SUBJECT: Daily Report for April 25, 1914.

1. Accompanied by the Medical Officer, the Commanding Officer, First Provisional Field Battalion, N. G. C., made a general inspection of the detachment camps located on the water systems.

2. At the request of Captain C. M. Condon, Commanding Officer United States troops on the border at San Ysidro, Calif., a visit was mde to his Headquarters and the information concerning a large supply of cyanide of potassium was discussed and Captain Condon requested that the guard on the water systems be increased to prevent the placing of any of this cyanide in the water supplies used by San Diego and neighborhing communities. Telegram to this effect was wired to The Adjutant General Later in the day.

3. Outpost located at Camp Otay arrested suspicious Mexican and forwarded him to these Headquarters where the man was detained over night and the following day forwarded under guard to San Diego.

4. Naval Militia troops stationed at San Ysidro, California, were, upon arrival of reinforcements to the regular troops, relieved of duty at that station and returned to Camp Highland.

5. Camps Otay and Sweetwater reported men requiring medical attendance with no one to care for them. Medical officer with three men a Hospital Corps are doing the best they can to cover the six detachment camps established throughout San Diego County, but with their insufficient force are unable to give proper attention to all the cases referred to them.

6. Additional strength reported for the day for Fifth Company, 7 enlisted men; for Eighth Company, 7 enlisted men.

7. Established outpost at the junction of Otay Valley county road and county road leading from said valley directly into Mexico. Outpost consists of petty officer and eight men of the Third Division, N. M. C.

8. Requested by officials a Cuyamaca Water Company to furnish pretection to their open reservoirs and flowing flumes. Unable to comply with the request because of insufficient force.

9. Shortage of tentage, blankets and uniform equipment very apparent. Third Division, N. M. C., not equipped with anything of the above for field service. Such as they have has been borrowed, purchased from the stores, er received on memorandum from corporations. The Fifth and Eighth Companies also report shortage, as neither of the companies have ever been fully equipped for field service, although these conditions have been reported semi-annuallyfor many years past.

Upon information received at these Head; uarters that 57 Mexicans 1. imprisoned at the refugee camp at Point Loma, Cal., had escaped these Headquarters issued orders for the troops to intercept all persons and any Mexicans unable to properly account for their presence in the vicinity of these camps to be arrested and held for identification by the U.S. officers in charge of the refugee camp. The commanding officer of , detachment No. 1 sent a non commissioned officer and six privates from Camp Morena to Buckman Springs, a distance of nine miles, there to bivouac for the night of the 29th and, unless otherwise directed, to return to Gamp Morena by 4:30 P. M. April 30th. The commanding officer of Detachment No. 2 was directed to send Second Lieutenant C.M. Frost, two non commissioned officers and eight privates from Camp Otay to the junction of the Janul Dulzura road with the Otay Valley road at a point about two miles east of the Janul ranch house, there to bivouac for the night, returning to Camp Otay on the morning of the 30th. The commanding officer of Detachment No. 3 was directed to send Second Lieutenant G.W.Fisher, one non commissioned officer and three privates into Telegraph Canyon to bivouac for the night at a point near the residence of one James Dunn, to return to Camp Primus on the morning of April 30th. The commanding officer of Detachment No. 4, in addition to permanent guard maintained at Chester Grade sent one petty officer and sufficient force to a location on the San Diego Bay front in the neighborhood of the Western Salt Works, another detachment consisting of one petty officer and sufficient force to the highway running along the western limits of the towns of Palm City and Nestor, Cal.

2. During the day Lieutenant W.W.Rhein, commanding Camp Sweetwater, reported the arrest of four Mexican refugees who were turned over to United States officers in charge of the refugee camp at Point Loma, and Lieutenant D.M.Stewart, commanding Camp Highland reported the arrest of two Mexican refugees who were turned over to the United States officers command of the U.S.regular troops at San Ysidro, Cal. Out of the 14 men captured during the day out of the 57 escaped the National Guard troops captured six.

5. The discipline and health of the men in the verious detachments is all that could be desired and the willingness of the men to participate in the schools of instruction, drills and field duties is very satisfactory to the Commanding Officer of this battalion.

4. A request was this day made upon these Headquarters by the oficial of the Cuyamaca Water Company for added protection to their water system by having a guard placed at the San Diego river diverting dam, but owing to the insufficient forces and the extent of the territory now being covered by same the request could not be complied with.

5. These Headquarters were visited by a delegation of ranchers of the Otay Valley and Mesa and expressions of gratitude were made because of the presence of the troops in their vicinity.

No arrests of contraband persons or properties were made during the nigh.

SUBJECT: Daily Report for April 26, 1914.

1. General Robert Wankowski, M.G.C., arrived at these Headquarters at 9:00 A.M. for the purpose of investigating the conditions along the Mexican border and upon the water systems of San Diggo and vicinity. With the Medical Officer the Commanding Officer of the First Provisional Field Battalion accompanied General Wankowski upon a tour of insepction of the several camps of the various detachments of these Headquarters, the entire day being consumed for this purpose.

2. Report reached these Head warters from detachments at Camps Otay and Primus that a small number of men were acting suspicious in traversing the Otay Mesa, coming in a northerly direction from the Mexican line along the west slope of the San Ysidro range. A small party of men from each camp was sent out with a non commissioned officer to intercept these men, whom they found to be Chinamen, three of whom were captured and two excaping prior to the arrival of the men sent out from the camps. The three Chinamen were taken into San Diego under guard and turned over to the immigration officers where they had a preliminary hearing and are now held on the charge of being smuggled into this country.

About 4:30 P.M. Lieutenant Briarton, U.S.A., telephoned these Headquarters that the Commanding Officer of the American troops had information that rifles were to be smuggled across the line for the benefit of the Mexican volunteers, and they requested the troops of this battalion to co-operate with the American troops in guarding all ro ads and trails leading into Lower California from the San Diego-Yuma Post road which extends easterly from the City of San Diego through the towns of National City, Dulzura and Potrero and Campo. Orders were issued from these Headquarters directing the commanding officers of the several detachments to cover specified roads and trails with a guard selected of sufficient strength for this particular purpose and by nightfall these Headquarters were able to report to the Commanding Officer of the American troops that every road and trail from Palm City, Cal., to Campo, Cal., was covered by the troops of these Headquarters in strengths varying from one to three squads under the command of a commissioned or noncommissioned officer. During the night the Commanding Officer of these Headquarters traveled the San Diego-Yuma Post Road and found the

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troops of this battalion well located, alert and vigilant. Where were no anusual occurrences during the night and in the morning the troops were called in and ordered to report back to the detachment camps.

1. Reports for the various detachments showed that Lieutenant W.W.Rhein at Camp Sweetwater arrested six Mexicans escaped from the refugee camp at Point Lema, making a total of ten recovered at this camp.

2. Lieutenant D.N.Stewart, commanding Camp Highland, reported nine Mexicans captured, making a total of eleven for this camp to date.

5. No other camps reported arrests during the day. A detachment of one non commissioned officer and six privates from Camp Morena marched through the back country from Morena Reservoir to Buckman Springs, a distance of mime miles, and bivouseked for the night of April 29th and reported back to camp at 4:50 P.M., April 30th. Scouting partice were sent out from camps Primus and Otay along the pipe lines of the water system but discovered no Mexicans.

The Medical Officer visited all the samps with the exception of Camps Morena and La Mesa and reported the health of the men good.

1. Reported from Detachment No. 1, Camp Morena, that party of two acting in suspicious manner were discovered in the neighborhood of the dam and powder house at Morena Reservoir by the cut post on the evening of May 2d. Sentinel sounded alarm and detachment was ordered out to scour the hills but were unable to capture anyone.

2. Reported from Detachment No. 4, Camp Highland, that rancher's house was looted. Detailed information regarding same has been requested of both Captain Clyne, commanding Detachment No. 2, and Lieutenant Stewart, commanding Detachment No. 4.

5. Divided strength of Detachment No. 2, Camp Otay, sending Second Lieutenant C.M.Frost, 5th Company, in command of 29 enlisted men to the Harvey Ranch to establish Detachment No. 7, Camp Harvey, Post Office Otay, Califernia, Telephone National 128 F 4. This detachment guards the upper and eastern portions of the Lower Otay reservoir and Dulzura Creek for a distance of four miles to the east and including the properties of the Jamul Rancho. There are about 75 Mexicans employed in a construction camp sithin a half mile of Camp Harvey and about 50 more Mexicans employed mpon the Jamul Rancho.

4. Provisions this day purchased and distributed to the various detachments for the five day period covering May 5d to 7th, inclusive.

3. 🗄 Immediately upon receipt of telegram the Commanding Officers of the Fifth and Eighth Companies, Coast Artillery . Corps. N. G. C., Third Division, Naval Militia, and Hospital Corps Detachment were notified by telephone to report immediately at the National Guard Armory, San Diego, where a conference was held and the officers and non commissioned officers of the various organizations called by telephone to their respective armories and preparations made for taking the commands into the field. At 5:00 A. M. both militia calls were sounded by the Fire Department's alarm system and the members reported to their respective armories. Rations were procured, transportation arranged for, men outfitted, armed and sent to the front in detachments as follows:

2. Captain S. T. Clyne, Camp Otay, reported arrest of suspicious Mexican who was Corwarded to Police Department of San Diago and held for investigation.

3. Lieutenant D. M. Stewart, at request of Captain Condon of United States troops, moved up from Nighland Reservoir to a point overlooking San Ysidro, Calif., near Tia Juana, and established his field pieces there to remain under command of Captain Condon until arrival of American troops when he will again fall back to Camp Fighland to guard the water supply of the city of Cororado and the communities on the lower portion of San Diego Bay.

4. Lieutenant W. W. Rhein, Camp Sweetwater, reports two tons dynamite and ten Lexicans employed in quarry at base of Sweetwater dam. Battalion Commander directed Lieutenant Rhein to have dynamite removed by owner and Mexicans discharged gradually so as not to arouse suspicion or create animosity.

5. Chief Boatswain's made Watson and squad, of La Mesa, braught forward to Camp Highland to maintain guard at this point during the absence of Lieutenant Stewart, Haval Militia, at San Ysidro.

6. Unable to properly patrol conduits, flumes, wipe lines, or guard tunnels, tressels and gate values upon water systems because of lack of sufficient forces. Report the Cuyamaca Reservoir, San Diego River Diverting Dam, Chollas Aeights Reservoir and Filtration Flant and University Beights Reservoir absolutely unguarded because of lack of sufficient strength. Was requested by officials of the San Diego Consolidated Gas and Electric Co. to provide them with protection to their gas and electric light plant. Unable to do so because of insufficient forces and directed police department of San Diego to furnish such protection The Adjutant General -- 2

as possible.

Forwarded telegrams as follows to The Adjutant General: 7. (a) Regarding the necessity for leadquarters staff officer. (b) Imperative need of further sanitary troops. (c) Detailed information regarding establishing of Battalion Headquarters in field. (d) Reporting insufficient forces and requesting additional troops. (e) Requesting additional tentage and ammunition for troops now in field. Also telegrams to fae Commanding Officer, C.A.C., M.G.C., as follows: (a) Requested mounted equipment for Headquarters non commissioned staff and orderly. (b) Requesting blank forms for Battalion Headquarters, Sanitary troops and detachment commanders. Also to the Commanding Officer, Medical Corps requesting additional officer and enlisted men for samitary troops. Made arrangements in San Diego for rapid automobile 2. transportation to Tecate, Tia Juana or any other point provided

Militia Troops are called upon by regular army officer to take field in action supporting United States Troops against invasion by a foreign armed force.

9. Subsistence subplies purchased in quantities sufficient for five day periods.

10. Eighth Company strength increased by 13 men, and Fifth Company increased by 12 men.

12. Second Lieutenant C. M. Frost, Fifth Co., stationed at San Diego as recruiting officer; also designated as Acting Quartermaster for the First Provisional Field Battalion.

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
