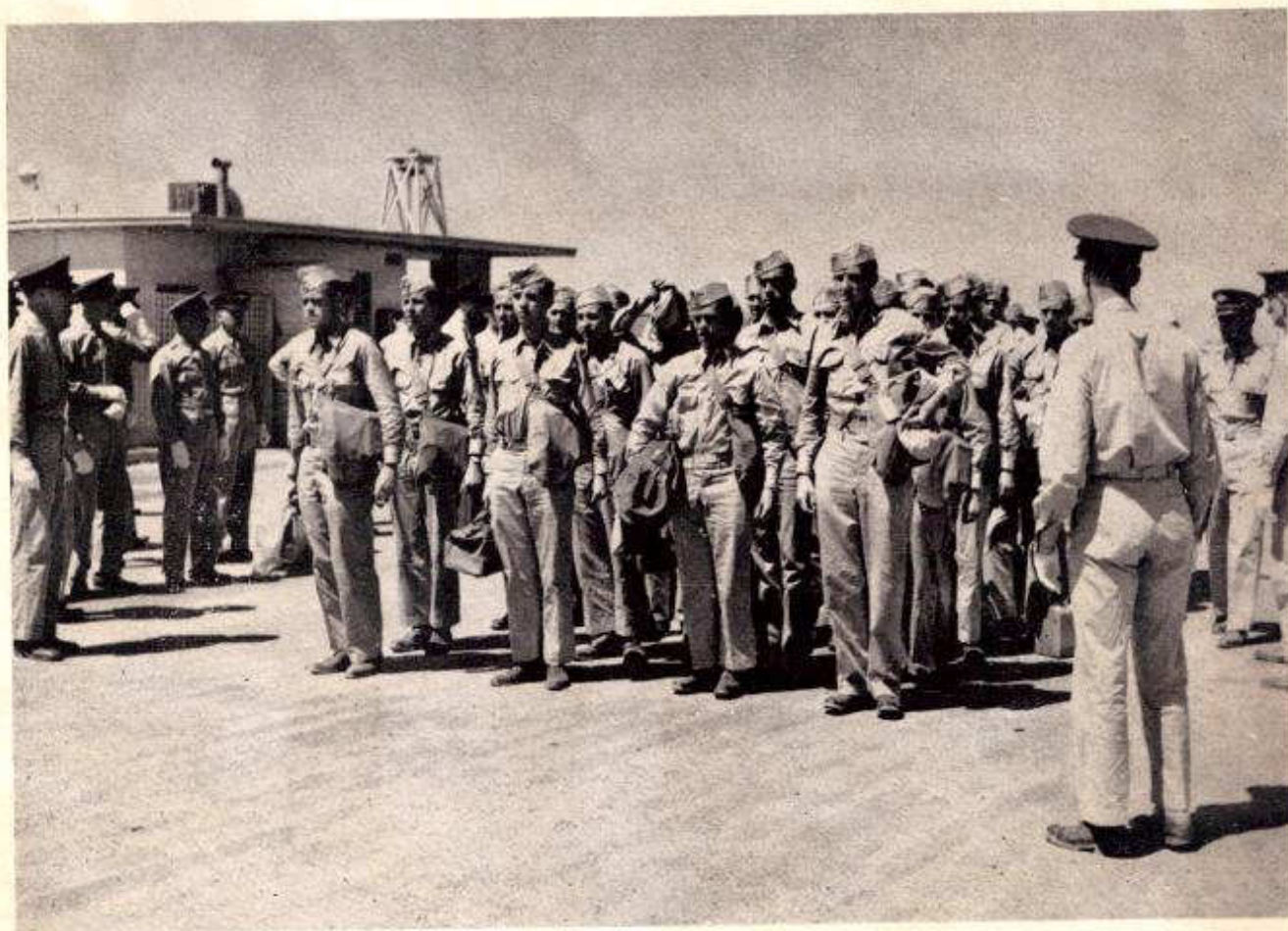

Breakfast in the morning's chill half-dark is not the most appealing thought possible so it's back to bed—shoes, caps and all—for some, while others file through the chow line, gulp a few hasty bites and leave the mess hall on the double for the barracks.

After months of learning the hard way, a cadet makes every move count as he scurries around his room like a pack-rat, depositing everything movable in his locker, swiftly dusting,

sweeping and polishing on the move. 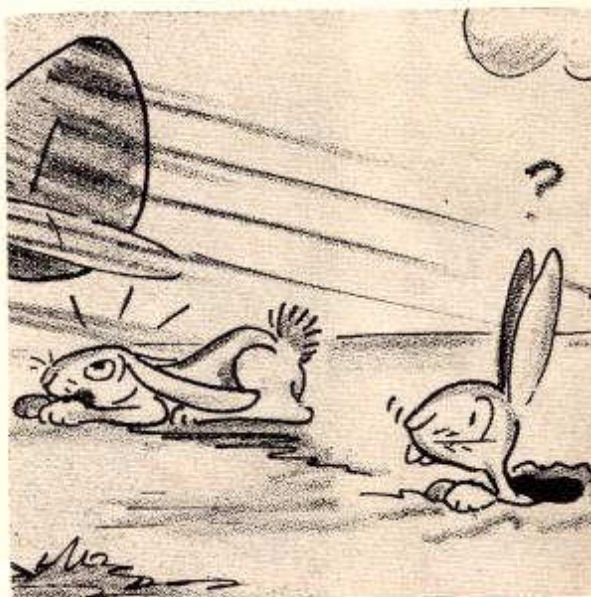
"This, Mr. Hawes, is a Link trainer,"; introduction to one of the most perverse aircraft in the Army collection. For the Link is actually an aircraft; maneuvers practiced under its hood will lead directly to actual instrument flying. The sergeant assures us that the first five hours are the hardest; we fervently hope so!



The very basic fundamentals having been mastered, our Link time progressed to extremely complicated blind flying. A/C C. O. Beatty, at the moment this picture was taken, was inspecting his most complicated maneuver to date—a gentle turn to the northward, as traced by the little red line. A cinch in a PT-17, but what a job in a Link!



Not quite so important as the Link trainer, nor quite so complicated a mechanism; but the "Lunk" trainer did its share in lowering the number of groundloops for 44-C. A few minutes spent in this ingenious contrivance was usually sufficient to quiet the "Keep that nose straight!" coming over the gosports.

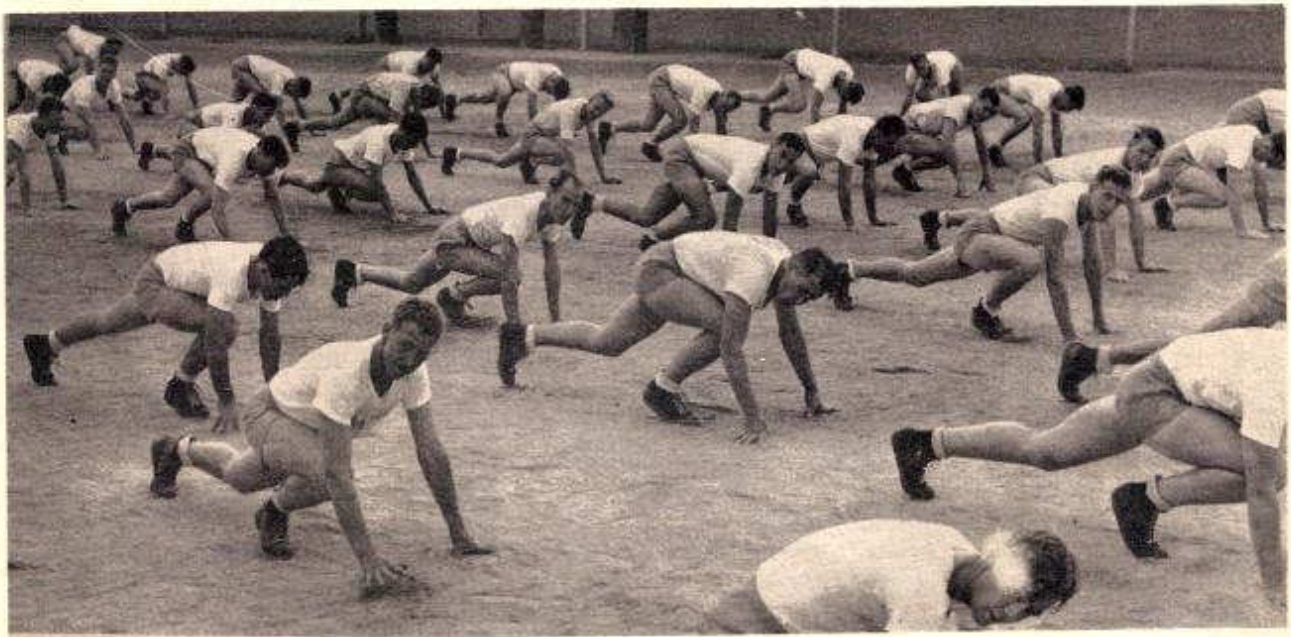


TOUGH TO TAKE is the daily period of physical training each cadet at Rankin undergoes (that's the word), but few men of the detachment were ever in better shape in their lives than they are now after two months of rigorous but all-in-all enjoyable conditioning by Lieut. C. W. Conrad and Sgts. Joe Preininger and Alex Clowson of the athletic department.

For a full-rounded hour of exercise, competition and fun, the physical training program

under Lieut. Conrad, the director, could hardly be improved. Twenty minutes of fast-moving calisthenics is followed by a 500-yard run. The remainder of the period is spent in stiff competition between squads in games of touch football, volley ball, basketball and softball.

More than adequate playing facilities help make it possible for Rankin Field to stand second to none for its conditioning program, and the able staff make fun out of what might otherwise be just hard work.

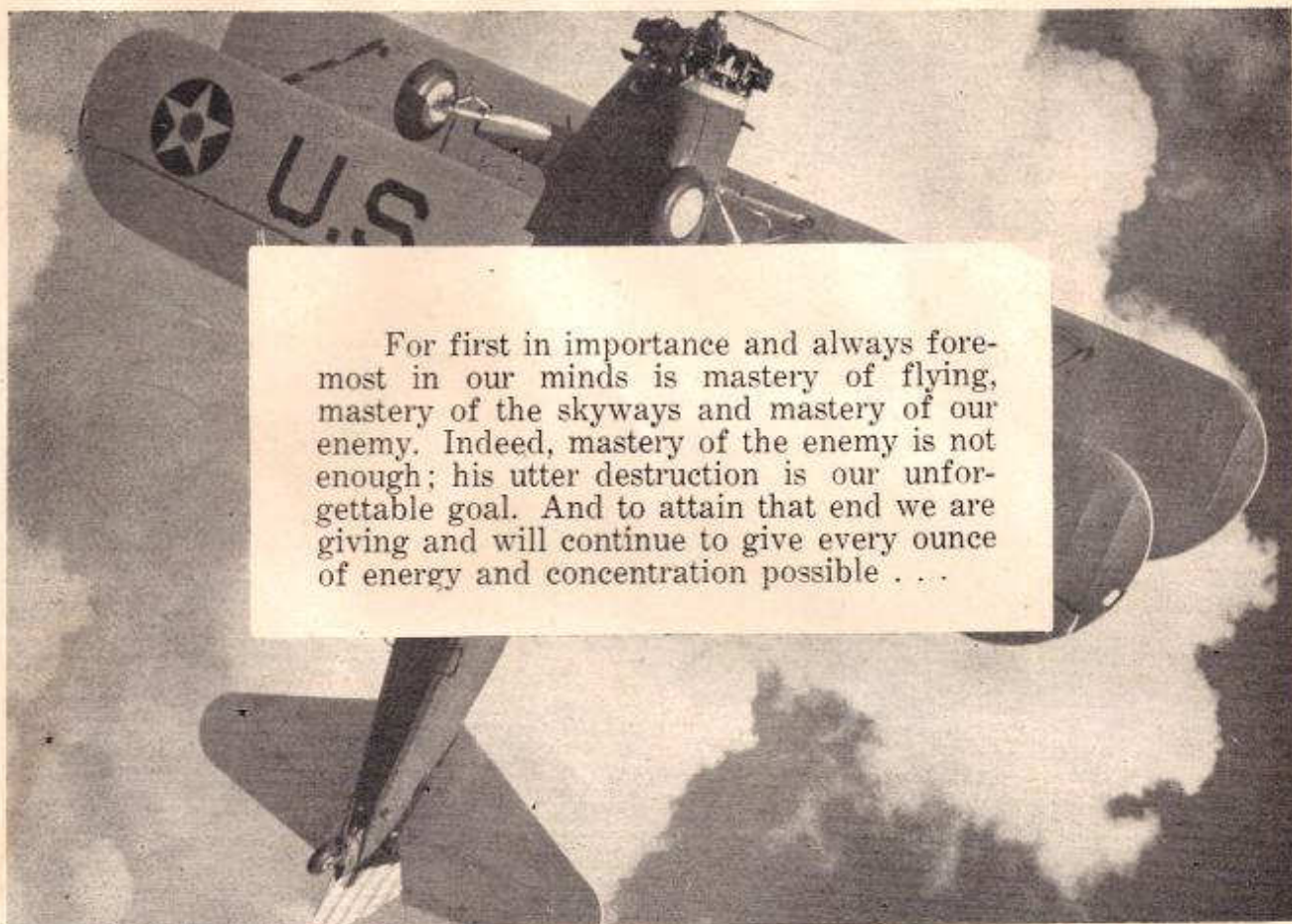

Existence Here. . . .



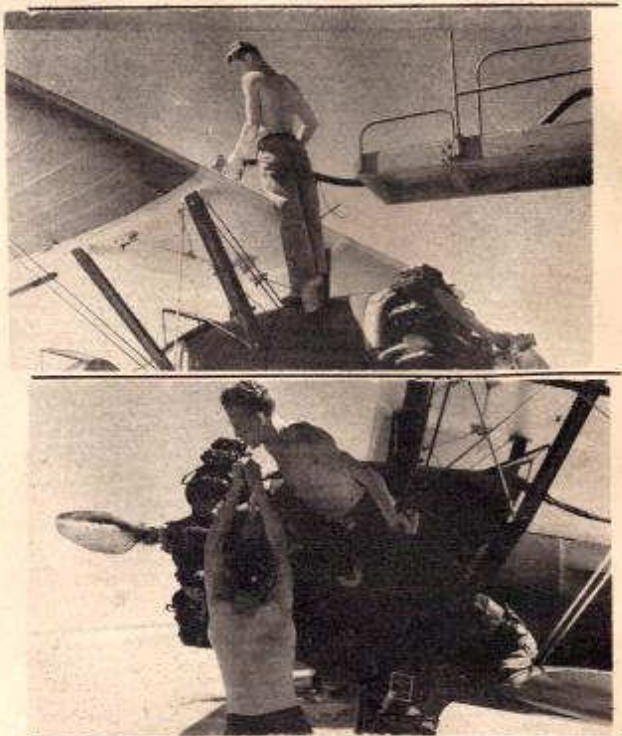
For first in importance and always foremost in our minds is mastery of flying, mastery of the skyways and mastery of our enemy. Indeed, mastery of the enemy is not enough; his utter destruction is our unforgettable goal. And to attain that end we are giving and will continue to give every ounce of energy and concentration possible . . .



READYING for the day's flight in a conference with our instructors is the prelude to every take-off. In the ready rooms, one of which is pictured here, discussions of theory and practice of flying progress all the way from the fundamental take-off and landing to acrobatics, according to the status of the cadet pilot.



FORM ONE is Thought One before and at the end of each period of flight, as this important blank indicates the condition of each plane as checked by line mechanics (at right) and must contain data on each flight before the student leaves the plane.



The ubiquitous flight line mechanics are part of the secret of wringing every possible hour out of the Rankin PTs. Gassing the ships after the third period, keeping the windshields clean, repairing ground-looped wings; these are but a few of the jobs handled by these men. Typical of the spirit of civilian employees was their ever-willingness to help out with a missing form one, speed up an extra solo ship for someone short on time, and make things generally easier and safer.



Huddled in little groups, instructor and students, cross country is where your classroom begins to pay off in the air. Just a few words before one of the brave, dashing Cadets sails off for points yonder with all the zeal of Ponce De Leon, plus a little more navigational knowledge.



We got a foretaste of the long tactical hops we'll soon be taking. Just a short trip, Rankin to Rankin, via Fresno and Hanford; but no B-17 will be quite like cruising over Highway 99, looking for the checkpoint to the left, wishing one of those Ryans would come over for a look while passing Visalia.

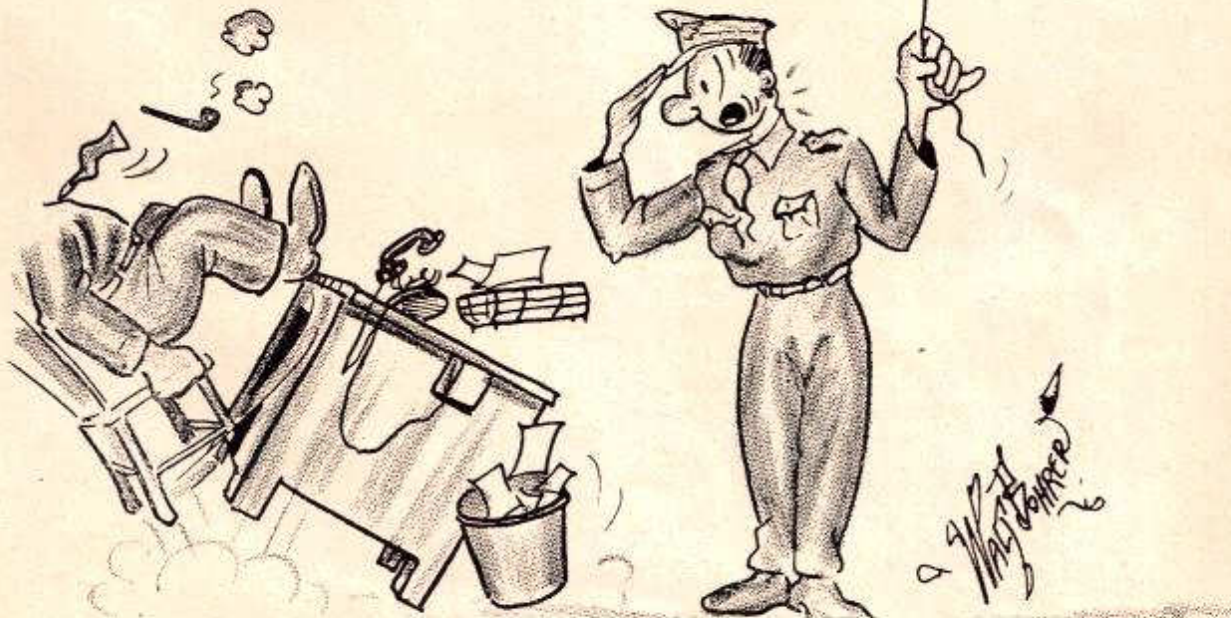

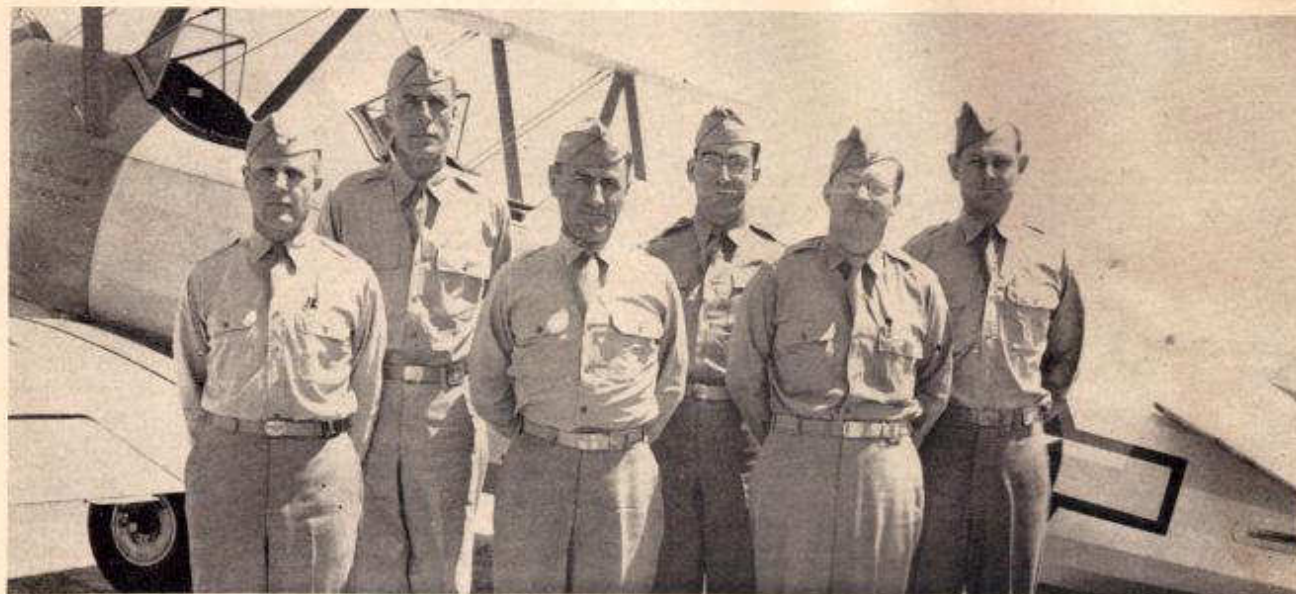


"WINDING 'ER UP" shortly after dawn, the cadets at the right have the trainer's Continental engine almost on the way for the morning's work.

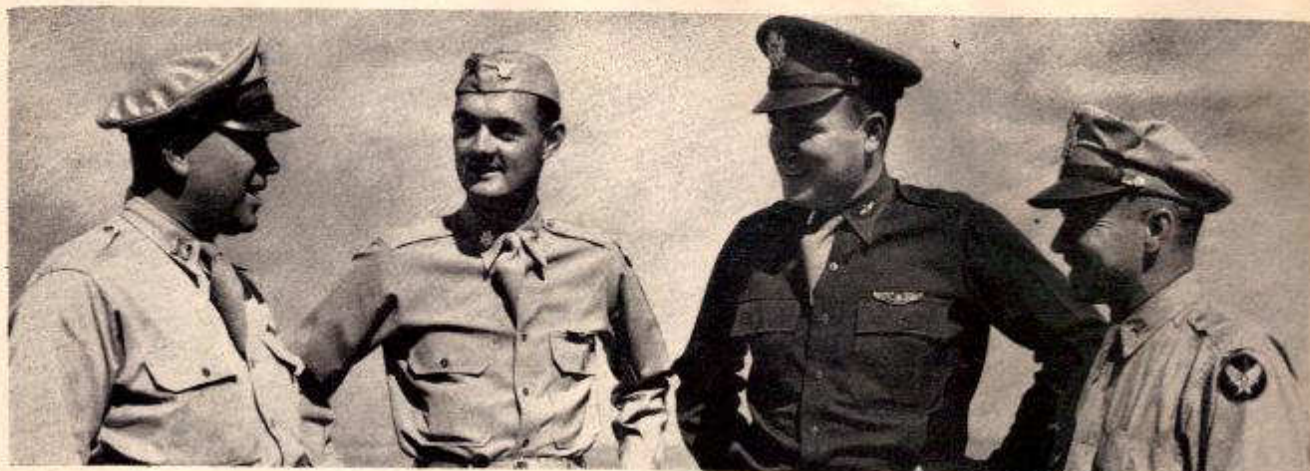

AND THIS IS YOUR, WHAT?—why of course; it's the cam which times the movement of the rocker arms, which in some mysterious fashion cause the little valves to open at just the right moment, and from there the whole thing is explainable in four simple cycles. Ground school instructor R. W. Purdy gives the low down in slightly more technical fashion to a group of engines class students.



WE ADMIT THAT THIS IS A bit fantastic, but this picture purports to show a group of Aviation Cadets from Squadron D engaged in study, although maps and protractors spread about indicate that the situation might have actually existed. Ground school becomes very personal if "Dumb John" flunks his navigation and winds up over the Sierras on his cross-country.
